THE GAME

Virginia stands at 10-5 overall and 1-3 in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2002-2003. In its last outing, UVa fell to Clemson 78-77 (Jan. 18) in Clemson, S.C. Virginia Tech stands at 7-8 overall and 1-2 in the Big East this season. In their last game, the Hokies defeated Providence College 92-79 (Jan. 18) in Blacksburg, Va.

The Series vs. Virginia Tech

Virginia leads the series with Virginia Tech 72-44. Last season, UVa defeated the Hokies 69-61 (Dec. 1) in Charlottesville for its sixth consecutive victory in the series. In the 2000-2001 season, the Cavaliers defeated the Hokies 64-48 (Nov. 24) in Blacksburg. Tech's 48 points are the fewest scored in the series by either team since the second meeting of the 1947-48 season when UVa was held to 43 points (Tech won 57-43 in Blacksburg). It was also the fewest points the Hokies scored in a game in the series since scoring 29 points versus UVa in the 1945-46 season (UVa won 57-29 in Charlottesville). Virginia has won 12 of the last 14 meetings and 23 of the last 28.

This is only the third time since the 1975-76 season the game will not be played on a neutral floor. Over the past 27 years (32 games), the series has been held at the Richmond Coliseum (14 times), Roanoke Civic Center (13 times), Cassell Coliseum (twice, including tonight), The Norfolk Scope (once), the Hampton Coliseum (once), and University Hall (once).

The Cavaliers are 14-23 all-time in games played in Blacksburg. UVa's 64-48 victory in the 2000-2001 season snapped Virginia's 14-game losing streak in Blacksburg. UVa's last win in Blacksburg prior to the 64-48 victory was a 95-73 triumph in the 1953-54 season.

This is the 69th consecutive season the Cavaliers and Hokies have met (every season since 1934-35). They have played 96 games in that span. Virginia's next oldest opponent in terms of consecutive seasons played is Maryland (56 straight seasons including this season).

The Cavaliers' 72 wins against Virginia Tech make the Hokies Virginia's second-most defeated opponent in school history. UVa has defeated VMI a record 99 times.

This is the 117th meeting in the series, the fourth-most played series in school history. North Carolina is Virginia's most frequent opponent with the two teams having met 160 times.

Cavalier Captains

Seniors Travis Watson and Jason Rogers, and junior Majestic Mapp are the captains of the 2002-03 Virginia basketball team.

He's Back

After missing 70 consecutive games spanning 1,032 days, junior guard Majestic Mapp made his long anticipated return to the Cavalier lineup against North Carolina (Jan. 11). Mapp entered the game to a standing ovation with 7:23 remaining in the first half and played just over two minutes.

Mapp had been sidelined after tearing the ACL in his right knee on August 2, 2000. He missed the entire 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons. The last time Mapp had played for UVa was March 15, 2000 against Georgetown in the first round of the National Invitation Tournament.

Mapp did not play in the Cavaliers' last two games (at Duke – Jan. 15 and at Clemson – Jan. 18).

Virginia vs. In-State Teams

This is the Cavaliers' second and final game this season against an in-state opponent. In the last 26 seasons (since 1977-78), UVa is 106-14 (.883) against in-state opponents. Virginia has won 15 consecutive games against in-state teams, including a home victory over Liberty (77-58 – Dec. 30) earlier this season. UVa's most recent in-state loss was a 69-64 setback to Liberty (Jan. 7) in U-Hall in the 1997-98 season.

Last season, Virginia registered home victories against Virginia Tech (69-61 – Dec. 1) and VMI (93-59 – Jan. 24).

In the 2000-2001 season, the Cavaliers won both of their contests against in-state opponents. UVa defeated Virginia Tech 64-48 (Nov. 24) in Blacksburg and VMI 89-70 (Dec. 4) in Lexington.

In 1999-2000, Virginia was 4-0 against in-state opponents with the four victories coming against VMI 98-57 (Nov. 21) at University Hall, Hampton 102-56 (Dec. 10) at the Hampton Convocation Center, Richmond 69-65 (Dec. 21) at the Robins Center, and Virginia Tech 71-66 in overtime (Jan. 24) at the Richmond Coliseum.

In 1998-99, the Cavaliers' were 5-0 against in-state opponents defeating Hampton, Liberty, Virginia Commonwealth, VMI and Virginia Tech. In the 1997-98 season, the Cavaliers were 5-2 against in-state foes. The two losses were the most against state teams since the 1987-88 season when UVa was 1-3 vs. state teams.

Pete Gillen is 15-2 against Virginia schools as a collegiate head coach. He is 4-0 vs. VMI, 2-0 vs. Hampton and Liberty, 1-0 vs. Richmond, 5-1 vs. Virginia Tech, and 1-1 vs. VCU.

Gillen's Xavier team defeated Virginia Tech 85-52 in 1993-94, while his 1994-95 Providence team lost to the Hokies 91-78 in the NIT. In the 1993-94 season, Gillen's Xavier team lost to VCU 79-76.

Virginia vs. the Big East Conference

The Cavaliers are 119-87 (.578) against the 14 schools in the Big East Conference. Most of the games occurred prior to a school's membership in the Big East. Tonight's game is Virginia's third and final contest against a Big East team this season. UVa posted a 61-57 win at Rutgers (Dec. 21) and a 79-75 home win over Georgetown (Dec. 28). The win over Georgetown marked UVa's sixth consecutive victory over a Big East team. Virginia's last loss to a Big East foe was to Georgetown (115-111 3 OT – Mar. 15) in the 2000 NIT.

