## OFFICIALS

## THE GAME

Virginia (2001-2002: 17-12/7-9 ACC) stands at 4-2 this season. In its last game, UVa defeated East Tennessee State 84-76 Tuesday (Dec. 17) at University Hall. Gardner-Webb (2001-2002: 23-9), which is in its first season in the Atlantic Sun Conference, is 1-5 in 20022003. The Runnin' Bulldogs are coming off a 71-61 loss at Clemson (Dec. 14).

## The Series vs. Gardner-Webb

Tonight's game is the first meeting between Virginia and GardnerWebb in men's basketball. The Runnin' Bulldogs are in their third season as a Division I team and their first season as a member of the Atlantic Sun Conference.

## Virginia vs. the Atlantic Sun Conference

Tonight's contest is only Virginia's second game against a current team from the Atlantic Sun Conference (formerly the Trans America Athletic Conference - 1979-2001). UVa's first game was against Samford in 1989, an 87-61 victory at University Hall (Nov. 28).

Of the Atlantic Sun's current membership ( 12 teams), the Cavaliers are $6-1$ all-time. UVa is $3-0$ vs. Jacksonville, 1-0 vs. Belmont and Samford, and $1-1$ vs. Stetson. Virginia has never faced the eight other league schools: Campbell, Central Florida, Florida Atlantic, Gardner-Webb, Georgia State, Jacksonville State, Mercer or Troy State.

A total of 25 schools have been members of the Atlantic Sun Conference at one time or another since 1979. The Cavaliers are 7-1 all-time against teams with Atlantic Sun affiliations. Nicholls State is the only former member of the Atlantic Sun the Cavaliers have played.

## Cavalier Captains

Seniors Travis Watson and Jason Rogers, and junior Majestic Mapp are the captains of the 2002-03 Virginia basketball team.

## Harper Reinstated

Sophomore guard Jermaine Harper has been reinstated to the team after being suspended for a violation of team rules. Harper missed the Cavaliers' first five games of the season. He did not practice during the suspension.

## Two Starting Times Changed

The starting times for Virginia's games at Rutgers on December 21 and at Virginia Tech on January 21 have been changed. The Rutgers game will begin at 8:00 p.m. and the Virginia Tech contest will start at 7:30 p.m.

## Non-Conference Teams at University Hall

Virginia is 196-29 (.871) all-time in University Hall against non-conference opponents since the building opened for the 1965-66 season. The Cavaliers have won 78 of their last 88 home games against non-conference opponents dating back to the 1989-90 season. UVa had its 15-game home winning streak against non-conference opponents snapped with a 7467 loss to South Carolina in the first round of the 2002 National Invitation Tournament (Mar. 13). Virginia's previous home non-conference loss was also in the NIT as the Cavaliers fell to Georgetown 115-111 in triple overtime in the first round of the 2000 NIT (Mar. 15).

The last time UVa lost a regular season home game to a non-conference opponent was December 12, 1998 when the Cavaliers fell to 12th-ranked St. John's 95-68. Virginia has won 24 consecutive regular season home games against non-conference foes.

## Tough Early Season Schedule

The Cavaliers played three nationally-ranked teams (Kentucky, Indiana and Michigan State) in their first five games of the season. It is the first time in school history the Cavaliers have played three of their first five games of a season against ranked teams. In the 1963-64, 1968-69, 1991-92 and 1996-97 seasons, UVa played two ranked teams in the first five games of the season.

## Head Coach Pete Gillen

Pete Gillen is in his 18th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 348-179 record for a .660 winning percentage. Gillen is in his fifth season at Virginia and has posted a $74-51$ record (. 592 winning percentage). Gillen won the 300th game of his career when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 87-85 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 14 times in 17 seasons (nine NCAA, five NIT), including the last three seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times - all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

## A Busy Week After Final Exams

After a 13-day break for final exams, the Cavaliers are in the midst of a stretch of three games in five days. UVa won the first game of the stretch 84-76 over East Tennessee State Tuesday (Dec. 17) in University Hall. After hosting GardnerWebb tonight, UVa plays at Rutgers on Saturday (Dec. 21).

