THE GAME

Virginia stands at 12-6 overall and 3-3 in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2002-2003. The Cavaliers are coming off an 85-72 victory over Florida State (Jan. 29) at University Hall. Georgia Tech stands at 10-7 overall and 3-3 in the ACC this season. In their last game, the Yellow Jackets defeated North Carolina 88-68 (Jan. 29) at Alexander Memorial Coliseum at McDonald's Center in Atlanta, Ga.

The Series vs. Georgia Tech

Each team has had a stretch of dominating the series, which Georgia Tech now leads 31-26. The Cavaliers held the lead until the Yellow Jackets passed Virginia by winning 21 of the last 28 meetings, including 10 of the last 12. Last season, Virginia snapped a four-game losing streak to Georgia Tech with a 69-65 victory (Jan. 22) over the Jackets in Atlanta. The Yellow Jackets earned a split in the season series with an 82-80 victory (Feb. 23) in Charlottesville. It is the first time in the history of the series (which dates back to 1947-48) that both teams won on the other team's home floor in the same season. In 2000-2001, Georgia Tech swept the regular season series with a 73-68 win (Jan. 9) in Charlottesville (Georgia Tech was the only team to defeat UVa at University Hall in 2000-2001) and a 62-56 triumph (Feb. 11) in Atlanta. The Yellow Jackets also posted a 74-69 victory (Mar. 9) over Virginia in the ACC Tournament in Atlanta.

The Jackets hold a 20-8 advantage in games played in Atlanta in the series and have won 11 of the last 13 in the Peachtree city. UVa snapped a seven-game losing streak to Georgia Tech in Atlanta with its 69-65 victory (Jan. 22) last season. Prior to last season, Virginia's 83-60 win (Feb. 22) in 1995 was its most recent victory over the Yellow Jackets in Atlanta. The 23-point margin of victory is Virginia's largest in the series since a 91-59 win in 1984 in Charlottesville.

The Cavaliers have won three of five overtime contests in the series, but their 74-68 overtime loss to Georgia Tech in the 1998-99 season snapped a three-game extra session winning streak. The Jackets won the first overtime game in the series 72-71 in triple overtime in the 1983-84 season.

The Cavaliers opened the series with Georgia Tech by winning 10 of the first 13 games, including eight straight from 1981-1983.

These Games are Barn Burners

Even though 10 of the last 17 meetings between these two teams have been decided by at least nine points, people shouldn't be surprised if this one goes down to the wire.

Of the 44 games since the 1983-84 season, only 14 have been decided by 10 or more points. Eighteen of the games have been decided by a margin of four points or less with UVa winning 10 of

them. The Cavaliers have won three of four games (won in 1987 and 1990 twice, lost in 2002) decided by two points. Five games have gone into overtime, including a triple overtime affair (1984) and a double overtime game (1995).

From 1985 to 1990 the teams played 15 consecutive games that were decided by fewer than 10 points with Virginia winning eight of those games.

Jackets Shoot Well vs. UVa

The Yellow Jackets have won 12 of the last 15 meetings vs. Virginia in the past seven seasons and a big part of those wins has been Georgia Tech's ability to shoot the basketball. In the 12 wins, the Jackets shot 48.0 percent (318-662) from the field. In the three games Georgia Tech lost to Virginia in the last seven seasons, the Yellow Jackets made only 40.1 percent (69-172) of their attempts from the field. In its last 12 wins over the Cavaliers, Georgia Tech averaged 78.1 points per game compared to 64.7 points per game in its last three losses to UVa (the Jackets have scored 65 points twice and 64 once).

In Georgia Tech's last 21 wins over Virginia dating back to the championship game of the 1990 ACC Tournament, the Yellow Jackets are shooting 47.5 percent from the field, while averaging 75.0 points.

That is in contrast to Georgia Tech's performance when Virginia wins. In Virginia's nine wins over Georgia Tech dating back to the beginning of the 1990s, the Yellow Jackets have shot 40.2 percent from the floor and scored an average of 69.8 points.

In Virginia's last nine wins against Georgia Tech, the Yellow Jackets have not shot better than 42.6 percent from the field (29 of 68 in the 1994-95 season).

Very Similar

Virginia and Georgia Tech have both been unbeatable at home, but have struggled away from their home courts. Both school's are a perfect 9-0 at home this season. UVa is 1-5 in games on opponents' home courts, while the Yellow Jackets are winless in six games.

He's Back

After missing 70 consecutive games spanning 1,032 days, junior guard Majestic Mapp made his long anticipated

return to the Cavalier lineup against North Carolina (Jan. 11). Mapp entered the game to a standing ovation with 7:23 remaining in the first half and played just over two minutes.