In all games against the current membership of the Big East, Virginia is 72-44 vs. Virginia Tech, 11-12 vs. Georgetown, 8-8 vs. West Virginia, 7-3 vs. Pittsburgh, 5-1 vs. Notre Dame, 4-1 vs. Villanova, 3-0 vs. Boston College and Rutgers, 3-1 vs. Providence, 2-6 vs. Connecticut, 1-1 vs. Syracuse, 0-2 vs. Miami (Fla.) and Seton Hall, and 0-6 vs. St. John's.

Virginia was the only ACC school to win all three games in the defunct ACC-Big East Challenge held from 1989-91. Syracuse was the only Big East school to win all three games in the challenge.

Cavaliers to Face One of Their Own

Virginia Tech is coached by former UVa player and assistant coach Ricky Stokes. Stokes, in his fourth year as the Hokies' head coach, is a 1984 graduate of Virginia. He served as a graduate assistant at UVa in the 1984-85 season and was an assistant coach in the 1997-98 campaign.

Stokes holds the Virginia school record for games played as he appeared in all 134 contests from 1980-81 through 1983-84. The Cavaliers posted a 109-25 overall record and a 43-13 mark in ACC play during Stokes' career and twice advanced to the "Final Four".

Don't Be Surprised By the Unusual Tonight

Virginia and Virginia Tech have met in some peculiar games and wild finishes through the years.

Last season, Virginia Tech built a 19-point first half lead and led by 16 (43-27) at the intermission. The Cavaliers outscored Virginia Tech 42-18 in the second half for a 69-61 victory (Dec. 1) at University Hall.

The Cavaliers opened the second half with a 25-8 run to take their first lead of the game, 52-51, with 8:34 left on a running jumper by guard Keith Jennifer. UVa grabbed the lead for good, 60-59, on a jumper by guard Roger Mason, Jr., with 2:13 to play.

In the 2000-2001 season, UVa posted a 64-48 win over Virginia Tech (Nov. 24) at Cassell Coliseum, its largest margin

of victory in the series since an 86-61 triumph in the 1990-91 season. Tech's 48 points are the fewest scored in the series by either team since the second meeting of the 1947-48 season when UVa was held to 43 points (Tech won 57-43 in Blacksburg). It was also the fewest points the Hokies scored in a game in the series since scoring 29 points versus UVa in the 1945-46 season (UVa won 57-29 in Charlottesville).

It also marked the first time since the 1975-76 season the game was not played on a neutral floor.

In 1999-2000, the Cavaliers won 71-66 in overtime (Jan. 24) at the Richmond Coliseum, the fourth time a game in the series has been decided in an extra session. All four overtime games have come since the 1975-76 season, including three since 1988-89.

In the 1999-2000 game, UVa built a 12-point lead midway through the second half, only to see Virginia Tech use a 13-0 run to take a 54-53 lead with just over five minutes to play. UVa briefly regained the lead only to see the Hokies go on a 6-0 run to take a 60-56 edge. The Cavaliers scored the final four points of regulation to force overtime, before prevailing in the extra session.

The 1998-99 matchup in Richmond wasn't as close as some games in previous years, but it was unique. UVa won by nine points, 64-55, but the game could have been extremely close had the Hokies been able to capitalize on some Virginia miscues. Virginia committed 23 turnovers in the game (Virginia Tech had 11), but the Cavaliers overcame that by shooting 53.5 percent (23-43) from the field. On the other hand, the Hokies shot 27.5 percent (19-69) from the floor, the lowest percentage by a UVa opponent that season. The Hokies managed 22 offensive rebounds, but only 11 second chance points. Despite giving up 22 offensive rebounds, UVa managed to grab 29 missed Virginia Tech shots.

The Cavaliers won 58-57 in the 1996-97 season in Richmond in a game that hinged on the last shot. The Hokies had two opportunities to win in the last 10 seconds, but weren't able to connect. Brendan Dunlop missed a runner in the lane, but got the rebound and called timeout following a mad scramble with five seconds left. With time running down, Tech's Jim Jackson drove into the lane and lost control of the ball. Norman Nolan grabbed the ball as Virginia held on to win.

Virginia's 63-62 victory in 1995 in Richmond was a tight contest throughout. Harold Deane's running jumper in the lane with 17.2 seconds remaining proved to be the winning basket for UVa. The Hokies' Shawn Smith had a chance to win it for Tech in the final seconds, but his jumper rimmed out and Tech could not control the rebound as time expired.

Jason Williford was Virginia's hero in that game. Playing in his final college game in his hometown, he brought the Cavaliers back from a seven-point deficit in the game's final 2:34. He scored eight of Virginia's last 10 points in the final two minutes to rally the Cavaliers. He made a steal in the backcourt, converted it into a layup, drew a foul and hit the ensuing free throw with 53.8 seconds left to put UVa ahead for just the second time in the second half at 61-60. Tech's Ace Custis made two free throws with 34.3 seconds left to set the stage for Deane's game-winning basket.

Virginia shot over 50 percent from the field only once during the 1993-94 season, but it came in a 70-61 win over the Hokies in Roanoke. The Cavaliers shot 51.1 percent in defeating the Hokies.

