OFFICIALS

THE GAME

Virginia stands at 14-12 overall and 5-8 in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2002-2003. The Cavaliers have lost their last five games and are coming off a 78-72 loss to Ohio (Feb. 26) in Athens, Ohio. Florida State stands at 12-13 overall and 3-11 in the ACC this season. In its last game, the Seminoles lost to 12th-ranked Wake Forest 60-56 (Feb. 26) in Tallahassee, Fla.

The Series vs. Florida State

Virginia holds a 14-9 lead in the series with Florida State, including an 85-72 victory (Jan. 29) in the first meeting of the 2002-2003 season at University Hall. The Cavaliers had their three-game winning streak in the series snapped with a 66-59 loss (Feb. 20) to the Seminoles in Tallahassee last season. UVa won the first game of the 2001-2002 season series 91-74 (Jan. 20) in Charlottesville. Virginia swept the 2000-2001 season series from Florida State for the first time since 1996-97. UVa won the first meeting in the 2000-2001 season, 89-71 (Jan. 16) in Charlottesville. Virginia earned the sweep with a 69-66 victory (Feb. 17) in Tallahassee on a three-pointer by Roger Mason, Jr. with one second remaining.

The Cavaliers have won six of the last eight meetings after FSU won three consecutive contests (71-63 and 88-63 in the 1997-98 season and 72-69 in the 1998-99 campaign).

Despite losing two of the last three games at Florida State, UVa is 6-5 all-time in Tallahassee. Florida State is the only ACC school against which the Cavaliers have a winning road record.

Virginia is looking for its fourth season sweep of the Seminoles. UVa swept the Seminoles in the 1994-95, 1996-97, and 2000-01 seasons. In the 1997-98 season, Florida State swept the season series from the Cavaliers, marking the Seminoles' only season sweep against Virginia.

Overall in the series, eight of Virginia's 14 wins over the Seminoles have been by nine points or less, while three of its losses have been by 15 or more points. In addition, five of FSU's last six wins have been by fewer than nine points. Six of the last nine meetings (dating back to the 1998-99 season) have been decided by seven points or less. The Cavaliers have won three of those six close games.

The only three games that were decided by more than seven points in the last nine meetings were the first meeting of each of the past three seasons – all Virginia victories. In 2000-2001, UVa won by 18 points (89-71); in the first meeting last season, the Cavaliers won by 17 points (91-74); and the first meeting this season, Virginia won by 13 points (85-72).

Earlier This Season Against Florida State

Freshman forward Derrick Byars and sophomore forward Jason Clark combined to score 21 first-half points to help Virginia open up an early lead in the Cavaliers' 85-72 victory over Florida State (Jan. 29) at University Hall.

Clark scored UVa's first seven points of the game and equalled his career high with 12 overall and added four rebounds and two steals. Byars came off the bench to score 11 consecutive Cavalier points midway through the first half to turn an 18-14 deficit into a 25-20 lead — a lead Virginia never relinquished. Byars tallied 15 points and two rebounds in the contest.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson led five UVa players in double figure scoring with 20 points and added 16 rebounds for his ninth double-double of the season. He also had two blocked shots and two assists. Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward Elton Brown both contributed 14 points. Billet also had three assists, while Brown pulled down four rebounds.

Florida State opened up an 18-12 lead with 12:01 remaining in the first half. A dunk by junior center Nick Vander Laan pulled UVa within four and then Byars scored UVa's next 11 points to put Virginia ahead for good (25-20 with 8:51 to go in the first half).

UVa led 38-28 at the intermission and extended its lead to as many as 18 points (70-52) with 5:29 to play in the game. The Cavaliers' lead never fell below nine points in the second stanza.

Virginia shot 45.2 percent (28-62) in the game and made 11 of 20 (55.0 percent) three-point field goal attempts. The Seminoles were 27-62 (43.5 percent) from the field. UVa held a 40-32 edge in rebounding as well.

Tim Pickett led Florida State with 21 points, 18 of which came in the second half. Anthony Richardson added 17 points.

Gillen Registers 350th Career Win

Virginia head coach Pete Gillen won his 350th career game on December 21 when his Cavaliers posted a 61-57 victory over Rutgers.

Gillen is in his 18th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 358-189 record for a .654 winning percentage. Gillen is in his fifth season at Virginia and has posted an 84-61 record (.579 winning percentage). Gillen won the 300th game of his career when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 87-85 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 14 times in 17 seasons (nine NCAA, five NIT), including the last three seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times – all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

Defeating The National Champion

For the second consecutive year, the Cavaliers have defeated the defending national champion. In 2001, Duke won the national title and UVa beat the Blue Devils the following season (87-84 – Feb. 28, 2002) at home. This year, Virginia defeated 2002 NCAA champion Maryland (86-78 – Feb. 6) in College Park, Md.

He's Back

After missing 70 consecutive games spanning 1,032 days, junior guard Majestic Mapp made his long anticipated return to the Cavalier lineup against North Carolina (Jan. 11). Mapp entered the game to a standing ovation with 7:23 remaining in the first half and played just over two minutes.

Mapp had been sidelined after tearing the ACL in his right knee on August 2, 2000. He missed the entire 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons. The last time Mapp had played for UVa was March 15, 2000 against Georgetown in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament.

Five Consecutive Losses

Virginia has dropped its last five games, marking its longest losing streak since suffering eight consecutive losses in the 1997-98 season. The Cavaliers lost eight straight games (all ACC matchups) from January 20 (vs. #25 Clemson) through February 18 (vs. N.C. State). Four of those losses were to top 25 teams.