Mapp had been sidelined after tearing the ACL in his right knee on August 2, 2000. He missed the entire 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons. The last time Mapp had played for UVa was March 15, 2000 against Georgetown in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament.

After not seeing any action in the Cavaliers' games at Duke (Jan. 15) and at Clemson (Jan. 18), Mapp played six minutes against Virginia Tech (Jan. 21). He scored three points (on a three-point field goal), grabbed one rebound and handed out one assist.

Mapp saw his most significant playing time of the season in the Cavaliers' 85-75 victory over Wake Forest (Jan. 23). In 17 minutes of action, Mapp had three points, four assists and one steal with only one turnover. Against Florida State (Jan. 29), he scored four points and had three rebounds, two assists and two turnovers in nine minutes.

Gillen Registers 350th Career Win

Virginia head coach Pete Gillen won his 350th career game on December 21 when his Cavaliers posted a 61-57 victory over Rutgers.

Gillen is in his 18th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 356-183 record for a .660 winning percentage. Gillen is in his fifth season at Virginia and has posted an 82-55 record (.599 winning percentage). Gillen won the 300th game of his career when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 87-85 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 14 times in 17 seasons (nine NCAA, five NIT), including the last three seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times – all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

Billet and Watson Among NCAA Leaders

Junior guard Todd Billet and senior forward/center Travis Watson are ranked among the NCAA Division I leaders in free throw percentage and rebounding, respectively, for games played through Jan. 27.

Billet is eighth in the nation in free throw percentage at 91.8 percent (56-61). He is currently shooting 92.1 percent (58-63) from the free throw line.

Watson is 16th among all Division I players in rebounds with an average of 10.0 per game. He is presently averaging 10.4 rebounds per game (176 in 17 games).

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In-State Winning Streak Snapped

The Cavaliers' had their 15-game winning streak against in-state opponents snapped with a 73-55 loss at Virginia Tech (Jan. 21). Even with the loss to Virginia Tech, UVa's record against in-state opponents in the last 26 seasons (since 1977-78) is 106-15 for an .876 winning percentage.

Home Sweet Home

Virginia snapped a three-game losing streak with an 85-75 win over Wake Forest (Jan. 23) at University Hall (and has since defeated Florida State at home (85-72 – Jan. 29). Prior to defeating the Demon Deacons, UVa had lost its last three games and four of the last five – and all four losses were on opponents' home courts. UVa's only win in those five games was a 79-72 victory over North Carolina (Jan. 11) at University Hall. The Cavaliers are a perfect 9-0 at U-Hall this season and just 3-6 away from home, including 1-5 in away games.

'Hoos Starting

The Cavaliers have played 18 games this season and have used 10 different starting lineups. UVa's latest starting lineup (vs. Florida State – Jan. 29) featured sophomore forward Jason Clark, sophomore forward Elton Brown, senior forward/center Travis Watson, sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith and junior guard Todd Billet. Those five comprised UVa's 10th different starting lineup this season.

Billet and Watson lead the team with 16 starts apiece, while Smith and sophomore guard Keith Jenifer have drawn 14 starting assignments. Brown has started 10 contests, while junior center Nick Vander Laan and freshman forward Derrick Byars have both started eight times. Eight different players have started games this season for Virginia and all eight have at least four starts this season.

2002-2003 UVa ACC Players of the Week

Jan. 6 – Travis Watson

Jan. 13 – Todd Billet

Junior guard Todd Billet was named the Co-ACC Player of the Week on January 13 after scoring 24 points in UVa's 79-72 home victory over North Carolina (Jan. 11). He also had three rebounds, two assists and two steals in the win. Billet was eight for 15 from the field, including six of 11 from three-point range. He also made both free throw attempts.

Billet reached a career milestone in the victory as he scored his 1,000th career point with a three-point field goal with 4:15 remaining in the first half.

He shared the award with Duke's Dahntay Jones.

The last Virginia player to accomplish the feat was Ralph Sampson on Jan. 12, 1983 when he had 33 points and 21 rebounds against N.C. State.

Five Score in Double Figures

The Cavaliers had five players score in double figures in their 85-72 win over Florida State (Jan. 29), marking the first time this season that has happened. Senior forward/center Travis Watson led the way with 20 points, while freshman forward Derrick Byars had 15. Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward Elton Brown both scored 14 points, and sophomore forward Jason Clark added 12.

The previous time UVa had five players score in double figures in the same game was February 28, 2002 against Duke. Roger Mason, Jr. (22), Adam Hall (21), Chris Williams (14), Watson (12) and Keith Jenifer (10) all reached double figures in the scoring column.

