THE GAME

Virginia (2001-2002: 17-12/7-9 ACC) stands at 9-2 this season. In its last game, UVa defeated Wofford College 87-65 Thursday (Jan. 2) at University Hall for its sixth consecutive victory. **N.C. State** (2001-2002: 23-11/9-7 ACC) is 7-2 in 2002-2003. The Wolfpack, ranked 24th in the *USAToday*/ESPN Poll, is coming off a 68-56 loss to Massachusetts (Jan. 2) in Amherst, Mass.

The Series vs. N.C. State

N.C. State leads the overall series with Virginia 73-49 (dating back to 1912-13), including three wins in the 2001-2002 season. The Wolfpack won 81-74 (Jan. 5) in Charlottesville, 85-68 (Feb. 6) in Raleigh, and 92-72 (Mar. 8) in the quarterfinals of the ACC Tournament in Charlotte, N.C. Despite the three losses last season, the Cavaliers have won 15 of 24 contests against NCSU in the last 11 seasons. Since 1980, the Cavaliers are 32-19 in all games against the Wolfpack.

Including its three wins last season, N.C. State has won four consecutive games in the series with Virginia (and five of the last six). The Wolfpack also won the second meeting of the 2000-2001 season 90-80 (Feb. 7) in Raleigh to begin its current streak. The Cavaliers' last win in the series was an 88-81 triumph (Jan. 6) in the 2000-2001 season.

The two teams had split the regular season series four consecutive seasons before N.C. State swept the series last year. It marked the Wolfpack's first sweep over UVa since winning both match-ups (by a combined seven points) in 1988. Virginia has swept the season series six times since then, but the last time UVa swept the season series was in the 1996-97 season.

The Cavaliers have not found their trips to N.C. State very hospitable over the years, as they have won only 16 of 53 games all-time against the Wolfpack in Raleigh. UVa lost its first three games at the RBC Center (formerly the Entertainment and Sports Arena) – 65-62 - Jan. 12, 2000, 90-80 - Feb. 7, 2001 and 85-68 - Feb. 6, 2002) and have lost five consecutive road games to N.C. State. UVa's last win in Raleigh was a 55-46 triumph on February 19, 1997. Virginia was only 15-30 all-time in Reynolds Coliseum (including games in the ACC Tournament) against the Wolfpack. In games in Raleigh since 1979-80, UVa is 11-11.

The Cavaliers' 87-65 victory (Jan. 2) over Wofford marked their 200th victory over a non-conference opponent at University Hall since the building opened for the 1965-66 season. Virginia is 200-29 for an impressive .873 winning percentage all-time in University Hall against non-conference opponents.

Cavaliers and Wolfpack Battle to the Wire

The history of the series between these two schools since the late 1970s has been one marked by many closely contested games. Since 1978, 38 of the 56 games have been decided by less than 10 points. UVa is 26-12 (.684) in those games.

Virginia's last eight wins (going back six seasons) over the Wolfpack have been by a combined 40 points (5.0/g).

Since 1978, four games have been decided by one point, five by two points, six by three points, three by four points and three by five points.

It's curious to note in the long history of the series going back to the first meeting 89 years ago that only three games have gone to overtime. Virginia has been victorious in all three overtime contests. UVa won the first overtime game 81-73 in 1977-78 and won 84-82 in double overtime in 1995-96. In the most recent overtime affair, the Cavaliers won 82-79 in 1998-99. During one stretch (1985-1988) nine consecutive games were decided by nine points or less.

In a bit of an aberration, seven of the last nine N.C. State wins in the series have been by double digits—67-54 in 1994, 74-55 in 1998, 82-72 in 1999, 76-65 in 2000, 90-80 in 2001, and 85-68 and 92-72 in 2002. The exceptions were a 65-62 Wolfpack win on Jan. 12, 2000, and an 81-74 win on Jan. 5, 2002.

Field Goal Percentage is Key to Wins Over 'Pack

Virginia has had the upper hand in the series versus N.C. State over the last 13 years and one of the keys to the Cavaliers' success is field goal percentage defense. Since the 1989-90 season, Virginia has won 17 of 28 contests. In the 17 wins, UVa has held N.C. State below 45 percent field goal shooting 13 times and under 40 percent nine times. In the Wolfpack's 11 victories, they have shot 52.7 percent from the floor, including 61.0 percent (25-41) in the 2000 ACC Tournament (Mar. 10) and 60.4 percent (29-48) in the 2002 ACC Tournament (Mar. 8). The lowest NCSU has shot in a victory over the Cavaliers since 1989-90 was 47.2 percent (25-53) in a 67-54 win in the 1993-94 season.

