THE GAME

Virginia stands at 12-9 overall and 2-8 in the Atlantic Coast Conference in the 2003-2004 season. The Cavaliers have lost five consecutive games and are coming off a 93-75 loss to top-ranked Duke (Feb. 11) in Durham, N.C. **Georgia Tech**, ranked 15th in The Associated Press and 16th in the *USAToday*/ESPN polls, stands at 18-5 overall and 5-4 in the ACC. The Yellow Jackets are coming off an 88-77 victory over 14th-ranked North Carolina (Feb. 10) in Atlanta, Ga.

The Series vs. Georgia Tech

Each team has had a stretch of dominating the series, which Georgia Tech now leads 34-26. The Cavaliers held the lead until the Yellow Jackets passed Virginia by winning 24 of the last 31 meetings, including 13 of the last 15. Georgia Tech won the initial meeting of the 2003-2004 season 75-57 (Jan. 15) in Atlanta. Last season, Georgia Tech swept the season series, registering an 80-60 win (Feb. 1) in Atlanta and a 90-73 victory (Mar. 5) in Charlottesville. The Jackets' currently have a four-game winning streak in the series.

In the 2001-2002 season, Virginia snapped a four-game losing streak to Georgia Tech with a 69-65 victory (Jan. 22) over the Jackets in Atlanta. The Yellow Jackets earned a split in the season series with an 82-80 victory (Feb. 23) in Charlottesville. It is the first time in the history of the series (which dates back to 1947-48) that both teams won on the other team's home floor in the same season.

The Cavaliers have only won one of the last six meetings against Georgia Tech in Charlottesville. Virginia's only home win in the last six meetings was an 83-65 victory (Jan. 8) in the 1999-2000 season. Despite losing five of the last six home games to Georgia Tech, UVa has won 15 of the 25 games played in Charlottesville during the series.

The Cavaliers have won three of five overtime contests in the series, but their 74-68 overtime loss to Georgia Tech in the 1998-99 season snapped a three-game extra session winning streak. The Jackets won the first overtime game in the series 72-71 in triple overtime in the 1983-84 season.

The Cavaliers opened the series with Georgia Tech by winning 10 of the first 13 games, including eight straight from 1981-1983.

Cavalier Captains

Graduate students Todd Billet and Majestic Mapp, along with junior Devin Smith, are the captains of the 2003-04 Virginia basketball team. It is the second consecutive year Mapp is serving as a team captain.

These Games are Barn Burners

Even though 13 of the last 20 meetings between these two teams have been decided by at least nine points, people shouldn't be surprised if this one goes down to the wire.

Of the 47 games since the 1983-84 season, only 17 have been decided by 10 or more points. Eighteen of the games have been decided by a margin of four points or less with UVa winning 10 of them. The Cavaliers have won three of four games (won in 1987 and 1990 twice, lost in 2002) decided by two points. Five games have gone into overtime, including a triple overtime affair (1984) and a double overtime game (1995).

From 1985 to 1990 the teams played 15 consecutive games that were decided by fewer than 10 points with Virginia winning eight of those games.

Jackets Shoot Well vs. UVa

The Yellow Jackets have won 15 of the last 18 meetings vs. Virginia in the past nine seasons and a big part of those wins has been Georgia Tech's ability to shoot the basketball. In the 15 wins, the Jackets shot 48.2 percent (407-844) from the field. In the three games Georgia Tech lost to Virginia in the last nine seasons, the Yellow Jackets made only 40.1 percent (69-172) of their attempts from the field. In its last 15 wins over the Cavaliers, Georgia Tech averaged 78.9 points per game compared to 64.7 points per game in its last three losses to UVa (the Jackets have scored 65 points twice and 64 once).

In Georgia Tech's last 24 wins over Virginia dating back to the championship game of the 1990 ACC Tournament, the Yellow Jackets are shooting 47.7 percent from the field, while averaging 75.9 points.

That is in contrast to Georgia Tech's performance when Virginia wins. In Virginia's nine wins over Georgia Tech dating back to the beginning of the 1990s, the Yellow Jackets have shot 40.2 percent from the floor and scored an average of 69.8 points.

In Virginia's last nine wins against Georgia Tech, the Yellow Jackets have not shot better than 42.6 percent from the field (29 of 68 in the 1994-95 season).