The 1989 meeting played at the Richmond Coliseum is

the second-highest scoring game in UVa history. The Cavaliers needed overtime, but posted a 113-106 win.

Virginia built a 16-point lead early in the second half of the 1993 game in Richmond, but scored only 12 points in the final 16 minutes and dropped a 59-53 decision to the Hokies. The Cavaliers made five field goals in the second half, including three in the final 18 minutes.

Virginia posted a 61-57 double overtime win at the Roanoke Civic Center in 1992. The Cavaliers shot 33.3 percent from the field for the game and managed to pull out the win. That was the lowest UVa had shot and won since January 12, 1977. On that day, the Cavaliers shot 28.9 percent (13-45) in a 55-50 win over Virginia Tech.

Last Season vs. Virginia Tech

Trailing by as many as 19 points in the first half and by 16 points at halftime, the Cavaliers outscored in-state rival Virginia Tech 42-18 in the second half to register a 69-61 win over the Hokies (Dec. 1) at University Hall.

Virginia Tech shot 51.5 percent (17-33) from the field and made seven of 10 three-point attempts in taking a 43-27 half-time lead. The Cavaliers opened the second half with a 25-8 run to take their first lead of the game, 52-51, with 8:34 left on a running jumper by guard Keith Jennifer. UVa grabbed the lead for good, 60-59, on a jumper by guard Roger Mason, Jr., with 2:13 to play.

Mason led all scorers in the game with 22 points and added six rebounds and four assists. Forward Chris Williams tallied 16 points, five rebounds, four steals and three assists. Forward/center Travis Watson led Virginia with eight rebounds and added seven points.

Carlos Dixon and Bryant Matthews both scored 12 points for Virginia Tech, while Carlton Carter registered a double-double with 10 points and 15 rebounds.

Gillen Registers 350th Career Win

Virginia head coach Pete Gillen won his 350th career game on December 21 when his Cavaliers posted a 61-57 victory over Rutgers.

Gillen is in his 18th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 354-182 record for a .660 winning percentage. Gillen is in his fifth season at Virginia and has posted an 80-54 record (.597 winning percentage). Gillen won the 300th game of his career when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 87-85 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 14 times in 17 seasons (nine NCAA, five NIT), including the last three seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times – all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

The Cavaliers' 87-65 victory (Jan. 2) over Wofford marked their 200th victory over a non-conference opponent at University Hall since the building opened for the 1965-66 season. Virginia is 200-29 for an impressive .873 winning percentage all-time in University Hall against non-conference opponents.

'Hoos Starting

The Cavaliers have played 15 games this season and have used eight different starting lineups. UVa's latest starting lineup (vs. Clemson – Jan. 18) featured sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith, senior forward/center Travis Watson, junior center Nick Vander Laan, sophomore guard Keith Jenifer and junior guard Todd Billet. The same five started UVa's game against East Tennessee State (Dec. 17).

Billet, Watson and Jenifer lead the team with 13 starts apiece. Smith has started 11 games, while freshman forward Derrick Byars and sophomore forward Elton Brown have eight starts. Eight different players have started games this season for Virginia.

Billet Scores 1,000th Career Point

Junior guard Todd Billet reached the 1,000 point milestone in UVa's 79-72 win over North Carolina (Jan. 11). Billet scored his 1,000th career point with a three-point field goal with 4:15 remaining in the first half. Billet tallied 24 points in the game against North Carolina. He has scored 1,054 points in his collegiate career. Billet scored 844 points in two seasons at Rutgers and has scored 210 points this season in a Virginia uniform.

20/20

Against Wofford (Jan. 2), senior forward/center Travis Watson accomplished what no UVa player has been able to do in 20 years – register 20 or more points and rebounds in the same game. In the Cavaliers' 87-65 victory, Watson scored 21 points and pulled down a career-high 20 rebounds.

The last Virginia player to accomplish the feat was Ralph Sampson on Jan. 12, 1983 when he had 33 points and 21 rebounds against N.C. State.

Billet and Watson Among NCAA Leaders

Junior guard Todd Billet and senior forward/center Travis Watson are ranked among the NCAA Division I leaders in free throw percentage and rebounding, respectively, for games played through Jan. 13.

Billet is tied with Matt Logie of Lehigh for fourth in free throw percentage at 93.3 percent. Billet has improved his free throw percentage to 94.3 percent (50-53).

Watson is ninth among all Division I players in rebounds with an average of 10.8 per game. Watson is currently averaging 10.1 rebounds (142 rebounds in 14 games).

Shooting 50 Percent From the Field

The Cavaliers have shot 50 percent or better in four games this season and are only 2-2 in those games (Virginia is 8-3 when it shoots below 50 percent). The two games UVa shot 50 percent and lost, it outshot its opponent (Duke – 50.8 to 50.0 and Clemson – 59.2 to 55.4). Virginia is the only ACC school this year to lose a game when shooting 50 percent or better.

2002-2003 UVa ACC Players of the Week

Jan. 6 – Travis Watson

Jan. 13 – Todd Billet

Junior guard Todd Billet was named the Co-ACC Player of the Week on January 13 after scoring 24 points in UVa's 79-72 home victory over North Carolina (Jan. 11). He also had three rebounds, two assists and two steals in the win. Billet was eight for 15 from the field, including six of 11 from three-point range. He also made both free throw attempts.