Cavalier Captains

Seniors Travis Watson and Jason Rogers, and junior Majestic Mapp are the captains of the 2002-03 Virginia basketball team.

The Cavaliers' 87-65 victory (Jan. 2) over Wofford marked their 200th victory over a non-conference opponent at University Hall since the building opened for the 1965-66 season. Virginia is 200-29 for an impressive .873 winning percentage all-time in University Hall against non-conference opponents.

Billet Scores 1,000th Career Point

Junior guard Todd Billet reached the 1,000 point milestone in UVa's 79-72 win over North Carolina (Jan. 11). Billet scored his 1,000th career point with a three-point field goal with 4:15 remaining in the first half. Billet tallied 24 points in the game against North Carolina. He has scored 1,097 points in his collegiate career. Billet scored 844 points in two seasons at Rutgers and has scored 253 points this season in a Virginia uniform.

Shooting 50 Percent From the Field

The Cavaliers have shot 50 percent or better in five games this season and are only 3-2 in those games (Virginia is 9-4 when it shoots below 50 percent). The two games UVa shot 50 percent and lost, it outshot its opponent (Duke – 50.8 to 50.0 and Clemson – 59.2 to 55.4). Virginia is the only ACC school this year to lose a game when shooting 50 percent or better.

Four Consecutive Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson had his streak of double-doubles in four consecutive games snapped against Duke (Jan. 15). After a "drought" of three games without a double-double, Watson notched his eighth double-double of the season in UVa's win over Wake Forest (Jan. 23). He recorded his second straight double-double with 20 points and 16 rebounds in the Cavaliers' win over Florida State (Jan. 29). See page 5 of the notes for a listing of Watson's double-doubles this season.

Watson has recorded four consecutive double-doubles three times in his career (he did it twice last season). The last Virginia player other than Watson to notch four consecu-

tive double-doubles was in the 1997-98 season when Norman Nolan accomplished the feat. Nolan posted consecutive double-doubles against Clemson (Feb. 21) - 24 pts., 12 rebs., Maryland (Feb. 24) - 26 pts., 15 rebs., Florida State (Feb. 28) - 24 pts., 10 rebs., and Duke (Mar. 3) - 13 pts., 15 rebs.

Ralph Sampson is the last UVa player to have five consecutive double-doubles as he concluded his stellar career with five double-doubles in a row in the 1982-83 season. Sampson's career high for consecutive double-doubles is nine, but interestingly enough, that is not the school record. Norm Carmichael posted a school record 12 consecutive double-doubles in the 1967-68 season.

Watson has led UVa in rebounding in 13 of 18 games this season and is averaging ACC bests of 10.4 boards per game overall and 11.0 in ACC play. He is also averaging a team-high 14.9 points per game (11th in the ACC) and is shooting 54.9 percent (96-175) from the field (2nd in the ACC).

Free Throw Woes

The Cavaliers set a record for free throw futility in their loss to Virginia Tech (Jan. 21). UVa was just 1-6 (16.7 percent) from the free throw line marking their lowest known free throw percentage in a game since at least the 1963-64 season (and very possibly since the 1957-58 season). Virginia's previous known record for lowest free throw percentage in a game was 20.0 percent when it went 2-10 from the line against Kentucky Wesleyan on December 28, 1963.

The one made free throw vs. Virginia Tech ties for the fewest free throws made in a game. The Cavaliers also made only one free throw vs. Duke – 1-2 (Feb. 9, 1977); North Carolina – 1-1 (Mar. 7, 1982); and Wake Forest – 1-3 (Mar. 9, 1984).

UVa's six free throw attempts against the Hokies ties for the 14th fewest free throws attempted in a game. It is the fewest free throws Virginia has attempted in a game since attempting only three (two were made) against North Carolina on February 11, 1998 and six (five were made) against Georgia Tech on February 14, 1998.

Making Free Throws Down The Stretch

The Cavaliers have struggled from the free throw line this season, making just 66.4 percent (273-411) of their attempts from the charity stripe. However, UVa has been more reliable from the charity stripe in the final five minutes of games.

In the first half of games, Virginia is shooting 66.2 percent (88-133) from the line. UVa has made 66.5 percent (185-278) of its attempts in the second half of games. In the final five minutes of games, the Cavaliers have made 101 of 146 attempts for 69.2 percent. (UVa is only 84-132 for 63.6 percent in the first 15 minutes of the second half.) In its last 14 games, UVa has made 90 of 124 attempts from the foul line in the final five minutes of games for 72.6 percent.