The Wolfpack shot 44.4 percent from the field and averaged 71.6 points per game against Virginia over the last 13 seasons. In wins over UVa, N.C. State has shot 52.7 percent from the floor and averaged 79.9 points, compared to 39.8 percent shooting and 66.2 points per game in losses to Virginia.

In the last six meetings (five NCSU wins), N.C. State shot 56.1 percent (169-301) from the field, including a trio of 60+ percent contests. Only once in the last six games have the

Cavaliers held N.C.State under 50 percent shooting and that was 49.1 percent (28-57).

A look at N.C. State's field goal shooting and points scored against Virginia since the 1989-90 season follows.

Virginia in ACC Openers

Virginia is 19-30 all-time in ACC season openers. UVa is 13-15 in home ACC openers and 6-15 on the road. The Cavaliers have lost their last seven ACC openers. Virginia's last win in an ACC opener was an 81-75 victory at Florida State in the 1994-95 season.

Tonight's game is the third time in 50 years that UVa has opened the ACC season against N.C. State. In its first ACC opener against the Wolfpack, UVa lost to top-ranked N.C.

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State 101-72 in Raleigh on December 7, 1974. Last season, Virginia fell to the Wolfpack 81-74 in Charlottesville on January 5, 2002.

Virginia is 5-3 vs. Wake Forest, 3-2 vs. Florida State, 1-0 vs. Georgia Tech and South Carolina, 8-13 vs. Duke, 1-7 vs. Maryland, 0-2 vs. North Carolina and N.C. State, and 0-1 vs. Clemson all-time in ACC openers.

Gillen Registers 350th Career Win

Virginia head coach Pete Gillen won his 350th career game on December 21 when his Cavaliers posted a 61-57 victory over Rutgers.

Gillen is in his 18th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 353-179 record for a .664 winning percentage. Gillen is in his fifth season at Virginia and has posted a 79-51 record (.608 winning percentage). Gillen won the 300th game of his career when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 87-85 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 14 times in 17 seasons (nine NCAA, five NIT), including the last three seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times – all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

Starting Time Changed

The starting time for Virginia's game at Virginia Tech on January 21 has been changed. The contest will start at 7:30 p.m., 30 minutes later than originally scheduled.

Cavalier Captains

Seniors Travis Watson and Jason Rogers, and junior Majestic Mapp are the captains of the 2002-03 Virginia basketball team.

Billet Closing in on 1,000 Career Points

Junior guard Todd Billet has scored 977 points in his collegiate career and needs just 23 points to reach the 1,000 career point milestone. Billet scored 844 points in two seasons at Rutgers and has scored 133 points this season in a Virginia uniform.

20/20

Against Wofford (Jan. 2), senior forward/center Travis Watson accomplished what no UVa player has been able to do in 20 years – register 20 or more points and rebounds in the same game. In the Cavaliers' 87-65 victory, Watson scored 21 points and pulled down a career-high 20 rebounds.

The last Virginia player to accomplish the feat was Ralph Sampson on Jan. 12, 1983 when he had 33 points and 21 rebounds against N.C. State.

Harper Reinstated

Sophomore guard Jermaine Harper has been reinstated to the team after being suspended for a violation of team rules. Harper missed the Cavaliers' first five games of the season. He did not practice during the suspension.

In the six games Harper has played he is averaging 6.8 points and 2.3 rebounds per game. He is averaging 16.2 minutes of playing time per game.

Tough Early Season Schedule

The Cavaliers played three nationally-ranked teams (Kentucky, Indiana and Michigan State) in their first five

games of the season. It is the first time in school history the Cavaliers played three of their first five games of a season against ranked teams. In the 1963-64, 1968-69, 1991-92 and 1996-97 seasons, UVa played two ranked teams in the first five games of the season.