Freshmen Starts

The Cavaliers lead all ACC schools with 29 starts by freshmen in 2003-2004. Four different freshmen, Gary Forbes (17), J.R. Reynolds (8), Donte Minter (3) and T.J. Bannister (1) have started games for UVa.

Freshman guard J.R. Reynolds was named ACC Rookie of the Week on January 26 after averaging 13.0 points while shooting .643 from the floor in two games. Reynolds was 9-14 from the field, including 5-10 from three-point range, and 3-4 from the free throw line, in the two games. He also had four assists, three steals and three rebounds in 51 minutes of action.

In Virginia's 61-50 victory over Clemson (Jan. 20), Reynolds scored a team-high 11 points and tied for the team high with three assists. In UVa's 96-77 loss at North Carolina (Jan. 24), he scored a career-high 15 points and had three rebounds.

UVa vs. Ranked Georgia Tech Teams

The Cavaliers are 7-11 all-time against Associated Press ranked Yellow Jackets teams, but are 5-3 in games played in Charlottesville. UVa's top win against a ranked Georgia Tech team in Charlottesville was on February 16, 1985 – a 62-55 win over the #6 Yellow Jackets.

The last time Virginia defeated a ranked Georgia Tech (23rd) team was February 22, 1995 – an 83-60 win in Atlanta. UVa's last home win over a ranked Yellow Jackets (22nd) squad was an 88-85 overtime victory on January 22, 1995. The last time UVa played a ranked Jackets (23rd) team in Charlottesville was February 21, 1996 – an 84-75 loss.

Earlier This Season vs. Georgia Tech

Virginia got off to a hot start shooting the basketball, making seven three-point field goals in the first 12 minutes of the game, but cooled considerably thereafter and lost to Georgia Tech 75-57 January 15 in Atlanta.

The Cavaliers missed their final 13 three-point attempts of the game and shot only 34.8 percent (16-46) from the field in the loss. UVa also committed a season-high 21 turnovers in the contest. The Yellow Jackets made 26-56 (46.4 percent) of their attempts from the floor, had eight less turnovers than UVa, and held a 36-33 edge in rebounds.

Virginia's first six field goals (and seven of the first eight) of the game were three-pointers. Despite the hot shooting from the perimeter, the Cavaliers still trailed 24-17 with 10 minutes remaining in the first half. UVa pulled within one point on three occasions late in the first half, but Georgia Tech closed the stanza with an 11-1 run to take a 41-30 halftime advantage. The Cavaliers were outscored 26-6 in the paint in the first half.

UVa trimmed the Yellow Jackets' lead to eight (43-35) early in the second half on two Todd Billet free throws, but could get no closer.

Billet led the Cavaliers with 12 points, while Devin Smith had 11. Elton Brown contributed 10 points and seven rebounds.

Georgia Tech's bench outscored UVa's 33-16 with Marvin Lewis and B.J. Elder leading the way with 17 and 16 points, respectively.

Changes To The Starting Lineup

After using the same starting lineup for 11 consecutive games, head coach Pete Gillen has changed UVa's starting lineup the last seven games. Derrick Byars, Devin Smith, Elton Brown, Todd Billet and Gary Forbes had comprised UVa's starting lineup 11 consecutive games.

Minter's start against Florida State (Jan. 18) marked his first collegiate starting assignment, while Bannister's start at Duke (Feb. 11) was the first of his collegiate career.

Head Coach Pete Gillen

Pete Gillen is in his 19th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 372-202 record for a .648 winning percentage. Gillen is in his sixth season at Virginia and has posted a 98-74 record (.570 winning percentage).

Gillen won his 350th career game on December 21, 2002 when his Cavaliers posted a 61-57 victory over Rutgers. His 300th career victory came when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 87-85 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 15 times in 18 seasons (nine NCAA, six NIT), including the last four seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times – all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

Blocked Shots

Junior Jason Clark has 79 career blocked shots and needs four more blocks to move ahead of Ted Jeffries (1990-93) into 10th place all-time at UVa.

Clarked blocked a career-best 39 shots in the 2001-2002 season.

Bannister Gets First Start

Freshman T.J. Bannister drew his first collegiate starting assignment against the top-ranked team in the country and in one of the most difficult arenas to play when the Cavaliers played at Duke (Feb. 11). Bannister handed out a career-high six assists and also scored five points to go along with two rebounds and a steal in a career-best 30 minutes of playing time.