Back-to-Back Home Losses

The Cavaliers have lost their last two home games (78-59 vs. Duke – Feb. 15 and 73-64 vs. Clemson – Feb. 18) and it stopped a streak of 74 games at University Hall since UVa has dropped back-to-back home games. The streak dated back to the 1997-98 season. The previous time Virginia was defeated in consecutive home games was during the 1997-98 season when the Cavaliers lost consecutive home games to Florida State (Feb. 4), 71-63 and North Carolina (Feb. 11), 60-45. UVa also lost to Duke (Jan. 24), 72-65 which was the first of three consecutive home losses.

Cavalier Captains

Seniors Travis Watson and Jason Rogers, and junior Majestic Mapp are the captains of the 2002-03 Virginia basketball team.

'Hoos Starting

The Cavaliers have played 26 games this season and have used 14 different starting lineups. UVa's latest starting lineup (vs. Ohio – Feb. 26) featured sophomore forward Jason Clark, sophomore forward Elton Brown, junior center Nick Vander Laan, junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith. Those same five comprised UVa's starting lineup vs. Wake Forest (Feb. 23).

Billet leads the team with 24 starts, while senior forward/center Travis Watson has started 22 times. Smith has drawn 17 starting assignments and Brown has started 16 times. Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer and freshman forward Derrick Byars have started 14 and 13 games, respectively. Vander Laan has appeared in the starting lineup 12 times and Clark has received 11 starts. Nine different players have started games this season for Virginia and eight of the nine have at least 11 starts this season.

2002-2003 UVa ACC Players of the Week

Jan. 6 – Travis Watson Jan. 13 – Todd Billet Feb. 10 – Travis Watson

Senior forward/center Travis Watson was tabbed the ACC Player of the Week on February 10 after recording double-doubles in UVa's wins over eighth-ranked Maryland (86-78 – Feb. 6) and N.C. State (61-58 – Feb. 9).

Watson, who earned the award for the second time this season, scored 30 points, grabbed 24 rebounds and had eight steals in the two games. He shot 50 percent (13-for-26) from the field and had six assists and one blocked shot. In UVa's win at Maryland, Watson scored 15 points and had 10 rebounds. Against N.C. State, Watson tallied 15 points and 14 rebounds.

Home Sweet Home

Like many ACC teams, the Cavaliers are enjoying great success playing in front of their home crowd despite their last two losses at University Hall. Ten of UVa's 14 victories this season have been at home. Prior to defeating Maryland (86-78 – Feb. 6), Virginia had lost its last five road games.

The Cavaliers are 10-2 at U-Hall this season and just 4-10 away from home, including 2-9 in away games.

Since the beginning of the 1999-2000 season, UVa is: 48-10 (82.8 percent) in all home games 22-8 (73.3 percent) in all home ACC games 15-29 (34.1 percent) in all away games 8-23 (25.8 percent) in all away ACC games 7-6 (53.8 percent) in all neutral site games

Watson Closing in on Offensive Rebound Record

Senior forward/center Travis Watson needs just four more offensive rebounds to set a new school record. Watson has pulled down 359 offensive rebounds in his career. Junior Burrough (1992-95) holds the record with 362 offensive boards. Note – offensive rebounds were not kept prior to the 1986-87 season.

A Rare ACC Road Win

Against Maryland (an 86-78 win – Feb. 6), the Cavaliers did what many ACC teams haven't been able to do this year – defeat a conference opponent on the road. Entering the UVa-Maryland game on February 6, home ACC teams had won 28 of 35 conference games and the top six teams in the league at the time (Wake Forest, Maryland, Duke, N.C. State, Virginia, and Georgia Tech) were undefeated at home – 22-0. Through games played February 26, the top four ACC teams are 26-1 in home ACC games this season.

Virginia had lost its first four ACC road contests this season and nine consecutive ACC road tilts dating back to 2001-2002.

A Top 10 Victory

In addition to earning its first ACC road win of the season and snapping a nine-game losing streak at Maryland, UVa picked up its first top-10 road victory in 10 years. With the Cavaliers' 86-78 victory over the eighth-ranked Terrapins (Feb. 6), UVa captured its first top-10 road win since defeating third-ranked Duke 77-69 on January 17, 1993 in Durham, N.C.

Scoring Slump

After scoring 85 points in back-to-back wins over Wake Forest and Florida State at the end of January, the Cavaliers have failed to reach their scoring average (74.1 ppg.) in seven of the last eight games. The only time in the last eight games UVa reached its scoring average was against Maryland (Feb. 6) in an 86-78 victory.

UVa is 2-6 in its last eight games and is averaging only 67.5 points per game. In the six losses, Virginia is averaging 65.5 points per game.

Jenifer Suspended Indefinitely

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer is suspended from the team indefinitely for conduct detrimental to the team. He will not practice or play in games during the suspension which began on February 3.

Jenifer started 14 games and played in the first 19 of the Cavaliers' games this season. He leads the team in assists (104) and is averaging 5.6 points and 3.5 rebounds a game.

In-State Winning Streak Snapped

The Cavaliers'had their 15-game winning streak against instate opponents snapped with a 73-55 loss at Virginia Tech (Jan. 21). Even with the loss to Virginia Tech, UVa's record against in-state opponents in the last 26 seasons (since 1977-78) is 106-15 for an .876 winning percentage.