The Cavaliers then host three games in six days after Christmas. UVa hosts Georgetown on December 28, Liberty on December 30 and Wofford on January 2 before the start of ACC play on January 5 (at N.C. State).

## Cavaliers Finish Second in Maui Invitational

Virginia won two of three games to finish second in the 2002 EASports Maui Invitational (Nov. 25-27) at the Lahaina Civic Center in Maui, Hawaii. The Cavaliers defeated Chaminade 86-72 (Nov. 25) and 15th-ranked Kentucky 75-61 (Nov. 26) before falling to 19th-ranked Indiana 70-63 (Nov. 27) in the championship game.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson was named to the All-Tournament team. Watson registered two double-doubles and averaged 12.7 points and 11.0 rebounds in the three games. He also blocked nine shots and added seven assists and five steals.

## 'Hoos Starting

The Cavaliers have played six games this season and have used six different starting lineups. The only player to start all six games this season is senior forward/center Travis Watson. Junior guard Todd Billet and freshman forward Derrick Byars have both started five of six games.
Sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith and sophomore guard Keith Jenifer have registered four starts apiece.

## More Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has picked up where he left off last season as he recorded double-doubles in three of the first six games of the season. With the three doubledoubles, Watson has 41 in his career which trails only Ralph

Sampson's school record 84 career double-doubles. Watson opened the season with 26 points and 13 rebounds in UVa's 90-86 win over Long Island (Nov. 22). He tallied 16 points and 14 boards in the Cavaliers' 86-72 victory over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Watson notched his third double-double of the season with 14 points and 11 rebounds against Indiana (Nov. 27). Watson's 41 career double-doubles are the most of any active ACC player. Watson, who recorded an ACC-best 17 double-doubles last year, also had double-doubles in both of UVa's 2002-2003 exhibition games.

## Coming on Strong

Virginia has gotten off to a slow start in its games this season, but has come on strong in the second half. The Cavaliers have been outscored by seven points (210-203) in the first half of games this season. The second half is a different story as UVa has outscored its opponents by 33 points (270-237). Virginia is averaging 33.8 points in the opening half and 45.0 points in the final stanza of games this season.

UVa also shoots the ball much better in the second half. The Cavaliers are shooting 42.4 percent $(78-184)$ from the field in the first half compared to 50.6 percent (89-176) in the second. Virginia has only eclipsed 50 percent shooting in the first half of a game once this season (66.7 percent - 18-27 vs. Long Island). In the second half, UVa has shot 56 percent or better in four of six contests, including 65.4 percent -17 26 against Chaminade).

## Byars Joins Career High Club

Freshman forward Derrick Byars became the latest Cavalier to set a career high in scoring (see notes below). Byars scored 16 points, including 14 in the second half, in UVa's 84-76 win over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17). His previous career high was 11 points against Indiana (Nov. 27).

## Billet and Smith Net UVa Career Bests

Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward/guard Devin Smith scored career-highs as Cavaliers in UVa's game against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet poured in 28 points off the bench - including 26 in the second half. His career-high is 37 points against James Madison during the 2000-2001 season while playing at Rutgers University. He is averaging a team-high 14.8 points per game this season.

Smith scored 24 points against the Spartans. He was 913 from the floor, including 4-6 from three-point range, and made both of his free throw attempts. Smith is third on the team in scoring at 13.8 points per game.

## New Career High for Clark

Sophomore forward Jason Clark scored 12 points - all in the second half - in the Cavaliers' 90-86 win over Long Island (Nov. 22) to establish a new career high. Clark's former career-best was 11 points against Duke (Jan. 27, 2002). He made four of six shots from the field and four of five attempts from the free throw line.

## Brown Nets New Career High for Points

Sophomore forward Elton Brown established a new career high for points in a game when he scored 22 in UVa's 86-72 victory over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Brown, who surpassed his old career best of 20 points against Georgia Tech (Jan. 22, 2002), made eight of 13 shots from the floor and five
of seven attempts from the charity stripe.