Cavaliers Finish Second in Maui Invitational

Virginia won two of three games to finish second in the 2002 EA Sports Maui Invitational (Nov. 25-27) at the Lahaina Civic Center in Maui, Hawaii. The Cavaliers defeated Chaminade 86-72 (Nov. 25) and 15th-ranked Kentucky 75-61 (Nov. 26) before falling to 19th-ranked Indiana 70-63 (Nov. 27) in the championship game.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson was named to the All-Tournament team. Watson registered two double-doubles and averaged 12.7 points and 11.0 rebounds in the three

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games. He also blocked nine shots and added seven assists and five steals.

Billet Unkind to Former Team

He was booed all game long, but it didn't faze junior guard Todd Billet, who was making his return to Louis Brown Athletic Center and Rutgers on December 21. Billet, who played for Rutgers for two seasons before transferring to Virginia, scored a game-high 22 points in leading his new team to a 61-57 victory over the Scarlet Knights. Among his 22 points were a pair of free throws with 14 seconds remaining that broke a 57-57 tie and gave the Cavaliers the lead for good.

In two seasons at Rutgers, Billet averaged 14.6 points per game, including 16.6 per game in 2000-01. He also established a school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 in 2000-01.

Billet is second on the team in scoring this season with 14.1 points per game (12th in the ACC). He is averaging a team-high 19.0 points per game in ACC play (tied for 4th in the ACC). Billet tops the Cavaliers in three-point field goals (51) and is second among all ACC players in free throw shooting (58-63 for 92.1 percent).

Watson 30th All-Time Among ACC Players in Rebounding

Senior forward/center Travis Watson is 30th all-time among ACC players in career rebounds. Watson has 970 rebounds and needs 12 to move past Clemson's Horace Grant (1983-87) into 29th place. Gene Banks, who played for Duke from 1978-81, is 28th with 985 career rebounds.

More Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has picked up where he left off last season as he has recorded nine double-doubles this season, including a stretch of four consecutive double-doubles, which was snapped against Duke (Jan. 15). With the nine double-doubles, Watson leads all ACC players in that category. Watson has 47 in his career which trails only Ralph Sampson's school record 84 career double-doubles.

Watson's 47 career double-doubles are the most of any active ACC player. Watson, who recorded an ACC-best 17 double-doubles last year, also had double-doubles in both of UVa's 2002-2003 exhibition games.

Duke Ties a Record

In UVa's game against Duke (Jan. 15), the Blue Devils made 37 of 40 free throws (92.5 percent) with the 37 made free throws tying the school record for most free throws made in a game by a Virginia opponent. St. Joseph's (Pa.) made 37 free throws (43 attempts) against UVa on February 21, 1958.

Harper Reinstated

Sophomore guard Jermaine Harper was reinstated to the team December 12 after being suspended for a violation of team rules. Harper missed the Cavaliers' first five games of the season. He did not practice during the suspension.

In the 13 games Harper has played he is averaging 4.5 points and 1.3 rebounds per game. He is averaging 13.1 minutes of playing time per game.

Vander Laan Joins Growing List

Junior center Nick Vander Laan became the latest Cavalier to set a UVa career-high in scoring (see notes to follow). Vander Laan poured in 17 points in Virginia's 72-65 win over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous UVa best was 10 points against then 19th-ranked Indiana (Nov. 27). Vander Laan's overall career-high is 23 points against Oklahoma in the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

Vander Laan also set a UVa career-best in rebounds with 11 vs. Rutgers (Dec. 21). His previous season-high was eight rebounds on two occasions. Vander Laan's overall career best rebounding game is 13 against Washington during the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

Byars Joins Career High Club

Freshman forward Derrick Byars became another in a long line of Cavaliers to set a career high in scoring. Byars registered career-highs in back-to-back games. Byars scored 16 points, including 14 in the second half, in UVa's 84-76 win

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over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17). He then scored a game-high 20 points in the Cavaliers' 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous career high was 11 points against Indiana (Nov. 27).

Byars also registered a career-high five steals against Gardner-Webb. His previous career-best was two steals against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet and Smith Net UVa Career Bests

Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward/guard Devin Smith scored career-highs as Cavaliers in UVa's game against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet poured in 28 points off the bench – including 26 in the second half. His career-high is 37 points against James Madison during the 2000-2001 season while playing at Rutgers University. He is averaging 14.1 points per game this season (second on the team).

Smith scored 24 points against the Spartans. He was 9-13 from the floor, including 4-6 from three-point range, and made both of his free throw attempts. Smith is third on the team in scoring at 10.2 points per game.

New Career High for Clark

Sophomore forward Jason Clark scored 12 points – all in the second half – in the Cavaliers' 90-86 win over Long Island (Nov. 22) to establish a new career high. Clark equaled his career high with 12 points against Rutgers (Dec. 21) in his first start of the season. He also scored 12 points versus Florida State (Jan. 29). Clark also blocked a season-high five shots and grabbed a season-best eight rebounds vs. Rutgers. Clark's former career-best was 11 points against Duke (Jan. 27, 2002).