Among NCAA Leaders

Senior forward/center Travis Watson is ranked among the NCAA Division I leaders in rebounding for games played through February 24. Watson is 11th among all Division I players in rebounds with an average of 10.5 per game. He is currently averaging 10.4 rebounds per game (259 in 25 games).

No Steals

The Cavaliers did not have a steal against Ohio (Feb. 26). It is the first time UVa has not recorded a steal in a game since January 4, 1998 (vs. Wake Forest). It is the ninth known time Virginia has not recorded a steal in a game since the 1957-58 season.

No Bench Points

In UVa's 73-64 loss to Clemson (Feb. 18), the Cavaliers' five starters scored all 64 points. It marked the first game this season a Virginia player did not score a point off the bench. The previous low for points off the bench in a game this season was nine points in UVa's 61-57 win over Rutgers (Dec. 21). In Virginia's last ACC game, a 75-71 loss at Wake Forest (Feb. 23), the Cavaliers only received nine points from players off the bench.

20/20

Against Wofford (Jan. 2), senior forward/center Travis Watson accomplished what no UVa player has been able to do in 20 years – register 20 or more points and rebounds in the same game. In the Cavaliers' 87-65 victory, Watson scored 21 points and pulled down a career-high 20 rebounds.

The last Virginia player to accomplish the feat was Ralph Sampson on Jan. 12, 1983 when he had 33 points and 21 rebounds against N.C. State.

Fewest Points

Virginia held N.C. State to 58 points in a 61-58 victory (Feb. 9), marking the fewest points scored by a UVa opponent in a conference game since the 1998-99 season. The Cavaliers held Wake Forest to 54 points in a 64-54 win at University Hall on February 3, 1999.

The 58 points ties for the second fewest points allowed in an ACC game during Pete Gillen's tenure at UVa. The Cavaliers also held Clemson to 58 points in a 65-58 win on January 17, 1999. That game was also played at U-Hall.

Five Score in Double Figures

The Cavaliers had five players score in double figures in their 85-72 win over Florida State (Jan. 29), marking the first time this season that happened. Senior forward/center Travis Watson led the way with 20 points, while freshman forward Derrick Byars had 15. Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward Elton Brown both scored 14 points, and sophomore forward Jason Clark added 12.

UVa also had five players reach double figures in scoring in its 78-72 loss to Ohio (Feb. 26). Billet and junior center

Nick Vander Laan both scored 15 points, while Watson had 11 points. Brown and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith both registered 10 points.

The previous time prior to this season UVa had five players score in double figures in the same game was February 28, 2002 against Duke. Roger Mason, Jr. (22), Adam Hall (21), Chris Williams (14), Watson (12) and Keith Jenifer (10) all reached double figures in the scoring column.

200

The Cavaliers' 87-65 victory (Jan. 2) over Wofford marked their 200th victory over a non-conference opponent at University Hall since the building opened for the 1965-66 season. Virginia is 200-29 for an impressive .873 winning percentage all-time in University Hall against non-conference opponents.

Billet Scores 1,000th Career Point

Junior guard Todd Billet reached the 1,000 point milestone in UVa's 79-72 win over North Carolina (Jan. 11). Billet scored his 1,000th career point with a three-point field goal with 4:15 remaining in the first half. Billet tallied 24 points in the game against North Carolina. He has scored 1,205 points in his collegiate career. Billet scored 844 points in two seasons at Rutgers and has scored a team-high 361 points this season in a Virginia uniform.

Shooting 50 Percent From the Field

The Cavaliers have shot 50 percent or better in six games this season and are only 3-3 in those games (Virginia is 11-9 when it shoots below 50 percent). The three games UVa shot 50 percent and lost, it outshot its opponent (at Duke – 50.8 to 50.0, at Clemson – 59.2 to 55.4, and at Wake Forest – 52.0 to 48.1). Virginia is one of only three ACC schools (Clemson and N.C. State are the others) this year to lose a game when shooting 50 percent or better. ACC teams are 57-5 when shooting 50 percent or better in games this year.

Four Consecutive Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson had his streak of double-doubles in four consecutive games snapped against Duke (Jan. 15). After a "drought" of three games without a double-double, Watson has notched six double-doubles in his last 10 games. His last double-double and 13th of the season came against Clemson (Feb. 18) as he had 14 points and 13 rebounds. He has reached double figures in double-doubles three consecutive seasons. See page 6 of the notes for a listing of Watson's double-doubles this season.

Watson has recorded four consecutive double-doubles three times in his career (he did it twice last season). The last Virginia player other than Watson to notch four consecutive double-doubles was in the 1997-98 season when Norman Nolan accomplished the feat. Nolan posted consecutive double-doubles against Clemson (Feb. 21) - 24 pts., 12 rebs., Maryland (Feb. 24) - 26 pts., 15 rebs., Florida State (Feb. 28) - 24 pts., 10 rebs., and Duke (Mar. 3) - 13 pts., 15 rebs.

Ralph Sampson is the last UVa player to have five consecutive double-doubles as he concluded his stellar career with five double-doubles in a row in the 1982-83 season. Sampson's career high for consecutive double-doubles is nine, but interestingly enough, that is not the school record. Norm Carmichael posted a school record 12 consecutive double-doubles in the 1967-68 season.

Watson has led UVa in rebounding in 19 of 26 games this season and is averaging ACC bests of 10.4 boards per game overall and 11.0 in ACC play. He is second on the team in scoring with an average of 13.4 points per game (14th in the ACC). Watson is shooting 50.2 percent (128-255) from the field (3rd in the ACC).