Billet reached a career milestone in the victory as he scored his 1,000th career point with a three-point field goal with 4:15 remaining in the first half.

He shared the award with Duke's Dahntay Jones.

Four Consecutive Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson had his streak of double-doubles in four consecutive games snapped against Duke (Jan. 15). He has seven double-doubles this season (see page 5 of the notes for a listing of those double-doubles). It marks the third time in his career Watson recorded four consecutive double-doubles (he did it twice last season). The last player other than Watson to notch four consecutive double-doubles was in the 1997-98 season when Norman Nolan accomplished the feat. Nolan posted consecutive double-doubles against Clemson (Feb. 21) - 24 pts., 12 rebs., Maryland (Feb. 24) - 26 pts., 15 rebs., Florida State (Feb. 28) - 24 pts., 10 rebs., and Duke (Mar. 3) - 13 pts., 15 rebs.

Ralph Sampson is the last UVa player to have five consecutive double-doubles as he concluded his stellar career with five double-doubles in a row in the 1982-83 season. Sampson's career high for consecutive double-doubles is nine, but interestingly enough, that is not the school record. Norm Carmichael posted a school record 12 consecutive double-doubles in the 1967-68 season.

Watson has led UVa in rebounding in 11 of 15 games this season and is averaging an ACC-best 10.1 boards per game. He is also averaging a team-high 15.1 points per game (11th in the ACC) and is shooting 57.3 percent (82-143) from the field (2nd in the ACC).

Harper Reinstated

Sophomore guard Jermaine Harper has been reinstated to the team after being suspended for a violation of team rules. Harper missed the Cavaliers' first five games of the season. He did not practice during the suspension.

In the 10 games Harper has played he is averaging 5.6 points and 1.7 rebounds per game. He is averaging 15.2 minutes of playing time per game.

Jenifer Finds the Range

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer started off the season making only nine of 34 (26.5 percent) attempts from the field. In his last 10 games, Jenifer has made 41.1 percent (23-56) of his field goal attempts – admittedly, not a great percentage. However, when Jenifer has stepped behind the three-point line, he has been deadly accurate.

Jenifer has made 10 of his last 16 three-point attempts (62.5 percent) over the last nine games after missing his first six threes of the season. His 10 three-pointers this season are eight more than he had during the entire 2001-2002 season.

He has scored seven or more points in a game eight times this season after scoring seven or more points in only six games last year. He has reached double figures in scoring three times in 2002-2003 after reaching double digits in points only once last season.

Jenifer is averaging 6.7 points, 5.5 assists (6th in the ACC) and 3.7 rebounds per game this season.

Making Free Throws Down The Stretch

The Cavaliers have struggled from the free throw line this season, making just 67.7 percent (237-350) of their attempts from the charity stripe. However, UVa has been more reliable from the charity stripe in the final five minutes of games.

In the first half of games, Virginia is shooting 67.9 percent (76-112) from the line. UVa has made 67.6 percent (161-238) of its attempts in the second half of games. In the final five minutes of games, the Cavaliers have made 85 of 121

attempts for 70.2 percent. (UVa is only 76-117 for 65.0 percent in the first 15 minutes of the second half.) In its last 11 games, UVa has made 74 of 99 attempts from the foul line in the final five minutes of games for 74.7 percent.

Cavaliers Finish Second in Maui Invitational

Virginia won two of three games to finish second in the 2002 EA Sports Maui Invitational (Nov. 25-27) at the Lahaina Civic Center in Maui, Hawaii. The Cavaliers defeated Chaminade 86-72 (Nov. 25) and 15th-ranked Kentucky 75-61 (Nov. 26) before falling to 19th-ranked Indiana 70-63 (Nov. 27) in the championship game.

Senior forward/center Travis Watson was named to the All-Tournament team. Watson registered two double-doubles and averaged 12.7 points and 11.0 rebounds in the three games. He also blocked nine shots and added seven assists and five steals.

Billet Unkind to Former Team

He was booed all game long, but it didn't faze junior guard Todd Billet, who was making his return to Louis Brown Athletic Center and Rutgers on December 21. Billet, who played for Rutgers for two seasons before transferring to Virginia, scored a game-high 22 points in leading his new team to a 61-57 victory over the Scarlet Knights. Among his 22 points were a pair of free throws with 14 seconds remaining that broke a 57-57 tie and gave the Cavaliers the lead for good.

In two seasons at Rutgers, Billet averaged 14.6 points per game, including 16.6 per game in 2000-01. He also established a school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 in 2000-01.

Billet is second on the team in scoring this season with 14.0 points per game. He tops the Cavaliers in three-point field goals (42) and also leads all ACC players in free throw shooting (50-53 for 94.3 percent).

More Double-Doubles

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has picked up where he left off last season as he has recorded seven double-doubles this season, including a stretch of four consecutive double-doubles, which was snapped against Duke (Jan. 15). With the seven double-doubles, Watson has 45 in his career which trails only Ralph Sampson's school record 84 career double-doubles.

Watson's 45 career double-doubles are the most of any active ACC player. Watson, who recorded an ACC-best 17 double-doubles last year, also had double-doubles in both of UVa's 2002-2003 exhibition games.