Brown Nets New Career High for Points

Sophomore forward Elton Brown established a new career high for points in a game when he scored 22 in UVa's 86-72 victory over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Brown, who surpassed his old career best of 20 points against Georgia Tech (Jan. 22, 2002), made eight of 13 shots from the floor and five of seven attempts from the charity stripe.

Jenifer Sets Career Highs

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer became the third returning player to establish a new career high in scoring this season. Jenifer tallied 13 points in UVa's 75-61 victory over Kentucky (Nov. 26). His previous career high was 10 points against Duke (Feb. 28) last season.

Jenifer has also set a new career high for assists. He handed out a career-best seven assists in the season-opener against Long Island (Nov. 22) and then increased his career high to eight against Indiana (Nov. 27). He equaled his career-best with eight assists against Wofford (Jan. 2) and then against Florida State (Jan. 29).

With nine rebounds against Rutgers (Dec. 21), Jenifer set a new career high in that category. His previous career high for rebounds was five on two occasions.

Jenifer Sets Career-High

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer has handed out 101 assists (5.6 per game – 6th in the ACC) this season and has surpassed his previous career high of 80. Jenifer has a 2.02 to 1 assist to turnover ratio this season (4th in the ACC). He possesses a 2.58 to 1 assist to turnover ratio in ACC play

(2nd in the ACC).

Jenifer has had five or more assists in 14 games this season. He has not had more turnovers than assists in any game this season.

Not Just a Scorer

Sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith came to Virginia with a reputation as a terrific scorer (19.4 ppg, at Coffeyville Community College), but he has also shown a knack for blocking shots. He has blocked 15 shots in the last 10 games, including a season-high four against Liberty (Dec. 30). With 21 blocks this season (1.2 per game), Smith is second on the team in that category.

Making the Most of His Opportunities

Sophomore forward Jason Clark has only taken 52 shots this season, but he's made 37 baskets for an impressive .712 field goal percentage. He is shooting 75.0 percent (15-20) in ACC games this season. Clark has shot 50 percent or better in every game excluding the three games (Indiana – Nov. 27, East Tennessee State – Dec. 17, and Wofford – Jan. 2) he did not attempt a field goal. Clark has been perfect from the field six times this season. He is shooting 63.6 percent (77-121) from the field in his career. In ACC contests during his career, Clark is 42-57 for an amazing 73.7 percent.

Home Cookin'

Freshman forward Derrick Byars is averaging 7.6 points per game this season, however, he is averaging better than 10 points per contest in games played at University Hall. (His average at home was 12.3 points per game prior to not scoring against North Carolina – Jan. 11. He injured his left shoulder early in the game against UNC and played only eight minutes). Byars is averaging 10.2 points per game in nine home games and is averaging only 5.0 points in nine games away from home. To go one step further, Byars has only scored 16 points (2.7 per game) in UVa's six games on opponents' home courts.

Billet Heating Up

In his last six games, junior guard Todd Billet has averaged 18.3 points per game (and 20.8 points per game in his last five ACC games). He has made 34 of 69 attempts from the field for 49.3 percent and 24 of 49 three-point attempts for 49.0 percent. Billet made seven three-pointers against Clemson (Jan. 18) which ties for the sixth highest single game total in school history.

Billet is averaging 14.1 points per game overall (12th in the ACC) and 19.0 points per ACC contest (6th in the ACC). On the season, Billet has made 51 three-point field goals overall (2.83 per game – 3rd in the ACC) and is averaging a league-best 3.83 three-pointers per game in conference tilts. Billet is shooting 39.2 percent from behind the arc (6th in the ACC). In ACC play, he has made 23 of 48 three-point attempts (47.9 percent – 3rd in the ACC).

Brown Finds His Touch

In his last six games, sophomore forward Elton Brown is averaging 12.5 points per game and is shooting 63.8 percent (30-47) from the field. In his last four ACC games, Brown has made 23 of 33 attempts from the floor (69.7 percent).

Brown is averaging 10.1 points per game overall and 12.8 points per game in ACC play. In ACC games, he is second

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among all players in field goal percentage at 58.5 percent (31-53).

Watson Heating Up

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has scored in double figures in his last 10 games and is averaging 16.5 points per game in those 10 contests. On the season, he is averaging 14.9 points per game overall and 16.2 in ACC games.