Free Throw Woes

The Cavaliers set a record for free throw futility in their loss to Virginia Tech (Jan. 21). UVa was just 1-6 (16.7 percent) from the free throw line marking their lowest known free throw percentage in a game since at least the 1963-64 season (and very possibly since the 1957-58 season). Virginia's previous known record for lowest free throw percentage in a game was 20.0 percent when it went 2-10 from the line against Kentucky Wesleyan on December 28, 1963.

The one made free throw vs. Virginia Tech ties for the fewest free throws made in a game. The Cavaliers also made only one free throw vs. Duke – 1-2 (Feb. 9, 1977); North Carolina – 1-1 (Mar. 7, 1982); and Wake Forest – 1-3 (Mar. 9, 1984).

UVa's six free throw attempts against the Hokies ties for the 14th fewest free throws attempted in a game. It is the fewest free throws Virginia has attempted in a game since attempting only three (two were made) against North Carolina on February 11, 1998 and six (five were made) against Georgia Tech on February 14, 1998.

Making Free Throws Down The Stretch

The Cavaliers have struggled from the free throw line this season, making just 66.6 percent (357-536) of their attempts from the charity stripe. However, UVa has been more reliable from the charity stripe in the final five minutes of games.

In the first half of games, Virginia is shooting 67.6 percent (127-188) from the line. UVa has made 66.1 percent (230-348) of its attempts in the second half of games. In the final five minutes of games, the Cavaliers have made 125 of 181 attempts for 69.1 percent. (UVa is only 105-167 for 62.9 percent in the first 15 minutes of the second half.) In its last 22 games, UVa has made 114 of 159 attempts from the foul line in the final five minutes of games for 71.7 percent.

Field Goal Percentage Defense

After allowing its last seven opponent's of the 2001-2002 season to shoot 50 percent or better from the field (and nine overall), the Cavaliers have allowed only five teams to shoot 50 percent or better from the field this season.

Last year, UVa opponents shot 44.2 percent from the field compared to 42.9 percent in 2002-2003. In ACC contests last season, Virginia's opponents shot 48.0 percent from the floor, versus 45.3 percent this season.

Billet Unkind to Former Team

He was booed all game long, but it didn't faze junior guard Todd Billet, who was making his return to Louis Brown Athletic Center and Rutgers on December 21. Billet, who played for Rutgers for two seasons before transferring to Virginia, scored a game-high 22 points in leading his new team to a 61-57 victory over the Scarlet Knights. Among his 22 points were a pair of free throws with 14 seconds remaining that broke a 57-57 tie and gave the Cavaliers the lead for good.

In two seasons at Rutgers, Billet averaged 14.6 points per game, including 16.6 per game in 2000-01. He also

established a school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 in 2000-01.

Billet leads the team in scoring this season with 13.9 points per game (12th in the ACC). He is averaging a teamhigh 15.9 points per game in ACC play (tied for 7th in the ACC). Billet tops the Cavaliers in three-point field goals (73) and is fourth among all ACC players in free throw shooting (74-86 for 86.0 percent).

Eight Consecutive Double Figure Rebounding Games

Senior Travis Watson had his streak of eight consecutive double figure rebounding games snapped in UVa's loss to Wake Forest (Feb. 23). Dating back to the 1966-67 season, Watson's streak tied for the third longest by a UVa player. Here's a list of consecutive double figure rebounding games by a UVa player since 1966-67.

Watson 19th All-Time Among ACC Players in Rebounding

Senior forward/center Travis Watson is tied for 19th all-time among ACC players in career rebounds. Watson has 1,053 rebounds and is tied with Maryland's Len Elmore (1972-74) for 19th place. Watson needs 10 rebounds to move past North Carolina's Billy Cunningham (1963-65) into 18th place. N.C. State's Tom Burleson (1972-74) and Duke's Randy Denton (1969-71) are 17th and 16th with 1,066 and 1,067 rebounds, respectively.

More Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has picked up where he left off last season as he has recorded 13 double-doubles this season. With the 13 double-doubles, Watson leads all ACC players in that category. Watson has 51 in his career which trails only Ralph Sampson's school record 84 career double-doubles.

Watson's 51 career double-doubles are the most of any active ACC player. Watson, who recorded an ACC-best 17 double-doubles last year, also had double-doubles in both of UVa's 2002-2003 exhibition games.

Duke Ties a Record

In UVa's game against Duke (Jan. 15), the Blue Devils made 37 of 40 free throws (92.5 percent) with the 37 made free throws tying the school record for most free throws made in a game by a Virginia opponent. St. Joseph's (Pa.) made 37 free throws (43 attempts) against UVa on February 21, 1958.

Raining Threes

UVa set a season-high by making 12 three-point field goals in its 86-78 win over Maryland (Feb. 6). The 12 made threes ties for the 10th-highest single game total in school history.

The Cavaliers made 11 threes in four games this season before draining 12 against the Terrapins. Virginia has made 193 three-pointers this season and is averaging 7.42 per game (3rd in the ACC). The Cavaliers are shooting 37.0 percent (193-521) from three-point land overall and 38.0 percent (101-266) in ACC contests.

UVa's 37.0 three-point field goal percentage is currently the highest single season mark since the three-point field goal was instituted in the 1986-87 season (UVa shot 46.8 percent – 58-124 – in the 1982-83 season when the three-point field goal was used as an experimental rule). In 2000-2001, Virginia made 36.9 percent (204-553) of its three-point attempts.