Duke Ties a Record

In UVa's game against Duke (Jan. 15), the Blue Devils made 37 of 40 free throws (92.5 percent) with the 37 made free throws tying the school record for most free throws made in a game by a Virginia opponent. St. Joseph's (Pa.) made 37 free throws (43 attempts) against UVa on February 21, 1958.

Vander Laan Joins Growing List

Junior center Nick Vander Laan became the latest Cavalier to set a UVa career-high in scoring (see notes to follow). Vander Laan poured in 17 points in Virginia's 72-65 win over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous UVa best was 10 points against then 19th-ranked Indiana (Nov. 27). Vander Laan's overall career-high is 23 points against Oklahoma in the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

Vander Laan also set a UVa career-best in rebounds with 11 vs. Rutgers (Dec. 21). His previous season-high was eight rebounds on two occasions. Vander Laan's overall career best rebounding game is 13 against Washington during the 1999-2000 season while playing for Cal-Berkeley.

Byars Joins Career High Club

Freshman forward Derrick Byars became another in a long line of Cavaliers to set a career high in scoring. Byars registered career-highs in back-to-back games. Byars scored 16 points, including 14 in the second half, in UVa's 84-76 win over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17). He then scored a game-high 20 points in the Cavaliers' 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). His previous career high was 11 points against Indiana (Nov. 27).

Byars also registered a career-high five steals against Gardner-Webb. His previous career-best was two steals against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet and Smith Net UVa Career Bests

Junior guard Todd Billet and sophomore forward/guard Devin Smith scored career-highs as Cavaliers in UVa's game against Michigan State (Dec. 4).

Billet poured in 28 points off the bench – including 26 in the second half. His career-high is 37 points against James Madison during the 2000-2001 season while playing at Rutgers University. He is averaging 14.0 points per game this season (second on the team).

Smith scored 24 points against the Spartans. He was 9-13 from the floor, including 4-6 from three-point range, and made both of his free throw attempts. Smith is third on the team in scoring at 10.3 points per game.

New Career High for Clark

Sophomore forward Jason Clark scored 12 points – all in the second half – in the Cavaliers' 90-86 win over Long Island (Nov. 22) to establish a new career high. Clark equaled his career high with 12 points against Rutgers (Dec. 21) in his first start of the season. He also blocked a season-high five shots and grabbed a season-best eight rebounds vs. Rutgers. Clark's former career-best was 11 points against Duke (Jan. 27, 2002).

Brown Nets New Career High for Points

Sophomore forward Elton Brown established a new career high for points in a game when he scored 22 in UVa's 86-72 victory over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Brown, who surpassed his old career best of 20 points against Georgia Tech (Jan. 22, 2002), made eight of 13 shots from the floor and five of seven attempts from the charity stripe.

Jenifer Sets Career Highs

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer became the third returning player to establish a new career high in scoring this season. Jenifer tallied 13 points in UVa's 75-61 victory over

Kentucky (Nov. 26). His previous career high was 10 points against Duke (Feb. 28) last season.

Jenifer has also set a new career high for assists. He handed out a career-best seven assists in the season-opener against Long Island (Nov. 22) and then increased his career high to eight against Indiana (Nov. 27). He equaled his career-best with eight assists against Wofford (Jan. 2).

With nine rebounds against Rutgers (Dec. 21), Jenifer set a new career high in that category. His previous career high for rebounds was five on two occasions.

Jenifer Sets Career-High

Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer has handed out 83 assists (5.5 per game) this season and has surpassed his previous career high of 80. Jenifer has a 1.98 to 1 assist to turnover ratio this season (5th in the ACC).

Not Just a Scorer

Sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith came to Virginia with a reputation as a terrific scorer (19.4 ppg, at Coffeyville Community College), but he has also shown a knack for blocking shots. He has blocked 14 shots in the last seven games, including a season-high four against Liberty (Dec. 30). With 20 blocks this season (1.3 per game), Smith is tied with senior forward/center Travis Watson for the team lead.

Making the Most of His Opportunities

Sophomore forward Jason Clark has only taken 34 shots this season, but he's made 25 baskets for an impressive .735 field goal percentage. He has shot 50 percent or better in every game excluding the three games (Indiana – Nov. 27, East Tennessee State – Dec. 17, and Wofford – Jan. 2) he did not attempt a field goal. Clark has been perfect from the field six times this season. He is shooting 63.1 percent (65-103) from the field in his career. In ACC contests during his career, Clark is 32-43 for an amazing 74.4 percent.

Home Cookin'

Freshman forward Derrick Byars is averaging 7.6 points per game this season, however, he is averaging better than 10 points per contest in games played at University Hall. (His average at home was 12.3 points per game prior to not scoring against North Carolina. He injured his left shoulder early in the game against UNC and played only eight minutes). Byars is averaging 10.6 points per game in seven home games and is averaging only 5.0 points in eight games away from home. To go one step further, Byars has only scored 11 points in UVa's five games on opponents home courts.

Billet Heating Up

In his last three games, junior guard Todd Billet has averaged 22.3 points per game. He has made 21 of 37 attempts from the field for 56.8 percent and 15 of 26 three-point attempts for 57.7 percent. Billet made a season-high seven three-pointers against Clemson (Jan. 18) which ties for the sixth highest single game total in school history.