Watson is shooting a team-best 54.9 percent (96-175) from the field this season and has shot better than 50 percent 10 times (in 17 games). Over the last 10 games, he has connected on 56.7 percent (59-104) of his field goal attempts and has shot better than 50 percent in eight of those contests. Watson is shooting 57.6 percent (34-59) in ACC games (3rd in the ACC).

When Watson has shot from inside the three-point arc this season, he is 92-157 (58.6 percent). He is just 4-18 (22.2 percent) from three-point range.

Watson 19th in Scoring

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has moved up to 19th on the Cavaliers' all-time scoring list with 1,355 career points. He needs 61 points to move past Mel Kennedy (1985-88) into 18th place.

Watson Second in Rebounds

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has grabbed 176 rebounds (10.4 per game) this season in the 17 games he has played. He is second on Virginia's career rebounding list with 970.

He blocked a career-high tying five shots against Chaminade (Nov. 25) to jump from seventh to fifth place. He needs 14 blocked shots to move past Kris Hunter (1997-99) for third place.

50th ANNIVERSARY OF THE ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference is celebrating its 50th anniversary this season. Former University of Virginia standouts **Jeff Lamp, Barry Parkhill and Ralph Sampson** were named to the 50th Anniversary ACC Men's Basketball Team.

Sampson was also recently named as one of the top 50 male ACC athletes of all-time.

Lamp lettered four times for Virginia from 1978-81, and was a first-team All-America selection in 1980 and 1981. He helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1981 NCAA East Regional and was an All-Tournament selection at the 1981 Final Four. A team captain during his UVA career, Lamp ranks second on Virginia's all-time scoring list with 2,317 points. Lamp was a first-round selection by the Portland Trail Blazers in the 1981 NBA Draft.

Parkhill lettered for Virginia from 1971-73 and was a first-team All-America selection in 1972 and 1973. He was selected the ACC Basketball Player of the Year and the ACC Athlete of the Year in 1972. Parkhill earned first-team All-ACC honors in 1972 and was a second-team All-Conference selection in 1971 and 1973. He was also an All-ACC Tournament selection in 1971 and 1972. He holds Virginia's single-game scoring record with 51 points against Baldwin-Wallace on December 11, 1971. Parkhill was a first-round draft selection by both the Virginia Squires (ABA) and Portland Trail Blazers (NBA) after his collegiate career.

Sampson lettered four times for Virginia from 1980-83, and was a three-time National and ACC Player of the Year. He was a four-time first-team All-America selection and a three-time first-team All-ACC selection. Sampson received three consecutive Rupp trophies, two consecutive Eastman Awards and two John R. Wooden Awards. He was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 1980. Sampson helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1980 NIT. Sampson holds Virginia career records for rebounds (1,511), field goals made (899) and blocked shots (462). He led the ACC in rebounding three times and ranks fourth on UVA's career scoring list with 2,228 points. Sampson was selected by the Houston Rockets as the NBA's number one draft choice in 1983 and went on to earn NBA Rookie of the Year honors.

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Virginia Returns to Postseason Play

The University of Virginia men's basketball team received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2001-02 regular season. UVa lost to South Carolina 74-67 in the first round of the tournament. It was the Cavaliers' ninth NIT appearance and the team's third consecutive postseason appearance. Following the 2000-2001 season, UVa received a bid to the 2001 NCAA Tournament. UVa lost to Gonzaga 86-85 in the first round of the 2001 NCAA South Region Tournament. The game marked the Cavaliers first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997. Virginia made the first of three straight postseason appearances with a bid to the 2000 National Invitation Tournament (NIT). UVa lost to Georgetown 115-111 in triple overtime in the first round of the NIT.

Transfers Making Big Impact

Virginia's three transfers – junior guard Todd Billet (Rutgers), junior center Nick Vander Laan (California-Berkeley), and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith (Coffeyville Community College) – have made a big impact on the team in 2002-03. The trio have combined to start 38 times and average 30.7 points and 10.5 rebounds per game. Billet and Smith have made 80 of UVa's 133 three-point field goals this season as well. Billet also leads UVa in free throw percentage (.921 – 58-63) and Smith is second (.781 – 25-32).

Billet and Vander Laan are eligible to play for the Cavaliers during the 2002-03 season after transferring to Virginia prior to the 2001-02 academic year.

Billet, a 6-0 guard from Middletown, N.J., started all 58 games and averaged 14.6 points per game in his two seasons at Rutgers. He is a three-point specialist who established the Rutgers' school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 and tied the school's single-game record when he made eight three-pointers against Lafayette during the 2000-01 season.

Vander Laan, a 6-10 center from Sacramento, Calif., averaged 7.5 points and 6.1 rebounds a game in two seasons at California-Berkeley. He was voted honorable mention Pac-10 All-Freshman following the 1999-2000 season.