Two Busy Weeks After Final Exams

After a 13-day break for final exams, the Cavaliers won three games in a span of five days. UVa won the first two games of the stretch – 84-76 over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17) and 72-65 over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19) – at home in University Hall. UVa closed out the stretch with a 61-57 victory at Rutgers (Dec. 21).

Virginia is coming off a stretch where it won three home games in a span of six days. UVa began its homestand with a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) and posted a 77-58 win over Liberty (Dec. 30). The Cavaliers closed their homestand with an 87-65 victory over Wofford (Jan. 2).

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'Hoos Starting

The Cavaliers have played 11 games this season and have used nine different starting lineups. UVA's latest starting lineup featured freshman forward Derrick Byars, senior forward/center Travis Watson, junior center Nick Vander Laan, sophomore guard Keith Jenifer and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith.

The fivesome of Smith, sophomore forward Jason Clark, Vander Laan, Jenifer and junior guard Todd Billet started back-to-back games against Rutgers (Dec. 21) and Georgetown (Dec. 28). Against Liberty (Dec. 30), the Cavaliers' starting lineup consisted of Smith, sophomore forward Elton Brown, Watson, Jenifer and Billet. That same five also started in UVA's victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19).

Billet, Watson, Smith and Jenifer lead the team with nine starts apiece.

Jenifer Finds the Range

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer started off the season making only nine of 34 (26.5 percent) attempts from the field. In his last six games, Jenifer has made 43.3 percent (13-30) of his field goal attempts – admittedly, not a great percentage. However, when Jenifer has stepped behind the three-point line, he has been deadly accurate.

Jenifer has made seven of his last eight three-point attempts (87.5 percent) over the last five games after missing his first six threes of the season. His seven three-pointers this season are five more than he had during the entire 2001-2002 season.

Jenifer is averaging 6.4 points, 5.7 assists and 3.8 rebounds per game this season.

Making Free Throws Down The Stretch

The Cavaliers have struggled from the free throw line this season, making just 68.2 percent (182-267) of their attempts from the charity stripe. However, UVA has been extremely reliable from the charity stripe in the final five minutes of games.

In the first half of games, Virginia is shooting 68.1 percent (62-91) from the line. UVA has made 68.2 percent (120-176) of its attempts in the second half of games. In the final five minutes of games, the Cavaliers have made 68 of 95 attempts for 71.6 percent. (UVA is only 52-81 for 64.2 percent in the first 15 minutes of the second half.) In its last eight games, UVA has made 57 of 73 attempts from the foul line in the final five minutes of games for 78.1 percent.

Cavaliers Finish Second in Maui Invitational

Virginia won two of three games to finish second in the 2002 EASports Maui Invitational (Nov. 25-27) at the Lahaina

Civic Center in Maui, Hawaii. The Cavaliers defeated Chaminade 86-72 (Nov. 25) and 15th-ranked Kentucky 75-61 (Nov. 26) before falling to 19th-ranked Indiana 70-63 (Nov. 27) in the championship game.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson was named to the All-Tournament team. Watson registered two double-doubles and averaged 12.7 points and 11.0 rebounds in the three games. He also blocked nine shots and added seven assists and five steals.

Billet Unkind to Former Team

He was booed all game long, but it didn't faze junior guard Todd Billet, who was making his return to Louis Brown Athletic Center and Rutgers on December 21. Billet, who played for Rutgers for two seasons before transferring to Virginia, scored a game-high 22 points in leading his new team to a 61-57 victory over the Scarlet Knights. Among his 22 points were a pair of free throws with 14 seconds remaining that broke a 57-57 tie and gave the Cavaliers the lead for good.

In two seasons at Rutgers, Billet averaged 14.6 points per game, including 16.6 per game in 2000-01. He also established a school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 in 2000-01.

Billet is second on the team in scoring this season with 12.1 points per game. He tops the Cavaliers in three-point field goals (26) and also leads all ACC players in free throw shooting (37-39 for 94.9 percent).

More Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has picked up where he left off last season as he has recorded five double-doubles this season. With the five double-doubles, Watson has 43 in his career which trails only Ralph Sampson's school record 84 career double-doubles.

Watson's 43 career double-doubles are the most of any active ACC player. Watson, who recorded an ACC-best 17 double-doubles last year, also had double-doubles in both of UVA's 2002-2003 exhibition games.