Billet is averaging 14.0 points per game overall (12th in the ACC) and 19.3 points per ACC contest. On the season, Billet has made 42 three-point field goals (2.8 per game – 3rd in the ACC) and is shooting 39.3 percent from behind the arc (6th in the ACC). In ACC play, he has made 16 of 32 three-point attempts.

Brown Finds His Touch

In his last three games, sophomore forward Elton Brown is averaging 15.0 points per game and is shooting 60.7 percent (17-28) from the field. Brown is averaging 10.1 points per game overall and 13.5 points per game in ACC play.

Watson Heating Up

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has scored in double figures in his last seven games and is averaging 17.6 points per game in those seven contests. On the season, he is averaging 15.1 points per game overall and 16.5 in ACC games.

Watson is shooting a team-best 57.3 percent (82-143) from the field this season and has shot better than 50 percent nine times (in 14 games). Over the last seven games, he has connected on 62.5 percent (45-72) on his field goal attempts and has shot better than 50 percent in each of those contests.

When Watson has shot from inside the three-point arc this season, he is 80-128 (62.5 percent). He is just 2-15 (13.3 percent) from three-point range.

Watson Second in Rebounds

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has opened the 2002-2003 season by grabbing 142 rebounds (an ACC-best 10.1 per game) in the 14 games he has played. He is now second on Virginia's career rebounding list with 936.

Senior Travis Watson ranks among Virginia's all-time leaders in blocked shots. Watson has 110 career blocked shots and ranks fourth all-time. He blocked a career-high tying five shots against Chaminade (Nov. 25) to jump from seventh to fifth place. He needs 17 blocked shots to move past Kris Hunter (1997-99) for third place.

Watson 20th in Scoring

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has moved up to 20th on the Cavaliers' all-time scoring list with 1,313 career points. He needs nine points to move past Norman Nolan (1995-98) into 19th place.

Tough Early Season Schedule

The Cavaliers played three nationally-ranked teams (Kentucky, Indiana and Michigan State) in their first five games of the season. It is the first time in school history the Cavaliers played three of their first five games of a season against ranked teams. In the 1963-64, 1968-69, 1991-92 and 1996-97 seasons, UVA played two ranked teams in the first five games of the season.

Virginia Returns to Postseason Play

The University of Virginia men's basketball team received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2001-02 regular season. UVA lost to South Carolina 74-67 in the first round of the tournament. It was the Cavaliers' ninth NIT appearance and the team's third consecutive postseason appearance. Following the 2000-2001 season, UVA received a bid to the

50th ANNIVERSARY OF THE ACC

The Atlantic Coast Conference is celebrating its 50th anniversary this season. Former University of Virginia standouts **Jeff Lamp, Barry Parkhill** and **Ralph Sampson** were named to the 50th Anniversary ACC Men's Basketball Team.

Lamp lettered four times for Virginia from 1978-81, and was a first-team All-America selection in 1980 and 1981. He helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1981 NCAA East Regional and was an All-Tournament selection at the 1981 Final Four. A team captain during his UVA career, Lamp ranks second on Virginia's all-time scoring list with 2,317 points. Lamp was a first-round selection by the Portland Trail Blazers in the 1981 NBA Draft.

Parkhill lettered for Virginia from 1971-73 and was a first-team All-America selection in 1972 and 1973. He was selected the ACC Basketball Player of the Year and the ACC Athlete of the Year in 1972. Parkhill earned first-team All-ACC honors in 1972 and was a second-team All-Conference selection in 1971 and 1973. He was also an All-ACC Tournament selection in 1971 and 1972. He holds Virginia's single-game scoring record with 51 points against Baldwin-Wallace on December 11, 1971. Parkhill was a first-round draft selection by both the Virginia Squires (ABA) and Portland Trail Blazers (NBA) after his collegiate career.

Sampson lettered four times for Virginia from 1980-83, and was a three-time National and ACC Player of the Year. He was a four-time first-team All-America selection and a three-time first-team All-ACC selection. Sampson received three consecutive Rupp trophies, two consecutive Eastman Awards and two John R. Wooden Awards. He was the ACC Rookie of the Year in 1980. Sampson helped lead the Cavaliers to the 1980 NIT Championship and the 1981 NCAA Final Four. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 1980 NIT. Sampson holds Virginia career records for rebounds (1,511), field goals made (899) and blocked shots (462). He led the ACC in rebounding three times and ranks fourth on UVA's career scoring list with 2,228 points. Sampson was selected by the Houston Rockets as the NBA's number one draft choice in 1983 and went on to earn NBA Rookie of the Year honors.

2001 NCAA Tournament. UVa lost to Gonzaga 86-85 in the first round of the 2001 NCAA South Region Tournament. The game marked the Cavaliers first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1997. Virginia made the first of three straight postseason appearances with a bid to the 2000 National Invitation Tournament (NIT). UVa lost to Georgetown 115-111 in triple overtime in the first round of the NIT.

Transfers Making Big Impact

Virginia's three transfers – junior guard Todd Billet (Rutgers), junior center Nick Vander Laan (California-Berkeley), and sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith (Coffeyville Community College) – have made a big impact on the team in 2002-03. The trio have combined to start 31 times and average 31.1 points and 10.9 rebounds per game. Billet and Smith have made 66 of UVa's 108 three-point field goals this season as well. Billet also leads UVa in free throw percentage (.943 – 50-53) and Smith is second (.769 – 20-26).