## Jenifer Sets Career Highs

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer became the third returning player to establish a new career high in scoring this season. Jenifer tallied 13 points in UVa's 75-61 victory over Kentucky (Nov. 26). His previous career high was 10 points against Duke (Feb. 28) last season.

Jenifer has also set a new career high for assists. He handed out a career-best seven assists in the season-opener against Long Island (Nov. 22) and then increased his career high to eight against Indiana (Nov. 27).

## Virginia Returns to Postseason Play

The University of Virginia men's basketball team received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2001-02 regular season. UVa lost to South Carolina 74-67 in the first round of the tournament. It was the Cavaliers' ninth NIT appearance and the team's third consecutive postseason appearance. Following the 2000-2001 season, UVa received a bid to the 2001 NCAA Tournament. UVa lost to Gonzaga 86-85 in the first round of the 2001 NCAA South Region Tournament. The game marked the Cavaliers first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997. Virginia made the first of three straight postseason appearances with a bid to the 2000 National Invitation Tournament (NIT). UVa lost to Georgetown 115-111 in triple overtime in the first round of the NIT.

## 50th Anniversary of the ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference is celebrating its 50th anniversary this season. Former University of Virginia standouts Jeff Lamp, Barry Parkhill and Ralph Sampson were named to the 50th Anniversary ACC Men's Basketball Team.

Lamp lettered four times for Virginia from 1978-81, and was a first-team All-America selection in 1980 and 1981. He helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1981 NCAA East Regional and was an AllTournament selection at the 1981 Final Four. A team captain during his UVa career, Lamp ranks second on Virginia's alltime scoring list with 2,317 points. Lamp was a first-round selection by the Portland Trail Blazers in the 1981 NBA Draft.

Parkhill lettered for Virginia from 1971-73 and was a firstteam All-America selection in 1972 and 1973. He was selected the ACC Basketball Player of the Year and the ACC Athlete of the Year in 1972. Parkhill earned first-team All-ACC honors in 1972 and was a second-team All-Conference selection in 1971 and 1973. He was also an All-ACC Tournament selection in 1971 and 1972. He holds Virginia's single-game scoring record with 51 points against Baldwin-Wallace on December 11, 1971. Parkhill was a first-round draft selection by both the Virginia Squires (ABA) and Portland Trail Blazers (NBA) after his collegiate career.

Sampson lettered four times for Virginia from 1980-83, and was a three-time National and ACC Player of the Year. He was a four-time first-team All-America selection and a three-time first-team All-ACC selection. Sampson received three consecutive Rupp trophies, two consecutive Eastman Awards and two John R.Wooden Awards. He was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 1980. Sampson helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the

1980 NIT. Sampson holds Virginia career records for rebounds (1,511), field goals made (899) and blocked shots (462). He led the ACC in rebounding three times and ranks fourth on UVa's career scoring list with 2,228 points.
Sampson was selected by the Houston Rockets as the NBA's number one draft choice in 1983 and went on to earn NBA Rookie of the Year honors.

## Rod Jensen Joins Coaching Staff

Rod Jensen, formerly the head men's basketball coach at Boise State University, joined the University of Virginia's men's basketball coaching staff during the summer. Jensen joined the staff after Tom Herrion left Virginia to become the head coach at the College of Charleston. Other members of head coach Pete Gillen's staff include assistant coaches Walt Fuller and Alexis Sherard, and director of men's basketball operations Scott Shepherd.

## Transfers Ready to Play

Guard Todd Billet (Rutgers) and center Nick Vander Laan (California-Berkeley) are eligible to play for the Cavaliers during the 2002-03 season after transferring to Virginia prior to the 2001-02 academic year.

Billet is a 6-0 guard from Middletown, N.J. He started all 58 games and averaged 14.6 points per game in his two seasons at Rutgers. He is a three-point specialist who established the Rutgers' school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 and tied the school's single-game record when he made eight three-pointers against Lafayette during the 200001 season.