Vander Laan Joins Growing List

Junior center Nick Vander Laan became the latest Cavalier to set a UVA career-high in scoring (see notes to follow). Vander Laan poured in 17 points in Virginia's 72-65 win over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous UVA best was 10 points against then 19th-ranked Indiana (Nov. 27). Vander Laan's overall career-high is 23 points against Oklahoma in the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

Vander Laan also set a UVA career-best in rebounds with 11 vs. Rutgers (Dec. 21). His previous season-high was eight rebounds on two occasions. Vander Laan's overall career best rebounding game is 13 against Washington during the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

Byars Joins Career High Club

Freshman forward Derrick Byars became another in a long line of Cavaliers to set a career high in scoring. Byars registered career-highs in back-to-back games. Byars scored

16 points, including 14 in the second half, in UVa's 84-76 win over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17). He then scored a game-high 20 points in the Cavaliers' 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous career high was 11 points against Indiana (Nov. 27).

Byars also registered a career-high five steals against Gardner-Webb. His previous career-best was two steals against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet and Smith Net UVa Career Bests

Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward/guard Devin Smith scored career-highs as Cavaliers in UVa's game against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet poured in 28 points off the bench – including 26 in the second half. His career-high is 37 points against James Madison during the 2000-2001 season while playing at Rutgers University. He is averaging 12.1 points per game this season (second on the team).

Smith scored 24 points against the Spartans. He was 9-13 from the floor, including 4-6 from three-point range, and made both of his free throw attempts. Smith is third on the team in scoring at 11.2 points per game.

New Career High for Clark

Sophomore forward Jason Clark scored 12 points – all in the second half – in the Cavaliers' 90-86 win over Long Island (Nov. 22) to establish a new career high. Clark also equaled his career high with 12 points against Rutgers (Dec. 21) in his first start of the season. He also blocked a season-high five shots and grabbed a season-best eight rebounds vs. Rutgers. Clark's former career-best was 11 points against Duke (Jan. 27, 2002).

Brown Nets New Career High for Points

Sophomore forward Elton Brown established a new career high for points in a game when he scored 22 in UVa's 86-72 victory over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Brown, who surpassed his old career best of 20 points against Georgia Tech (Jan. 22, 2002), made eight of 13 shots from the floor and five of seven attempts from the charity stripe.

Jenifer Sets Career Highs

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer became the third returning player to establish a new career high in scoring this season. Jenifer tallied 13 points in UVa's 75-61 victory over Kentucky (Nov. 26). His previous career high was 10 points against Duke (Feb. 28) last season.

Jenifer has also set a new career high for assists. He handed out a career-best seven assists in the season-opener against Long Island (Nov. 22) and then increased his career high to eight against Indiana (Nov. 27). He equaled his career-best with eight assists against Wofford (Jan. 2).

With nine rebounds against Rutgers (Dec. 21), Jenifer set a new career high in that category. His previous career high for rebounds was five on two occasions.

Not Just a Scorer

Sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith came to Virginia with a reputation as a terrific scorer (19.4 ppg, at Coffeyville Community College), but he has also shown a knack for blocking shots. He has blocked nine shots in the last three games, including a season-high four against Liberty (Dec. 30). With 15 blocks this season, Smith is averaging 1.4 per

game and is tied with senior forward/center Travis Watson for the team lead.

Making the Most of His Opportunities

Sophomore forward Jason Clark has only taken 28 shots this season, but he's made 20 baskets for an impressive .714 field goal percentage. He has shot 50 percent or better in every game excluding the three games (Indiana – Nov. 27, East Tennessee State – Dec. 17, and Wofford – Jan. 2) he did not attempt a field goal. Clark has been perfect from the field four times this season. He is shooting 61.9 percent (60-97) from the field in his career.

Home Cookin'

Freshman forward Derrick Byars is averaging 9.5 points per game this season, however, he is averaging better than 12 points per contest in games played at University Hall. Byars is averaging 12.3 points per game in six home games and is averaging only 6.0 points in five games away from home. To go one step further, Byars has only scored one point in UVa's two games on opponents home courts.