Mapp Starts

Guard Majestic Mapp received his first start of the season against N.C. State (Feb. 7). It marked Mapp's first start since the 1999-2000 season and third overall. It also marked his first collegiate start in a game played in the United States. Mapp's two starts during his freshman season came against Providence (Nov. 26) and Arizona State (Nov. 27) in the 1999 Puerto Rico Shootout in Bayamon, Puerto Rico.

Redd Joins Blue and Orange

Freshman football player Vince Redd has joined the Virginia basketball team. Redd, a 6-6 linebacker from Elizabethton, Tenn., red-shirted the 2003 football season. He practiced with the basketball team for the first time on January 16 and was in uniform for the Florida State (Jan. 18) game. Redd saw his first game action against North Carolina (Jan. 24) and blocked one shot in one minute of playing time.

As a senior at Elizabethton High School, Redd averaged 15 points and 12 rebounds per game and was a first-team All-State pick.

Clark Provides Defensive Spark

Since rejoining the team in early January, 6-8 junior forward Jason Clark has provided a defensive spark in the low post.

Clark practiced with the Cavaliers for the first time this season on January 4. He was on the bench, but not in uniform for Virginia's game with Providence College (Jan. 3) and did not play in UVa's game against William & Mary (Jan. 5) at University Hall. Clark saw his first game action of the season against Duke (Jan. 11), playing five minutes with two rebounds and two blocked shots.

Clark has started the last seven games and appeared in nine contests overall. He is averaging 3.2 points, 4.6 rebounds and 1.7 blocked shots per game while playing 19.4 minutes per contest.

Clark turned in an impressive performance against Florida State (Jan. 18). He played a career-best 34 minutes, had five points, tied a then career high with nine rebounds, and blocked a pair of shots while receiving his first starting assignment.

Against Maryland (Feb. 4), Clark continued his solid play with three points, a career-high 13 rebounds, five blocked shots and a career-high three steals in 31 minutes.

A two-year letterman, he averaged 4.7 points and 2.5 rebounds a game for Virginia during the 2002-03 season. He shot 70.7 percent (58-82) from the floor and blocked 25 shots.

Overall, Clark is shooting 63.3 percent (107-169) from the field in his career and 69.1 percent (67-97) in ACC contests.

Non-Conference Play

The Cavaliers concluded regular season non-conference play with a 10-1 record. The only non-conference blemish on Virginia's record is an 84-69 setback to Providence College (Jan. 3). Some of UVa's most notable wins included: Minnesota 86-78 (Dec. 3) in the ACC/Big 10 Challenge at University Hall; Loyola Marymount 76-68 (Dec. 19) in Los Angeles; and Iowa State 85-74 (Dec. 31) in U-Hall. The Cavaliers also won all four contests against in-state foes.

Home Sweet Home

Like many ACC teams, the Cavaliers enjoy success playing in front of their home crowd at University Hall. The Cavaliers are 10-4 at U-Hall this season and 2-5 in away games.

Since the beginning of the 1999-2000 season, UVa is: 60-15 (80.0 percent) in all home games 25-12 (67.6 percent) in all home ACC games

Fewest Points Allowed in ACC Game in Gillen Era

The Cavaliers held Clemson to 50 points in a 61-50 win on January 20 and it marked the fewest points Virginia has allowed an ACC opponent in the Pete Gillen era.

The previous low by an ACC opponent was 54 by Wake Forest in a 64-54 UVa victory on February 3, 1999. The fewest points the Cavaliers have allowed in a game under Gillen was 48 in a 64-48 victory over Virginia Tech on November 24, 2000.

The 50 points by Clemson are the fewest UVa has allowed in a conference game since limiting N.C. State to 46 points on February 19, 1997 (a 55-46 UVa win).

Reynolds Back and Playing Well

After missing the Loyola Marymount (Dec. 19) and Coastal Carolina (Dec. 22) games because of illness, freshman guard J.R. Reynolds returned to action in UVa's game against N.C. State (Dec. 28). He had only one rebound in eight minutes. In the last 12 games, Reynolds has averaged 9.9 points per game, including 15 points against North Carolina (Jan. 24) and Maryland (Feb. 4), and a career-high 16 points vs. Duke (Feb. 11). He also handed out a career-high five assists against Florida State (Jan. 18).