Vander Laan is a 6-10 center from Sacramento, Calif. He transferred to Virginia from California-Berkeley where he averaged 7.5 points and 6.1 rebounds a game in two seasons.
He was voted honorable mention Pac-10 All-Freshman following the 1999-2000 season.

## Cavaliers Welcome Six Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 6-7 freshman forward Derrick Byars and 6-5 sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith.

Byars, a three-year letterman at Ridgeway High School in Memphis, Tenn., averaged 23.2 points, 10 rebounds and 4.5 assists per game as a high school senior during the 2001-02 season. He shot 37 percent from three-point range and 77 percent from the free throw line. He was a fourth-team Parade All-America selection and the Gatorade Player of the Year in Tennessee as a high school senior.

Smith earned first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in Coffeyville, Kan., last season. During the 2001-02 season he averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds a game, shot 51.8 percent (251-485) from the field, including 45.8 percent (108236) from three-point range, and made 90.2 percent (129143) of his free throw attempts.

Four additional players joined the Virginia team after participating in open tryouts October 7-8. The players are guard Billy Campbell (6-0, Fr., Atlanta, Ga.), forward Greg HarrellEdge (6-8, Sr., Vienna, Va.), guard Robert Lodge (6-4, Fr., Raleigh, N.C.) and forward Rob Williams (6-7, So., Martinsville, Va.). ## Watson Named Candidate for CLASS Award

Senior All-America candidate Travis Watson is one of 36 candidates for the second annual Senior CLASS Award as announced by the award's organizing committee. The Senior CLASS Award - an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School - is presented annually to the nation's senior player-of-the-year for NCAA Division I men's and women's basketball. The award was developed in response to the recent trend of college basketball players leaving college early to turn professional.

Selection criteria is based on a number of factors, the most important being that the recipient must have exhausted his four years of eligibility and have fulfilled his commitment to his respective university. In addition, the recipient must be working toward his degree, be in good academic standing and be of sound moral character.

Ten finalists will appear on the official ballot during the national voting process in March. The winners will be announced during the respective NCAA Final Four events.

## Watson Moves Up to Fourth in Rebounds

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has opened the 20022003 season by grabbing 60 rebounds ( 10.0 per game) in the Cavaliers' first six games. He now stands fourth on Virginia's career rebounding list with 854. Watson needs six rebounds to move past Bryant Stith (1989-92) into third place.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson is 28th on the Cavaliers' all-time scoring list with 1,188 career points. He needs 31 points to move past Jim Miller (1982-85) for 27th place.

## Strong Second Half Propels UVa Over ETSU

The Cavaliers erased a four-point halftime deficit, in part by shooting 57.7 percent (15-26) from the field in the second half, in posting an 84-76 victory over East Tennessee State Tuesday (Dec. 17) at University Hall.

Freshman forward Derrick Byars registered 14 of his career-high 16 points in the second half to help UVa outscore the Buccaneers 49-37. Sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith led the Cavaliers with 18 points, while senior forward/center Travis Watson added 12 points and eight rebounds. Junior guard Todd Billet rounded out UVa's double figure scorers with 11 points.

East Tennessee State led by as many as nine points in the first half and scored 21 of its 39 first half points off 13 Cavalier turnovers. Trailing 39-35 at intermission, UVa started the second half with six quick points on a pair of baskets by Watson and a fastbreak layup by sophomore guard Keith Jenifer. Virginia took the lead for good, 52-50, at the 13:25 mark on the first of three consecutive three-point field goals by Byars. UVa sealed the win by making 10 of 12 free throws in the final 2:01 of the contest.

Tiras Wade led ETSU with 23 points and nine rebounds, while Zakee Wadood added 18 points, nine rebounds, five blocked shots and three steals.

UVa shot 49.1 percent (28-57) from the field in the game and 72.4 percent (21-29) from the free throw line. The Buccaneers connected on 29-64 attempts from the floor (45.3 percent) and were 12-14 (85.7 percent) from the free throw line. East Tennessee held a 39-32 edge in rebounds. After committing 13 turnovers in the first half, UVa had just two in the second stanza, while ETSU had 20 turnovers in the game.

## UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their 2002-2003 exhibition games. Virginia posted an 84-60 victory over Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 10) and a 73-57 exhibition win over One World All-Stars (Nov. 17) at University Hall.

Against Big Apple Basketball, the Cavaliers' starting front court of senior forward/center Travis Watson, junior center Nick Vander Laan and sophomore forward Elton Brown combined for 69 points and 47 rebounds.

Watson picked up where he left off last year and recorded a double-double with a game-high 32 points and 17 rebounds. Watson connected on 14 of 22 shots from the field, including three of six attempts from three-point range. In his first game as a Cavalier, Vander Laan grabbed a gamehigh 24 rebounds, including 13 offensive, and added 14 points for a double-double. Brown made 10 of 20 attempts from the field en route to 23 points. He also pulled down six rebounds. Junior guard Todd Billet rounded out UVa's double digit scorers with 13 points. He also contributed five rebounds and three assists. Watson, Brown, Vander Laan and Billet combined to score 82 of UVa's 84 points.

The Cavaliers used just eight players in the game as sophomores Jason Clark, Jermaine Harper and Keith Jenifer were serving a one-game suspension for a violation of team rules. Junior Majestic Mapp, sophomore Devin Smith and freshman Derrick Byars missed the game with injuries.

In the 73-57 win over One World All-Stars, Watson registered a double-double with 16 points and 16 rebounds to lead the Cavaliers. He also blocked four shots. Billet led all scorers with 17 points and also recorded a game-high seven
assists. Vander Laan and Smith rounded out UVa's double figure scorers. Vander Laan scored 12 points and added seven rebounds, two blocked shots and two assists. In his first game for the Cavaliers, Smith tallied 11 points.

One World All-Stars built a five-point lead (40-35) early in the second half, only to see the Cavaliers quickly respond with baskets by Watson, Billet and Vander Laan. UVa took the lead for good midway through the second half when sophomore forward Elton Brown converted a layup off an offensive rebound to give the Cavaliers a 51-50 lead.

## Cavaliers Ink Two

University of Virginia men's head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-6 Gary Forbes of Brooklyn, N.Y., and 6-3 J. R. Reynolds of Roanoke, Va.

Forbes, a guard, averaged 25 points, 11 rebounds and five assists a game as a junior during the 2001-02 season at Benjamin Banneker Academy.

Reynolds, a combination guard, started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic High School before transferring to Oak Hill Academy for his senior year. He scored 2,237 points, made 217 three-point field goals and had 570 assists during his career at Roanoke Catholic. He was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times.
"We are thrilled to officially have these two young men join our Virginia basketball family," Gillen said. "They are both very talented guards who can play a couple of positions. I sincerely feel they will be impact players on our team next season."

## Watson Looks Toward Senior Year

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has been named to the Wooden Award Preseason All-American Basketball Team and is also a preseason Naismith Award candidate. Watson is a third-team preseason All-America selection by Street \& Smith's and is rated sixth nationally at center in Lindy's preseason basketball magazine. Watson added to his already impressive career at UVa by being named to the All-ACC second team after the 2001-02 season. He led the ACC in four statistical categories last season: double-doubles (17), rebounds ( 9.7 rpg ), offensive rebounds ( 3.43 pg ), and defensive rebounds ( 6.29 pg ).

At the ACC's annual Operation Basketball, Watson was selected to the conference's 2002-03 Pre-Season First Team. He received 85 votes, the most of any player. Watson was also second to Duke's Chris Duhon in the Pre-Season ACC Player of the Year voting.

## Twelve Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 29 regular-season games before the 2003 ACC Tournament, 12 are against eight teams that participated in either the 2002 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). Two of the games are against national champion Maryland. The Cavaliers also meet league foes Duke, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice. In addition to those games, Virginia plays Michigan State, an NCAA participant and Rutgers, which earned an NIT bid.

At the Maui Invitational (November 25-27), UVa played Kentucky (NCAA) and Indiana (NCAA runners-up).