Billet and Vander Laan are eligible to play for the Cavaliers during the 2002-03 season after transferring to Virginia prior to the 2001-02 academic year.

Billet, a 6-0 guard from Middletown, N.J., started all 58 games and averaged 14.6 points per game in his two seasons at Rutgers. He is a three-point specialist who established the Rutgers' school record for three-pointers in a season with 82 and tied the school's single-game record when he made eight three-pointers against Lafayette during the 2000-01 season.

Vander Laan, a 6-10 center from Sacramento, Calif., averaged 7.5 points and 6.1 rebounds a game in two seasons at California-Berkeley. He was voted honorable mention Pac-10 All-Freshman following the 1999-2000 season.

The 6-5 Smith averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds per game while earning first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in 2001-02.

Bench Scoring – 48, 47, 46

Virginia's reserves have played a major role in several of the Cavaliers' wins this season. Reserves have combined to score 46 or more points in three victories this season.

Four Cavaliers off the bench combined to score 48 of UVa's 72 points in a 72-65 victory over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19). The 48 points are the most this season scored by players off UVa's bench. Freshman forward Derrick Byars and junior center Nick Vander Laan scored 20 and 17 points, respectively.

The previous 2002-2003 high was 47 points in an 86-72 win over Chaminade (Nov. 25). Sophomore forward Elton Brown led the way with 22 points, while sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith added 16 points.

UVa's bench came through again in a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) as the four players who came off the bench combined to score 46 points. Senior forward/center Travis Watson led the way with 16 points, while Brown tallied 14 points.

Two Busy Weeks After Final Exams

After a 13-day break for final exams, the Cavaliers won three games in a span of five days. UVa won the first two games of the stretch – 84-76 over East Tennessee State (Dec. 17) and 72-65 over Gardner-Webb (Dec. 19) – at home

in University Hall. UVa closed out the stretch with a 61-57 victory at Rutgers (Dec. 21).

Virginia then won three home games in a span of six days. UVa began its homestand with a 79-75 victory over Georgetown (Dec. 28) and posted a 77-58 win over Liberty (Dec. 30). The Cavaliers closed their homestand with an 87-65 victory over Wofford (Jan. 2).

Rod Jensen Joins Coaching Staff

Rod Jensen, formerly the head men's basketball coach at Boise State University, joined the University of Virginia's men's basketball coaching staff during the summer. Jensen joined the staff after Tom Herrion left Virginia to become the head coach at the College of Charleston. Other members of head coach Pete Gillen's staff include assistant coaches Walt Fuller and Alexis Sherard, and director of men's basketball operations Scott Shepherd.

Cavaliers Welcome Six Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 6-7 freshman forward Derrick Byars and 6-5 sophomore guard/forward Devin Smith.

Byars, a three-year letterman at Ridgeway High School in Memphis, Tenn., averaged 23.2 points, 10 rebounds and 4.5 assists per game as a high school senior during the 2001-02 season. He shot 37 percent from three-point range and 77 percent from the free throw line. He was a fourth-team *Parade* All-America selection and the Gatorade Player of the Year in Tennessee as a high school senior.

Smith earned first-team Junior College All-America honors as a freshman at Coffeyville Community College in Coffeyville, Kan., last season. During the 2001-02 season he averaged 19.4 points and 6.6 rebounds a game, shot 51.8 percent (251-485) from the field, including 45.8 percent (108-236) from three-point range, and made 90.2 percent (129-143) of his free throw attempts.

Four additional players joined the Virginia team after participating in open tryouts October 7-8. The players are guard Billy Campbell (6-0, Fr., Atlanta, Ga.), forward Greg Harrell-Edge (6-8, Sr., Vienna, Va.), guard Robert Lodge (6-4, Fr., Raleigh, N.C.) and forward Rob Williams (6-7, So., Martinsville, Va.). Watson Named Candidate for CLASS Award

Senior All-America candidate Travis Watson is one of 36 candidates for the second annual Senior CLASS Award as announced by the award's organizing committee. The Senior CLASS Award – an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School – is presented annually to the nation's senior player-of-the-year for NCAA Division I men's and women's basketball. The award was developed in response to the recent trend of college basketball players leaving college early to turn professional.

Selection criteria is based on a number of factors, the most important being that the recipient must have exhausted his four years of eligibility and have fulfilled his commitment to his respective university. In addition, the recipient must be working toward his degree, be in good academic standing and be of sound moral character.

Ten finalists will appear on the official ballot during the national voting process in March. The winners will be announced during the respective NCAA Final Four events.

UVa Falls One Point Short at Clemson

Virginia shot a season-high 59.2 percent (29-49) from the field, but came up one point short, falling to Clemson 78-77 (Jan. 18) in Clemson, S.C. The Tigers' Olu Babalola made a pair of free throws with 5.7 seconds remaining to push Clemson into the lead for good. Sophomore guard Keith Jenifer's three-pointer at the buzzer just missed.

Junior guard Todd Billet scored a game-high 25 points and connected on a UVa career-best seven three-pointers. He was nine of 13 from the field overall and seven of 11 from three-point range. Sophomore forward Elton Brown scored 16 points off the bench, while senior forward/center Travis Watson posted 12 points, eight rebounds and three assists. Junior center Nick Vander Laan rounded out UVa's double figure scorers with 10 points.