Virginia Returns to Postseason Play

The University of Virginia men's basketball team received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2001-02 regular season. UVa lost to South Carolina 74-67 in the first round of the tournament. It was the Cavaliers' ninth NIT appearance and the team's third consecutive postseason appearance. Following the 2000-2001 season, UVa received a bid to the 2001 NCAA Tournament. UVa lost to Gonzaga 86-85 in the first round of the 2001 NCAA South Region Tournament. The game marked the Cavaliers first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997. Virginia made the first of three straight postseason appearances with a bid to the 2000 National Invitation Tournament (NIT). UVa lost to Georgetown 115-111 in triple overtime in the first round of the NIT.

50th Anniversary of the ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference is celebrating its 50th anniversary this season. Former University of Virginia stand-outs Jeff Lamp, Barry Parkhill and Ralph Sampson were named to the 50th Anniversary ACC Men's Basketball Team.

Lamp lettered four times for Virginia from 1978-81, and was a first-team All-America selection in 1980 and 1981. He helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1981 NCAA East Regional and was an All-Tournament selection at the 1981 Final Four. A team captain during his UVa career, Lamp ranks second on Virginia's all-time scoring list with 2,317 points. Lamp was a first-round selection by the Portland Trail Blazers in the 1981 NBA Draft.

Parkhill lettered for Virginia from 1971-73 and was a first-team All-America selection in 1972 and 1973. He was selected the ACC Basketball Player of the Year and the ACC Athlete of the Year in 1972. Parkhill earned first-team All-ACC honors in 1972 and was a second-team All-Conference selection in 1971 and 1973. He was also an All-ACC Tournament selection in 1971 and 1972. He holds Virginia's single-game scoring record with 51 points against Baldwin-Wallace on December 11, 1971. Parkhill was a first-round draft selection by both the Virginia Squires (ABA) and Portland Trail Blazers (NBA) after his collegiate career.

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Sampson lettered four times for Virginia from 1980-83, and was a three-time National and ACC Player of the Year. He was a four-time first-team All-America selection and a three-time first-team All-ACC selection. Sampson received three consecutive Rupp trophies, two consecutive Eastman Awards and two John R. Wooden Awards. He was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 1980. Sampson helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1980 NIT. Sampson holds Virginia career records for rebounds (1,511), field goals made (899) and blocked shots (462). He led the ACC in rebounding three times and ranks fourth on UVa's career scoring list with 2,228 points. Sampson was selected by the Houston Rockets as the NBA's number one draft choice in 1983 and went on to earn NBA Rookie of the Year honors.

Rod Jensen Joins Coaching Staff

Rod Jensen, formerly the head men's basketball coach at Boise State University, joined the University of Virginia's men's basketball coaching staff during the summer. Jensen joined the staff after Tom Herrion left Virginia to become the head coach at the College of Charleston. Other members of head coach Pete Gillen's staff include assistant coaches Walt Fuller and Alexis Sherard, and director of men's basketball operations Scott Shepherd.

Transfers Making Big Impact

Virginia's three transfers – junior guard Todd Billet (Rutgers), junior center Nick Vander Laan (California-Berkeley), and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith (Coffeyville Community College) – have made a big impact on the team in 2002-03. The trio have combined to start 24 times and average 30.0 points and 11.5 rebounds per game. Billet and Smith have made 46 of UVa's 79 three-point field goals this season as well. Billet also leads UVa in free throw percentage (.949 – 37-39) and Smith is second (.750 – 15-20).

Billet and Vander Laan are eligible to play for the Cavaliers during the 2002-03 season after transferring to Virginia prior to the 2001-02 academic year.

Billet, a 6-0 guard from Middletown, N.J., started all 58 games and averaged 14.6 points per game in his two seasons at Rutgers. He is a three-point specialist who established the Rutgers' school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 and tied the school's single-game record when he made eight three-pointers against Lafayette during the 2000-01 season.

Vander Laan, a 6-10 center from Sacramento, Calif., averaged 7.5 points and 6.1 rebounds a game in two seasons at California-Berkeley. He was voted honorable mention Pac-10 All-Freshman following the 1999-2000 season.

The 6-5 Smith averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds per game while earning first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in 2001-02.

Cavaliers Welcome Six Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 6-7 freshman forward Derrick Byars and 6-5 sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith.