The Cavaliers' 193 made three-point field goals are the sixth highest total in school history. The 1994-95 UVa team holds the school record with 232 made three-pointers.

Harper Reinstated

Sophomore guard Jermaine Harper was reinstated to the team December 12 after being suspended for a violation of team rules. Harper missed the Cavaliers' first five games of the season. He did not practice during the suspension.

In the 21 games Harper has played he is averaging 4.2 points and 1.4 rebounds per game. He is averaging 13.3

minutes of playing time per game. Harper made his first start of the 2002-03 season against Duke (Feb. 15) and tallied eight points and two rebounds in 25 minutes.

In UVa's win at Maryland (Feb. 6), Harper made two critical three-pointers late in the second half to help propel the Cavaliers to the victory. He also made a key three-pointer with UVa trailing by four with just over five minutes remaining in Virginia's 61-58 win over N.C. State (Feb. 9).

Smith Scores 30

Sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith scored a UVa career-high 30 points against Clemson (Feb. 18). He made 10-18 field goal attempts, including a career-best six three-pointers. Smith also had seven rebounds in 37 minutes of playing time.

Smith's previous Virginia career-best was 24 points versus Michigan State (Dec. 4). He is third on the team in scoring at 11.0 points per game. Smith is also averaging 11.0 points per game in ACC play.

Vander Laan Joins Growing List

Junior center Nick Vander Laan set a UVa career-high in scoring with 17 points in Virginia's 72-65 win over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous UVa best was 10 points against then 19th-ranked Indiana (Nov. 27). Vander Laan's overall career-high is 23 points against Oklahoma in the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

Vander Laan set a UVa career-best in rebounds with 11 vs. Rutgers (Dec. 21). His previous season-high was eight rebounds on two occasions. Vander Laan's overall career best rebounding game is 13 against Washington during the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

He blocked three shots in UVa's win over N.C. State (Feb. 9) to set a career-high in that category.

Byars Joins Career High Club

Freshman forward Derrick Byars became another in a long line of Cavaliers to set a career high in scoring. Byars registered career-highs in back-to-back games. Byars scored 16 points, including 14 in the second half, in UVa's 84-76 win over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17). He then scored a game-high 20 points in the Cavaliers' 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous career high was 11 points against Indiana (Nov. 27).

Byars also registered a career-high five steals against Gardner-Webb. His previous career-best was two steals against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet Nets UVa Career Bests

Junior guard Todd Billet scored a Virginia career-high 28 points in UVa's game against Michigan State (Dec. 4). Billet poured in 28 points off the bench – including 26 in the second half. His career-high is 37 points against James Madison during the 2000-2001 season while playing at Rutgers University. He is averaging 13.9 points per game this season (first on the team). Billet set a Virginia career-best with eight assists against Maryland (Feb. 6). His overall career high is 11 vs. Pittsburgh (Feb. 11, 2001) while playing for Rutgers.

New Career High for Clark

Sophomore forward Jason Clark scored 12 points – all in the second half – in the Cavaliers' 90-86 win over Long Island (Nov. 22) to establish a new career high. Clark equaled his career high with 12 points against Rutgers (Dec. 21) in his first start of the season. He also scored 12 points versus Florida State (Jan. 29). Clark also blocked a season-high five shots and grabbed a season-best eight rebounds vs. Rutgers. Clark's former career-best was 11 points against Duke (Jan. 27, 2002).

Clark also set a career-high with three assists against N.C. State (Feb. 9).

50th ANNIVERSARY OF THE ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference is celebrating its 50th anniversary this season. Former University of Virginia standouts **Jeff Lamp**, **Barry Parkhill** and **Ralph Sampson** were named to the 50th Anniversary ACC Men's Basketball Team.

Sampson was also recently named as one of the top 50 male ACC athletes of all-time.

Lamp lettered four times for Virginia from 1978-81, and was a first-team All-America selection in 1980 and 1981. He helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1981 NCAA East Regional and was an All-Tournament selection at the 1981 Final Four. A team captain during his UVa career, Lamp ranks second on Virginia's all-time scoring list with 2,317 points. Lamp was a first-round selection by the Portland Trail Blazers in the 1981 NBA Draft.

Parkhill lettered for Virginia from 1971-73 and was a first-team All-America selection in 1972 and 1973. He was selected the ACC Basketball Player of the Year and the ACC Athlete of the Year in 1972. Parkhill earned first-team All-ACC honors in 1972 and was a second-team All-Conference selection in 1971 and 1973. He was also an All-ACC Tournament selection in 1971 and 1972. He holds Virginia's single-game scoring record with 51 points against Baldwin-Wallace on December 11, 1971. Parkhill was a first-round draft selection by both the Virginia Squires (ABA) and Portland Trail Blazers (NBA) after his collegiate career.

Sampson lettered four times for Virginia from 1980-83, and was a three-time National and ACC Player of the Year. He was a four-time first-team All-America selection and a three-time first-team All-ACC selection. Sampson received three consecutive Rupp trophies, two consecutive Eastman Awards and two John R.Wooden Awards. He was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 1980. Sampson helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1980 NIT. Sampson holds Virginia career records for rebounds (1,511), field goals made (899) and blocked shots (462). He led the ACC in rebounding three times and ranks fourth on UVa's career scoring list with 2,228 points. Sampson was selected by the Houston Rockets as the NBA's number one draft choice in 1983 and went on to earn NBA Rookie of the Year honors.