Neither team led by more than five points in the second half (Clemson held a 55-50 lead at the 12:03 mark). The game was tied six times and there were also nine lead changes in the final stanza.

Brown gave UVa a 74-71 edge with a bank shot at the 2:16 mark. Clemson scored the next five points on a free throw by Edward Scott and back-to-back baskets by Chey Christie. Billet drilled his seventh three of the game with 33 seconds left to put UVa back up 77-76. Babalola then grabbed an offensive rebound and was fouled by Brown with 5.7 seconds left. He made the ensuing free throws to give Clemson a 78-77 lead.

The Cavaliers held a 27-18 advantage with 6:52 to play in the first half, but led by only one, 43-42 at halftime, despite shooting 65.4 percent (17-26) from the field. Clemson was equally impressive from the field making 18 of 28 attempts (64.3 percent).

Virginia shot 59.2 percent while Clemson connected on 55.4 percent (31-56) from the floor for the game. UVa also made 10 of 21 (47.6 percent) of its three-point attempts. The Cavaliers held a slim 28-27 advantage in rebounds as well.

Christie led the Tigers with 16 points and had three assists and three steals, while Scott added 13 points, eight assists and three steals.

UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their 2002-2003 exhibition games. Virginia posted an 84-60 victory over Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 10) and a 73-57 exhibition win over One World All-Stars (Nov. 17) at University Hall.

Against Big Apple Basketball, the Cavaliers' starting front court of senior forward/center Travis Watson, junior center Nick Vander Laan and sophomore forward Elton Brown combined for 69 points and 47 rebounds.

Watson picked up where he left off last year and recorded a double-double with a game-high 32 points and 17 rebounds. Watson connected on 14 of 22 shots from the field, including three of six attempts from three-point range. In his first game as a Cavalier, Vander Laan grabbed a game-high 24 rebounds, including 13 offensive, and added 14 points for a double-double. Brown made 10 of 20 attempts from the field en route to 23 points. He also pulled down six rebounds. Junior guard Todd Billet rounded out UVa's double digit scorers with 13 points. He also contributed five rebounds and three assists. Watson, Brown, Vander Laan and Billet combined to score 82 of UVa's 84 points.

The Cavaliers used just eight players in the game as sophomores Jason Clark, Jermaine Harper and Keith Jenifer

were serving a one-game suspension for a violation of team rules. Junior Majestic Mapp, sophomore Devin Smith and freshman Derrick Byars missed the game with injuries.

In the 73-57 win over One World All-Stars, Watson registered a double-double with 16 points and 16 rebounds to lead the Cavaliers. He also blocked four shots. Billet led all scorers with 17 points and also recorded a game-high seven assists. Vander Laan and Smith rounded out UVa's double figure scorers. Vander Laan scored 12 points and added seven rebounds, two blocked shots and two assists. In his first game for the Cavaliers, Smith tallied 11 points.

One World All-Stars built a five-point lead (40-35) early in the second half, only to see the Cavaliers quickly respond with baskets by Watson, Billet and Vander Laan. UVa took the lead for good midway through the second half when sophomore forward Elton Brown converted a layup off an offensive rebound to give the Cavaliers a 51-50 lead.

Cavaliers Ink Two

University of Virginia men's head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-6 Gary Forbes of Brooklyn, N.Y., and 6-3 J. R. Reynolds of Roanoke, Va.

Forbes, a guard, averaged 25 points, 11 rebounds and five assists a game as a junior during the 2001-02 season at Benjamin Banneker Academy.

Reynolds, a combination guard, started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic High School before transferring to Oak Hill Academy for his senior year. He scored 2,237 points, made 217 three-point field goals and had 570 assists during his career at Roanoke Catholic. He was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times.

"We are thrilled to officially have these two young men join our Virginia basketball family," Gillen said. "They are both very talented guards who can play a couple of positions. I sincerely feel they will be impact players on our team next season."

Watson Looks Toward Senior Year

Senior forward/center Travis Watson has been named to the Wooden Award Preseason All-American Basketball Team and is also a preseason Naismith Award candidate. Watson is a third-team preseason All-America selection by *Street & Smith's* and is rated sixth nationally at center in *Lindy's* preseason basketball magazine. Watson added to his already impressive career at UVa by being named to the All-ACC second team after the 2001-02 season. He led the ACC in four statistical categories last season: double-doubles (17), rebounds (9.7 rpg), offensive rebounds (3.43 pg), and defensive rebounds (6.29 pg).

At the ACC's annual Operation Basketball, Watson was selected to the conference's 2002-03 Pre-Season First Team. He received 85 votes, the most of any player. Watson was also second to Duke's Chris Duhon in the Pre-Season ACC Player of the Year voting.

Twelve Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 29 regular-season games before the 2003 ACC Tournament, 12 are against eight teams that participated in either the 2002 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). Two of the games are against national champion Maryland. The Cavaliers also meet league foes Duke, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice. Those teams all participated in last season's NCAA Tournament. In addition to those games, Virginia has played Michigan State, an NCAA participant and Rutgers, which earned an NIT bid.

At the Maui Invitational (November 25-27), UVa played Kentucky (NCAA) and Indiana (NCAA runners-up).

UVa is 2-4 in 2002-2003 against teams that competed in postseason play last season.