Byars, a three-year letterman at Ridgeway High School in Memphis, Tenn., averaged 23.2 points, 10 rebounds and 4.5

assists per game as a high school senior during the 2001-02 season. He shot 37 percent from three-point range and 77 percent from the free throw line. He was a fourth-team *Parade* All-America selection and the Gatorade Player of the Year in Tennessee as a high school senior.

Smith earned first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in Coffeyville, Kan., last season. During the 2001-02 season he averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds a game, shot 51.8 percent (251-485) from the field, including 45.8 percent (108-236) from three-point range, and made 90.2 percent (129-143) of his free throw attempts.

Four additional players joined the Virginia team after participating in open tryouts October 7-8. The players are guard Billy Campbell (6-0, Fr., Atlanta, Ga.), forward Greg Harrell-Edge (6-8, Sr., Vienna, Va.), guard Robert Lodge (6-4, Fr., Raleigh, N.C.) and forward Rob Williams (6-7, So., Martinsville, Va.). Watson Named Candidate for CLASS Award

Senior All-America candidate Travis Watson is one of 36 candidates for the second annual Senior CLASS Award as announced by the award's organizing committee. The Senior CLASS Award – an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School – is presented annually to the nation's senior player-of-the-year for NCAA Division I men's and women's basketball. The award was developed in response to the recent trend of college basketball players leaving college early to turn professional.

Selection criteria is based on a number of factors, the most important being that the recipient must have exhausted his four years of eligibility and have fulfilled his commitment to his respective university. In addition, the recipient must be working toward his degree, be in good academic standing and be of sound moral character.

Ten finalists will appear on the official ballot during the national voting process in March. The winners will be announced during the respective NCAA Final Four events.

Watson 22nd in Scoring

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has moved up to 22nd on the Cavaliers' all-time scoring list with 1,247 career points. He needs 17 points to move past Tony Laquintano (1960-62) into 21st place and 40 points to surpass Cory Alexander (1992-95) for the 20th spot.

Watson Third in Rebounds

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has opened the 2002-2003 season by grabbing 105 rebounds (10.5 per game) in the 10 games he has played. He is now third on Virginia's career rebounding list with 899. Watson needs 31 more rebounds to move past Junior Burrough (1992-95) into second place.

He blocked a career-high tying five shots against Chaminade (Nov. 25) to jump from seventh to fifth place. He needs four blocked shots to move past Steve Castellán (1976-79) for fourth place.

Bench Scoring – 48, 47, 46

Virginia's reserves have played a major role in several of the Cavaliers' wins this season. Reserves have combined to score 46 or more points in three victories this season.

Four Cavaliers off the bench combined to score 48 of UVa's 72 points in a 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). The 48 points are the most this season scored by players off UVa's bench. Freshman forward Derrick Byars and junior center Nick Vander Laan scored 20 and 17 points, respectively.

The previous 2002-2003 high was 47 points in an 86-72 win over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Sophomore forward Elton Brown led the way with 22 points, while sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith added 16 points.

UVa's bench came through again in a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) as the four players who came off the bench combined to score 46 points. Senior forward/center Travis Watson led the way with 16 points, while Brown tallied 14 points.

Watson Posts 21 Points, 20 Rebounds in Win over Wofford

Senior forward/center Travis Watson became the first UVa player since Ralph Sampson to register 20 or more points and rebounds in the same game in leading Virginia to an 87-65 victory over Wofford (Jan. 2) at University Hall. Watson tallied 21 points and a career-high 20 rebounds for his fifth double-double of the season. The 20/20 feat was last accomplished by Sampson on Jan. 12, 1983 against N.C. State (33 points, 21 rebounds).

Freshman forward Derrick Byars and sophomore guard Jermaine Harper joined Watson in double figures with 17 and 11 points, respectively. Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer added a career-high tying eight assists, eight rebounds and seven points.

After falling behind 3-0, the Cavaliers scored 10 consecutive points to take a 10-3 lead three minutes into the game. UVa increased its lead to 19 points (30-11) with 9:33 left in the opening half. Virginia shot 55.2 percent (16-29) in taking a 47-34 halftime lead, including 58.3 percent (7-12) from three-point land.

Sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith opened the second stanza with a three-pointer to increase UVa's lead to 16 points. On five occasions during the second half, Wofford trimmed the Cavalier lead to 14, but could get no closer.