After starting the first three games of the season, Reynolds returned to the starting lineup against Clemson (Jan. 20). He scored all 11 of his points in the second half against the Tigers. He also had three assists and a career-best three steals.

Reynolds, who was named ACC Rookie of the Week on January 26, scored a then career-high 15 points against North Carolina (Jan. 24) and also added three rebounds and one assist in 26 minutes of action.

In his last six games, Reynolds is shooting 58.3 percent (28-48) from the floor, including 48.1 percent (13-27) from three-point range, and averaging 12.2 points per game. He scored a career-high 16 points against Duke (Feb. 11).

Only 61 Points Scored

UVa only scored 61 points in its 61-50 win over Clemson (Jan. 20) and it tied for the fewest points the Cavaliers have scored in a win under Pete Gillen.

Virginia scored 61 points in three other victories under Gillen – a 61-58 win vs. N.C. State on February 9, 2003; a 61-57 win at Rutgers on December 21, 2002; and a 61-55 win at #16 Georgetown on December 20, 2001.

Only Five Turnovers

The Cavaliers committed just five turnovers in an 85-74 win over Iowa State (Dec. 31). The five turnovers were just one shy of the school mark for fewest turnovers in a game. On five occasions, the Cavaliers had just four turnovers in a game.

Interestingly enough, the last time UVa had only five turnovers in a game was on March 13, 1997 against Iowa in the first round of the NCAA Tournament and Iowa committed only three turnovers which ties for the UVa opponent record for fewest turnovers in a game (UVa lost the game 73-60). The game prior to Iowa was against North Carolina (Mar. 7, 1997) and UVa tied the school record with only four turnovers in that contest (a 78-68 loss in the first round of the ACC Tournament).

...Then the Turnover Roller Coaster

After committing only five turnovers against Iowa State (Dec. 31), UVa had 20 miscues against Providence (Jan. 3). Providence had 24 turnovers in the contest. The roller coaster that is Virginia turnovers went back on the down tick against William & Mary (Jan. 5) when the Cavaliers had just six. UVa then equaled its very respectable season average at the time with 12 turnovers against Duke (Jan. 11). The turnover bug reappeared against Georgia Tech (Jan. 15) as the Cavaliers committed a season-high 21 turnovers. The 21 turnovers against the Yellow Jackets are the most in a game since UVa had 22 turnovers against St. John's (Mar. 24) in the second round of the 2003 National Invitation Tournament.

On the season, UVa is averaging 14.3 turnovers per game. UVa's opponents are averaging 15.9 turnovers per game. Virginia averaged 16.5 turnovers per game last season.

Turnovers

The Cavaliers' streak of five consecutive games with 13 or fewer turnovers ended against N.C. State (Dec. 28) as UVa committed 18 turnovers in the game.

Within the five-game stretch of 13 or fewer turnovers, Virginia put together a three-game streak where it did not commit more than 10 turnovers (9 vs. Minnesota – Dec. 3, 9 vs. VMI – Dec. 5, and 10 vs. James Madison – Dec. 16).

The last time UVa had back-to-back games with fewer than 10 turnovers was in the 1999-2000 season. The Cavaliers had eight turnovers against Clemson (Jan. 15) and seven against North Carolina (Jan. 18).

Virginia has four games this season in which it has committed fewer than 10 turnovers. UVa had nine or fewer turnovers only once last season – 9 vs. Long Island (Nov. 22) in the season-opener.

The Cavaliers have had trouble in the turnover department lately. In six of the last eight games, UVa has committed 16 or more turnovers – 21 vs. Georgia Tech (Jan. 15), 16 vs. Florida State (Jan. 18), 19 vs. Clemson (Jan. 20), North Carolina (Jan. 24) and Wake Forest (Jan. 31), and 20 vs. Maryland (Feb. 4). Virginia snapped its streak of six consecutive games with 16 or more turnovers against N.C. State (Feb. 7) when it had only 10 miscues.

UVa is 8-2 when it commits fewer than 15 turnovers in a game and 4-7 when it has 15 or more turnovers.