Brown Nets New Career High for Points

Sophomore forward Elton Brown established a new career high for points in a game when he scored 22 in UVa's 86-72 victory over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Brown, who surpassed his old career best of 20 points against Georgia Tech (Jan. 22, 2002), made eight of 13 shots from the floor and five of seven attempts from the charity stripe.

Making the Most of His Opportunities

Sophomore forward Jason Clark has only taken 69 shots this season, but he's made 50 baskets for an impressive .725 field goal percentage. He is shooting 73.5 percent (25-34) in ACC games this season. Clark has shot 50 percent or better in every game excluding the four games (Indiana – Nov. 27, East Tennessee State – Dec. 17, Wofford – Jan. 2, and North Carolina – Feb. 12) he did not attempt a field goal. Clark has been perfect from the field 10 times this season. He is shooting 65.2 percent (90-138) from the field in his career. In ACC contests during his career, Clark is 52-71 for an amazing 73.2 percent.

Billet Heating Up

In his last 14 games, junior guard Todd Billet has scored 218 points for an average of 15.6 points per game (and 197 points – 16.4 points per game in his last 12 ACC games).

Billet has started at point guard the last 10 games and averaged 4.5 assists per game. He had a UVa career-high eight assists against Maryland (Feb. 6) and dished out seven assists with no turnovers against N.C. State (Feb. 9).

Billet is averaging 13.9 points per game overall (12th in the ACC) and 15.9 points per ACC contest (tied for 7th in the ACC). On the season, Billet has made 73 three-point field goals overall (2.81 per game – 3rd in the ACC) and is averaging a league-best 3.23 three-pointers per game in conference tilts. Billet is shooting 39.9 percent from behind the arc (7th in the ACC). In ACC play, he has made 42 of 95 three-point attempts (44.2 percent – 3rd in the ACC).

Billet made seven three-pointers against Clemson (Jan. 18) which ties for the sixth highest single game total in school history.

Watson Sets Single Season Career Highs

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has set single season career highs in two categories this season – but interestingly enough – not in rebounds, points or blocked shots, but in assists and steals. Watson has handed out 56 assists to easily surpass his former best of 31 assists last season. He has come up with 35 steals (including 14 in his last eight games) this season. Watson's previous season high for steals was 32 last year.

Brown Finds His Touch

In his last 14 games, sophomore forward Elton Brown has scored 161 points for an average of 11.5 points per game and is shooting 54.6 percent (65-119) from the field. In his last 11 ACC games, Brown has made 54 of 95 attempts from the floor (56.8 percent).

Brown is averaging 10.3 points per game overall and 11.8 points per game in ACC play. In ACC games, he is shooting 53.9 percent (62-115) from the field and 50.2 percent (108-215) overall.

Single Season Three-Point Field Goal Leaders

Junior guard Todd Billet has made 73 three-point field goals this season and is seventh on the Cavaliers' single season three-point field goals list.

Transfers Making Big Impact

Virginia's three transfers – junior guard Todd Billet (Rutgers), junior center Nick Vander Laan (California-Berkeley), and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith (Coffeyville Community College) – have made a big impact on the team in 2002-03. The trio have combined to start 53 times and average 30.7 points and 10.8 rebounds per game. Billet and Smith have made 121 of UVa's 193 three-point field goals (62.7 percent) this season as well. Billet also leads UVa in free throw percentage (.860 – 74-86) and Smith is second (.822 – 37-45).

Billet and Vander Laan are eligible to play for the Cavaliers during the 2002-03 season after transferring to Virginia prior to the 2001-02 academic year.

Billet, a 6-0 guard from Middletown, N.J., started all 58 games and averaged 14.6 points per game in his two seasons at Rutgers. He is a three-point specialist who established the Rutgers' school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 and tied the school's single-game record when he made eight three-pointers against Lafayette during the 2000-01 season.

Vander Laan, a 6-10 center from Sacramento, Calif., averaged 7.5 points and 6.1 rebounds a game in two seasons at California-Berkeley. He was voted honorable mention Pac-10 All-Freshman following the 1999-2000 season.

The 6-5 Smith averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds per game while earning first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in 2001-02.

Cavaliers Finish Second in Maui Invitational

Virginia won two of three games to finish second in the 2002 EA Sports Maui Invitational (Nov. 25-27) at the Lahaina Civic Center in Maui, Hawaii. The Cavaliers defeated Chaminade 86-72 (Nov. 25) and 15th-ranked Kentucky 75-61 (Nov. 26) before falling to 19th-ranked Indiana 70-63 (Nov. 27) in the championship game.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson was named to the All-Tournament team. Watson registered two double-doubles and averaged 12.7 points and 11.0 rebounds in the three games. He also blocked nine shots and added seven assists and five steals.

Tough Early Season Schedule

The Cavaliers played three nationally-ranked teams (Kentucky, Indiana and Michigan State) in their first five games of the season. It is the first time in school history the Cavaliers played three of their first five games of a season against ranked teams. In the 1963-64, 1968-69, 1991-92 and

1996-97 seasons, UVa played two ranked teams in the first five games of the season.