UVa shot 49.2 percent (30-61) in the game while holding the Terriers to 33.3 percent (24-72) shooting. Virginia also held a sizable 51-35 edge in rebounds and recorded a sea-

son-high 19 assists.

Lee Nixon led Wofford with 16 points, while Adrien Borders added 14 points, seven rebounds and three steals.

UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their 2002-2003 exhibition games. Virginia posted an 84-60 victory over Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 10) and a 73-57 exhibition win over One World All-Stars (Nov. 17) at University Hall.

Against Big Apple Basketball, the Cavaliers' starting front court of senior forward/center Travis Watson, junior center Nick Vander Laan and sophomore forward Elton Brown combined for 69 points and 47 rebounds.

Watson picked up where he left off last year and recorded a double-double with a game-high 32 points and 17 rebounds. Watson connected on 14 of 22 shots from the field, including three of six attempts from three-point range. In his first game as a Cavalier, Vander Laan grabbed a game-high 24 rebounds, including 13 offensive, and added 14 points for a double-double. Brown made 10 of 20 attempts from the field en route to 23 points. He also pulled down six rebounds. Junior guard Todd Billet rounded out UVa's double digit scorers with 13 points. He also contributed five rebounds and three assists. Watson, Brown, Vander Laan and Billet combined to score 82 of UVa's 84 points.

The Cavaliers used just eight players in the game as sophomores Jason Clark, Jermaine Harper and Keith Jenifer were serving a one-game suspension for a violation of team rules. Junior Majestic Mapp, sophomore Devin Smith and freshman Derrick Byars missed the game with injuries.

In the 73-57 win over One World All-Stars, Watson registered a double-double with 16 points and 16 rebounds to lead the Cavaliers. He also blocked four shots. Billet led all scorers with 17 points and also recorded a game-high seven assists. Vander Laan and Smith rounded out UVa's double figure scorers. Vander Laan scored 12 points and added seven rebounds, two blocked shots and two assists. In his first game for the Cavaliers, Smith tallied 11 points.

One World All-Stars built a five-point lead (40-35) early in the second half, only to see the Cavaliers quickly respond with baskets by Watson, Billet and Vander Laan. UVa took the lead for good midway through the second half when sophomore forward Elton Brown converted a layup off an offensive rebound to give the Cavaliers a 51-50 lead.

Cavaliers Ink Two

University of Virginia men's head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-6 Gary Forbes of Brooklyn, N.Y., and 6-3 J. R. Reynolds of Roanoke, Va.

Forbes, a guard, averaged 25 points, 11 rebounds and five assists a game as a junior during the 2001-02 season at Benjamin Banneker Academy.

Reynolds, a combination guard, started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic High School before transferring to Oak Hill Academy for his senior year. He scored 2,237 points, made 217 three-point field goals and had 570 assists during his career at Roanoke Catholic. He was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times.

"We are thrilled to officially have these two young men join our Virginia basketball family," Gillen said. "They are both

very talented guards who can play a couple of positions. I sincerely feel they will be impact players on our team next season."

Watson Looks Toward Senior Year

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has been named to the Wooden Award Preseason All-American Basketball Team and is also a preseason Naismith Award candidate. Watson is a third-team preseason All-America selection by *Street & Smith's* and is rated sixth nationally at center in *Lindy's* preseason basketball magazine. Watson added to his already impressive career at UVa by being named to the All-ACC second team after the 2001-02 season. He led the ACC in four statistical categories last season: double-doubles (17), rebounds (9.7 rpg), offensive rebounds (3.43 pg), and defensive rebounds (6.29 pg).

At the ACC's annual Operation Basketball, Watson was selected to the conference's 2002-03 Pre-Season First Team. He received 85 votes, the most of any player. Watson was also second to Duke's Chris Duhon in the Pre-Season ACC Player of the Year voting.

Twelve Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 29 regular-season games before the 2003 ACC Tournament, 12 are against eight teams that participated in either the 2002 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). Two of the games are against national champion Maryland. The Cavaliers also meet league foes Duke, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice. Those teams all participated in last season's NCAA Tournament. In addition to those games, Virginia has played Michigan State, an NCAA participant and Rutgers, which earned an NIT bid.

At the Maui Invitational (November 25-27), UVa played Kentucky (NCAA) and Indiana (NCAA runners-up).