Only One Steal

In UVa's 85-74 win over Iowa State (Dec. 31), the Cyclones had only one steal. The last time a Virginia opponent only had one steal was Long Island on November 17, 5 • Virginia vs. Georgia Tech, February 14, 2004

2000. The last time UVa held an opponent without a steal was vs. New Orleans on November 30, 1990.

Leading Scorer has only 11 Points

Freshman J.R. Reynolds was Virginia's leading scorer with 11 points in the Cavaliers' 61-50 win over Clemson (Jan. 20). It marked the fewest points UVa's leading scorer has tallied in a victory in over 20 years.

The last time Virginia's leading scorer had fewer than 11 points in a Cavalier win was on March 6, 1982 when Jeff Jones, Tim Mullen and Jim Miller each scored 10 points in a 51-49 overtime win over #16 Wake Forest in the ACC Tournament.

Starting Strong

For the third time in the last four years, Virginia started its season with eight consecutive victories. UVa had its unbeaten streak snapped with an 86-69 loss at N.C. State (Dec. 28).

The only time in the last four seasons the Cavaliers did not win their first eight games was last year (2002-2003) when the team lost its fourth and fifth games of the season after starting out 3-0.

In 2001-2002, UVa won its first nine games of the season and in 2000-2001, the Cavaliers reeled off 10 consecutive victories to begin the season. The 10 straight wins marked UVa's best start since the 1992-93 team started the season with an 11-0 mark.

Minter Makes Most of First Collegiate Start

Freshman forward/center Donte Minter earned his first collegiate start vs. Florida State (Jan. 18) and turned in an excellent performance. Minter played a career-high 24 minutes and tallied nine points, equaled his career best with seven rebounds, and set another career high with four blocked shots. Minter also had seven rebounds in his collegiate debut against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23).

Minter earned his second start against Clemson (Jan. 20). He was held scoreless in the first half, but tallied all 10 of his points in the second stanza.

He remained in the starting lineup against North Carolina (Jan. 24) and tallied seven points, four rebounds and one blocked shot.

Minter has not started the last four games and has played sparingly due to an injury. He played only four minutes against Wake Forest (Jan. 31) as well as Maryland (Feb. 4). He played 11 minutes off the bench vs. N.C. State (Feb. 7) and had four points, two rebounds, one steal and one blocked shot. Against Duke (Feb. 11), Minter played nine minutes and had two points.

Snapped at 354

The Cavaliers' streak of making at least one three-point field goal in 354 consecutive games was snapped vs. Wake Forest (Jan. 31). UVa missed all 12 of its three-point attempts against the Demon Deacons.

The previous time Virginia did not make a three-pointer in a game was on March 27, 1992 against New Mexico in the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament in Richmond, Va.

Approaching 1500

Guard Todd Billet is approaching the 1500-point mark in his collegiate career. Billet has scored 1,484 points (844 at Rutgers and 640 at UVa) and needs 16 points to reach the 1500-point plateau.

Ranked Teams

All nine of UVa's losses this season have come against teams that have been ranked in The Associated Press Top 25 Poll at one point during the season. N.C. State (two losses) is currently ranked 21st, while Providence is rated 24th. Duke (two losses) is the top ranked team in the nation. North Carolina is currently ranked 14th, while Georgia Tech is 15th and Wake Forest is 20th. Maryland was ranked as high as 24th in late December.

Hot or Cold

The Cavaliers have held three ACC opponents to under 40 percent shooting this season, while six conference foes have shot 50 percent or better against UVa. Only one ACC team, Georgia Tech, has shot in the 40 percent range – 46.4 percent (26-56).

Virginia has held the following ACC teams to under 40 percent shooting from the field:

Florida State (Jan. 18) – 31.9 percent (22-69)

Clemson (Jan. 20) – 31.6 percent (18-57)

Maryland (Feb. 4) – 35.8 percent (24-67)

The following ACC teams have shot 50 percent or better from the floor vs. Virginia:

N.C. State (Dec. 28) – 50.8 percent (30-59)

Duke (Jan. 11) – 52.3 percent (34-65)

North Carolina (Jan. 24) – 52.3 percent (34-65)

Wake Forest (Jan. 31) – 50.0 percent (27-54)

N.C. State (Feb. 7) – 51.0 percent (26-51)

Duke (Feb. 11) – 51.8 percent (29-56)

Interestingly enough all three sub 40 percent shooting performances by UVa's ACC opponents have occurred at University Hall, while four of the six 50 percent or higher shooting games by Cavalier conference opponents have occurred on the road.