Virginia Returns to Postseason Play

The University of Virginia men's basketball team received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2001-02 regular season. UVa lost to South Carolina 74-67 in the first round of the tournament. It was the

Cavaliers' ninth NIT appearance and the team's third consecutive postseason appearance. Following the 2000-2001 season, UVa received a bid to the 2001 NCAA Tournament. UVa lost to Gonzaga 86-85 in the first round of the 2001 NCAA South Region Tournament. The game marked the Cavaliers first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997. Virginia made the first of three straight postseason appearances with a bid to the 2000 National Invitation Tournament (NIT). UVa lost to Georgetown 115-111 in triple overtime in the first round of the NIT.

Jenifer Sets Career Highs

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer became the third returning player to establish a new career high in scoring this season. Jenifer tallied 13 points in UVa's 75-61 victory over Kentucky (Nov. 26). His previous career high was 10 points against Duke (Feb. 28) last season.

Jenifer has also set a new career high for assists. He handed out a career-best seven assists in the season-opener against Long Island (Nov. 22) and then increased his career high to eight against Indiana (Nov. 27). He equaled his career-best with eight assists against Wofford (Jan. 2) and then against Florida State (Jan. 29).

With nine rebounds against Rutgers (Dec. 21), Jenifer set a new career high in that category. His previous career high for rebounds was five on two occasions.

Jenifer Sets Career-High

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer has handed out 104 assists (5.5 per game) this season and has surpassed his previous career high of 80. Jenifer has a 2.0 to 1 assist to turnover ratio this season. He possesses a 2.43 to 1 assist to turnover ratio in ACC play.

Jenifer has had five or more assists in 14 games this season. He has not had more turnovers than assists in any game this season.

Bench Scoring - 48, 47, 46, 43

Virginia's reserves have played a major role in several of the Cavaliers' wins this season. Reserves have combined to score 46 or more points in three victories this season. UVa's bench was also a key factor in UVa's 86-78 victory over Maryland (Feb. 6).

Four Cavaliers off the bench combined to score 48 of UVa's 72 points in a 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). The 48 points are the most this season scored by players off UVa's bench. Freshman forward Derrick Byars and junior center Nick Vander Laan scored 20 and 17 points, respectively.

The previous 2002-2003 high was 47 points in an 86-72 win over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Sophomore forward Elton Brown led the way with 22 points, while sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith added 16 points.

UVa's bench came through again in a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) as the four players who came off the bench combined to score 46 points. Senior forward/center Travis Watson led the way with 16 points, while Brown tallied 14 points.

Four players came off the bench to scored 43 points – half the team's total – in an 86-78 victory at Maryland (Feb. 6). Smith led all UVa scorers with 17 points, while junior guard Majestic Mapp added 11 points.

Two Busy Weeks After Final Exams

After a 13-day break for final exams, the Cavaliers won three games in a span of five days. UVa won the first two games of the stretch – 84-76 over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17) and 72-65 over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19) – at home in University Hall. UVa closed out the stretch with a 61-57 victory at Rutgers (Dec. 21).

Virginia then won three home games in a span of six days. UVa began its homestand with a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) and posted a 77-58 win over Liberty (Dec. 30). The Cavaliers closed their homestand with an 87-65 victory over Wofford (Jan. 2).

Rod Jensen Joins Coaching Staff

Rod Jensen, formerly the head men's basketball coach at Boise State University, joined the University of Virginia's men's basketball coaching staff during the summer. Jensen joined the staff after Tom Herrion left Virginia to become the head coach at the College of Charleston. Other members of head coach Pete Gillen's staff include assistant coaches Walt Fuller and Alexis Sherard, and director of men's basketball operations Scott Shepherd.

Cavaliers Welcome Six Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 6-7 freshman forward Derrick Byars and 6-5 sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith

Byars, a three-year letterman at Ridgeway High School in Memphis, Tenn., averaged 23.2 points, 10 rebounds and 4.5 assists per game as a high school senior during the 2001-02 season. He shot 37 percent from three-point range and 77 percent from the free throw line. He was a fourth-team *Parade* All-America selection and the Gatorade Player of the Year in Tennessee as a high school senior.

Smith earned first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in Coffeyville, Kan., last season. During the 2001-02 season he averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds a game, shot 51.8 percent (251-485) from the field, including 45.8 percent (108-236) from three-point range, and made 90.2 percent (129-143) of his free throw attempts.

Four additional players joined the Virginia team after participating in open tryouts October 7-8. The players are guard Billy Campbell (6-0, Fr., Atlanta, Ga.), forward Greg Harrell-Edge (6-8, Sr., Vienna, Va.), guard Robert Lodge (6-4, Fr., Raleigh, N.C.) and forward Rob Williams (6-7, So., Martinsville, Va.). Watson Named Candidate for CLASS Award

Senior All-America candidate Travis Watson was one of 36 candidates for the second annual Senior CLASS Award as announced by the award's organizing committee. He is not one of the 10 finalists. The Senior CLASS Award – an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School – is presented annually to the nation's senior player-of-the-year for NCAA Division I men's and women's basketball. The award was developed in response to the recent trend of college basketball players leaving college early to turn professional.

Selection criteria is based on a number of factors, the most important being that the recipient must have exhausted his four years of eligibility and have fulfilled his commitment to

his respective university. In addition, the recipient must be working toward his degree, be in good academic standing and be of sound moral character.

The ten finalists will be on the official ballot during the national voting process in March. The winners will be announced during the respective NCAA Final Four events.

Virginia Suffers Setback at Ohio

In its final non-conference regular season game of the season, Virginia lost to Ohio 78-72 (Feb. 26) at the Convo Center in Athens, Ohio. The Bobcats shot 51.1 percent (23-45) from the field, including an impressive 60.0 percent (9-15) from three-point range.