The 6-5 Smith averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds per game while earning first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in 2001-02.

Bench Scoring – 48, 47, 46

Virginia's reserves have played a major role in several of the Cavaliers' wins this season. Reserves have combined to score 46 or more points in three victories this season.

Four Cavaliers off the bench combined to score 48 of UVa's 72 points in a 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). The 48 points are the most this season scored by players off UVa's bench. Freshman forward Derrick Byars and junior center Nick Vander Laan scored 20 and 17 points, respectively.

The previous 2002-2003 high was 47 points in an 86-72 win over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Sophomore forward Elton Brown led the way with 22 points, while sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith added 16 points.

UVa's bench came through again in a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) as the four players who came off the bench combined to score 46 points. Senior forward/center

Travis Watson led the way with 16 points, while Brown tallied 14 points.

Two Busy Weeks After Final Exams

After a 13-day break for final exams, the Cavaliers won three games in a span of five days. UVa won the first two games of the stretch – 84-76 over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17) and 72-65 over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19) – at home in University Hall. UVa closed out the stretch with a 61-57 victory at Rutgers (Dec. 21).

Virginia then won three home games in a span of six days. UVa began its homestand with a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) and posted a 77-58 win over Liberty (Dec. 30). The Cavaliers closed their homestand with an 87-65 victory over Wofford (Jan. 2).

Rod Jensen Joins Coaching Staff

Rod Jensen, formerly the head men's basketball coach at Boise State University, joined the University of Virginia's men's basketball coaching staff during the summer. Jensen joined the staff after Tom Herrion left Virginia to become the head coach at the College of Charleston. Other members of head coach Pete Gillen's staff include assistant coaches Walt Fuller and Alexis Sherard, and director of men's basketball operations Scott Shepherd.

Cavaliers Welcome Six Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 6-7 freshman forward Derrick Byars and 6-5 sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith.

Byars, a three-year letterman at Ridgeway High School in Memphis, Tenn., averaged 23.2 points, 10 rebounds and 4.5 assists per game as a high school senior during the 2001-02 season. He shot 37 percent from three-point range and 77 percent from the free throw line. He was a fourth-team *Parade* All-America selection and the Gatorade Player of the Year in Tennessee as a high school senior.

Smith earned first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in Coffeyville, Kan., last season. During the 2001-02 season he averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds a game, shot 51.8 percent (251-485) from the field, including 45.8 percent (108-236) from three-point range, and made 90.2 percent (129-143) of his free throw attempts.

Four additional players joined the Virginia team after participating in open tryouts October 7-8. The players are guard Billy Campbell (6-0, Fr., Atlanta, Ga.), forward Greg Harrell-Edge (6-8, Sr., Vienna, Va.), guard Robert Lodge (6-4, Fr., Raleigh, N.C.) and forward Rob Williams (6-7, So., Martinsville, Va.). Watson Named Candidate for CLASS Award

Senior All-America candidate Travis Watson is one of 36 candidates for the second annual Senior CLASS Award as announced by the award's organizing committee. The Senior CLASS Award – an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School – is presented annually to the nation's senior player-of-the-year for NCAA Division I men's and women's basketball. The award was developed in response to the recent trend of college basketball players leaving college early to turn professional.

Selection criteria is based on a number of factors, the

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most important being that the recipient must have exhausted his four years of eligibility and have fulfilled his commitment to his respective university. In addition, the recipient must be working toward his degree, be in good academic standing and be of sound moral character.

Ten finalists will appear on the official ballot during the national voting process in March. The winners will be announced during the respective NCAA Final Four events.

Cavs Improve to 9-0 at Home With Win Over Florida State

Freshman forward Derrick Byars and sophomore forward Jason Clark combined to score 21 first-half points to help Virginia open up an early lead in the Cavaliers' 85-72 victory over Florida State (Jan. 29) at University Hall.

Clark scored UVa's first seven points of the game and equalled his career high with 12 overall and added four rebounds and two steals. Byars came off the bench to score 11 consecutive Cavalier points midway through the first half to turn an 18-14 deficit into a 25-20 lead – a lead Virginia never relinquished. Byars tallied 15 points and two rebounds in the contest.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson led five UVa players in double figure scoring with 20 points and added 16 rebounds for his ninth double-double of the season. He also had two blocked shots and two assists. Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward Elton Brown both contributed 14 points. Billet also had three assists, while Brown pulled down four rebounds.

Florida State opened up an 18-12 lead with 12:01 remaining in the first half. A dunk by junior center Nick Vander Laan pulled UVa within four and then Byars scored UVa's next 11 points to put Virginia ahead for good (25-20 with 8:51 to go in the first half).

UVa led 38-28 at the intermission and extended its lead to as many as 18 points (70-52) with 5:29 to play in the game. The Cavaliers' lead never fell below nine points in the second stanza.

Virginia shot 45.2 percent (28-62) in the game and made 11 of 20 (55.0 percent) three-point field goal attempts. The Seminoles were 27-62 (43.5 percent) from the field. UVa held a 40-32 edge in rebounding as well.

Tim Pickett led Florida State with 21 points, 18 of which came in the second half. Anthony Richardson added 17 points.

UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their 2002-2003 exhibition games. Virginia posted an 84-60 victory over Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 10) and a 73-57 exhibition win over One World All-Stars (Nov. 17) at University Hall.

Against Big Apple Basketball, the Cavaliers' starting front court of senior forward/center Travis Watson, junior center Nick Vander Laan and sophomore forward Elton Brown combined for 69 points and 47 rebounds.

Watson picked up where he left off last year and recorded a double-double with a game-high 32 points and 17 rebounds. Watson connected on 14 of 22 shots from the field, including three of six attempts from three-point range. In his first game as a Cavalier, Vander Laan grabbed a game-high 24 rebounds, including 13 offensive, and added 14 points for a double-double. Brown made 10 of 20 attempts from the field en route to 23 points. He also pulled down six rebounds. Junior guard Todd Billet rounded out UVa's double

digit scorers with 13 points. He also contributed five rebounds and three assists. Watson, Brown, Vander Laan and Billet combined to score 82 of UVa's 84 points.

The Cavaliers used just eight players in the game as sophomores Jason Clark, Jermaine Harper and Keith Jenifer were serving a one-game suspension for a violation of team rules. Junior Majestic Mapp, sophomore Devin Smith and freshman Derrick Byars missed the game with injuries.

In the 73-57 win over One World All-Stars, Watson registered a double-double with 16 points and 16 rebounds to lead the Cavaliers. He also blocked four shots. Billet led all scorers with 17 points and also recorded a game-high seven assists. Vander Laan and Smith rounded out UVa's double figure scorers. Vander Laan scored 12 points and added seven rebounds, two blocked shots and two assists. In his first game for the Cavaliers, Smith tallied 11 points.

One World All-Stars built a five-point lead (40-35) early in the second half, only to see the Cavaliers quickly respond with baskets by Watson, Billet and Vander Laan. UVa took the lead for good midway through the second half when sophomore forward Elton Brown converted a layup off an offensive rebound to give the Cavaliers a 51-50 lead.

Cavaliers Ink Two

University of Virginia men's head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-6 Gary Forbes of Brooklyn, N.Y., and 6-3 J. R. Reynolds of Roanoke, Va.

Forbes, a guard, averaged 25 points, 11 rebounds and five assists a game as a junior during the 2001-02 season at Benjamin Banneker Academy.

Reynolds, a combination guard, started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic High School before transferring to Oak Hill Academy for his senior year. He scored 2,237 points, made 217 three-point field goals and had 570 assists during his career at Roanoke Catholic. He was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times.

"We are thrilled to officially have these two young men join our Virginia basketball family," Gillen said. "They are both very talented guards who can play a couple of positions. I sincerely feel they will be impact players on our team next season."

Watson Looks Toward Senior Year

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has been named to the Wooden Award Preseason All-American Basketball Team and is also a preseason Naismith Award candidate. Watson is a third-team preseason All-America selection by *Street & Smith's* and is rated sixth nationally at center in *Lindy's* preseason basketball magazine. Watson added to his already impressive career at UVa by being named to the All-ACC second team after the 2001-02 season. He led the ACC in four statistical categories last season: double-doubles (17), rebounds (9.7 rpg), offensive rebounds (3.43 pg), and defensive rebounds (6.29 pg).

At the ACC's annual Operation Basketball, Watson was selected to the conference's 2002-03 Pre-Season First Team. He received 85 votes, the most of any player. Watson was also second to Duke's Chris Duhon in the Pre-Season ACC Player of the Year voting.

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Twelve Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 29 regular-season games before the 2003 ACC Tournament, 12 are against eight teams that participated in either the 2002 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). Two of the games are against national champion Maryland. The Cavaliers also meet league foes Duke, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice. Those teams all participated in last season's NCAA Tournament. In addition to those games, Virginia has played Michigan State, an NCAA participant and Rutgers, which earned an NIT bid.

At the Maui Invitational (November 25-27), UVa played Kentucky (NCAA) and Indiana (NCAA runners-up).

UVa is 3-4 in 2002-2003 against teams that competed in postseason play last season.