The Cavaliers had five players score in double figures with junior guard Todd Billet and junior center Nick Vander Laan leading the way with 15 points apiece. Vander Laan was a perfect 7-7 from the field and added eight rebounds, while Billet contributed five assists. Senior forward/center Travis Watson scored 11 points, while sophomore forward Elton Brown and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith both tallied 10 points.

UVa trailed by as many as nine points (35-26) in the first half, but concluded the first half on an 8-1 run to cut the deficit to two points (36-34) at the intermission.

The Cavaliers took the lead, 46-45, with 16:13 remaining in the game on a dunk by sophomore forward Jason Clark. It proved to be the final time UVa led in the game, as Ohio quickly built its lead up to six points, 52-46. Virginia twice pulled within one point, including 54-53 with 11:34 to play, but could never recapture the lead. The Bobcats made 16 of 20 free throws in the final 10 minutes to help seal the win.

The Cavaliers shot a respectable 48.3 percent (28-58) from the field in the game and also outrebounded Ohio 31-26, including 12-5 on the offensive glass. UVa committed 13 turnovers in the game while Ohio had just eight. The Cavaliers did not register a steal in the game.

Steve Esterkamp led the Bobcats with 31 points and three steals. Jaivon Harris had 15 points, while Brandon Hunter added 14 points and seven rebounds. Hunter entered the game leading the nation in rebounds with 13.3 per game.

UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their 2002-2003 exhibition games. Virginia posted an 84-60 victory over Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 10) and a 73-57 exhibition win over One World All-Stars (Nov. 17) at University Hall.

Against Big Apple Basketball, the Cavaliers' starting front court of senior forward/center Travis Watson, junior center Nick Vander Laan and sophomore forward Elton Brown combined for 69 points and 47 rebounds.

Watson picked up where he left off last year and recorded a double-double with a game-high 32 points and 17 rebounds. Watson connected on 14 of 22 shots from the field, including three of six attempts from three-point range. In his first game as a Cavalier, Vander Laan grabbed a game-high 24 rebounds, including 13 offensive, and added 14 points for a double-double. Brown made 10 of 20 attempts from the field en route to 23 points. He also pulled down six rebounds. Junior guard Todd Billet rounded out UVa's double digit scorers with 13 points. He also contributed five rebounds and three assists. Watson, Brown, Vander Laan and Billet combined to score 82 of UVa's 84 points.

The Cavaliers used just eight players in the game as

sophomores Jason Clark, Jermaine Harper and Keith Jenifer were serving a one-game suspension for a violation of team rules. Junior Majestic Mapp, sophomore Devin Smith and freshman Derrick Byars missed the game with injuries.

In the 73-57 win over One World All-Stars, Watson registered a double-double with 16 points and 16 rebounds to lead the Cavaliers. He also blocked four shots. Billet led all scorers with 17 points and also recorded a game-high seven assists. Vander Laan and Smith rounded out UVa's double figure scorers. Vander Laan scored 12 points and added seven rebounds, two blocked shots and two assists. In his first game for the Cavaliers, Smith tallied 11 points.

One World All-Stars built a five-point lead (40-35) early in the second half, only to see the Cavaliers quickly respond with baskets by Watson, Billet and Vander Laan. UVa took the lead for good midway through the second half when sophomore forward Elton Brown converted a layup off an offensive rebound to give the Cavaliers a 51-50 lead.

Cavaliers Ink Two

University of Virginia men's head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-6 Gary Forbes of Brooklyn, N.Y., and 6-3 J. R. Reynolds of Roanoke, Va.

Forbes, a guard, averaged 25 points, 11 rebounds and five assists a game as a junior during the 2001-02 season at Benjamin Banneker Academy.

Reynolds, a combination guard, started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic High School before transferring to Oak Hill Academy for his senior year. He scored 2,237 points, made 217 three-point field goals and had 570 assists during his career at Roanoke Catholic. He was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times.

"We are thrilled to officially have these two young men join our Virginia basketball family," Gillen said. "They are both very talented guards who can play a couple of positions. I sincerely feel they will be impact players on our team next season."

Watson Looks Toward Senior Year

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has been named to the Wooden Award Preseason All-American Basketball Team and is also a preseason Naismith Award candidate. Watson is a third-team preseason All-America selection by *Street & Smith's* and is rated sixth nationally at center in *Lindy's* preseason basketball magazine. Watson added to his already impressive career at UVa by being named to the All-ACC second team after the 2001-02 season. He led the ACC in four statistical categories last season: double-doubles (17), rebounds (9.7 rpg), offensive rebounds (3.43 pg), and defensive rebounds (6.29 pg).

At the ACC's annual Operation Basketball, Watson was selected to the conference's 2002-03 Pre-Season First Team. He received 85 votes, the most of any player. Watson was also second to Duke's Chris Duhon in the Pre-Season ACC Player of the Year voting.

Twelve Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 29 regular-season games before the 2003 ACC Tournament, 12 are against eight teams that participated in either the 2002 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). Two of the games are against national champion Maryland. The Cavaliers also meet league foes Duke, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice. Those teams all participated in last season's NCAA Tournament. In addition to those games, Virginia has played Michigan State, an NCAA participant and Rutgers, which earned an NIT bid.

At the Maui Invitational (November 25-27), UVa played Kentucky (NCAA) and Indiana (NCAA runners-up).

UVa is 5-6 in 2002-2003 against teams that competed in postseason play last season.