UVa's 31.6 percent field goal percentage defense against Clemson marked the lowest vs. an ACC opponent since Wake Forest shot 29.0 percent (20-69) on February 24, 1996.

16 Field Goals

The Cavaliers had a season-low 16 field goals against Georgia Tech (Jan. 15). The 16 field goals ties for the 16th fewest in a game by Virginia. The last time UVa had fewer than 16 field goals in a game was on February 19, 1997 when the Cavaliers made only 15 (of 37 attempts) against N.C. State.

Interestingly enough, Virginia won the game 55-46 in Raleigh and the Wolfpack also made only 15 field goals (they attempted 39).

Bombs Away

The Cavaliers hoisted up a season-high 31 three-point attempts against Florida State (Jan. 18) and hit a season-best 13 of those long range attempts. The 31 three-point attempts ties for the fourth most in a game by the Cavaliers all-time. UVa also attempted 31 threes against North Carolina on January 21, 1999 (and made just four). The school record is 38 three-point attempts vs. Clemson on January 15, 2000 (UVa made 12 of the 38 three-point tries).

Virginia's 13 made three-pointers against Florida State ties for the seventh most in a game. The school record is 15 successful threes vs. North Carolina (February 14, 1990) and Hampton (November 25, 1998).

The Cavaliers 13 three-pointers vs. Florida State are the 6 • Virginia vs. Georgia Tech, February 14, 2004

most in a game since the team made 14 against Howard on November 21, 2001.

Coincidentally, Florida State also attempted 31 threes in the game (and made 10) which ties for the third most three-pointers taken against UVa. VMI and Georgia Tech both attempted 34 three-pointers on December 19, 1994 and November 30, 1996, respectively.

Virginia's previous season high for three-pointers made was nine against Virginia Tech (Nov. 28). The Cavaliers' 25 attempted threes against Minnesota (Dec. 3) were the season high before taking 31 against Florida State.

Two 20-Point Scorers Times Five

The Cavaliers have had a pair of players score 20 or more points in the same game five times this season. Five different Cavaliers have scored 20 or more points in a game this season. Here's a list of the games two UVa players have scored 20 or more points.

Minnesota (Dec. 3) – Elton Brown 26, Gary Forbes 22

Loyola Marymount (Dec. 19) – Derrick Byars 21, Elton Brown 21

Assisting in Other Ways

Senior guard Todd Billet's scoring is down from last season when he averaged 14.1 points per game, but he is making contributions in other areas. Billet, who is scoring 9.9 points per game in 2003-04 while playing mainly point guard, is averaging a team-high 3.2 assists per game. He averaged 3.4 assists per game last season, but Billet has cut his turnovers in half – while handling the ball more. Last season, Billet had 93 turnovers compared to only 33 this year. This season he is averaging 1.57 turnovers per game vs. 2.91 turnovers per outing last year. His assist-to-turnover ratio has improved from 1.2 to 1 last year to 2.1 to 1 this season. Billet's rebounds per game (2.5 from 2.2) and steals per game (0.8 from 0.6) are also up slightly this season.

Last season Billet had only one game in which he didn't commit a turnover compared to four games without a turnover this year.

Double Digit Rebounder

Junior Jason Clark pulled down a career-high 13 rebounds against Maryland (Feb. 4). It marked the first time since December 22 a UVa player has reached double figures in rebounds in a game. On December 22 vs. Coastal Carolina, Elton Brown and Derrick Byars both had 11 rebounds.

Clark is also the fifth different Virginia player to grab 10 or more rebounds in a game this season. In addition to Brown, Byars and Clark, Devin Smith and Gary Forbes have tallied double digit rebounding performances in 2003-04.

Thefts

In addition to giving the Cavaliers a lift offensively, junior Devin Smith has been a defensive spark. In just 11 games, Smith set a new personal single season career mark for steals with 21. Through the 19 games he's played this season, Smith has a team-high 27 steals. Smith had 19 steals in 32 games last season. He has 18 of his 27 steals in his last 12 games, including a career-high five vs. Iowa State (Dec. 31).

Getting to the Free Throw Line

Virginia has gotten to the free throw line quite frequently in 2003-04. The Cavaliers have attempted 526 free throws and made 347 this season, so UVA is only shooting 66.0 percent from the free throw line.

The Cavaliers are averaging 25.0 attempts from the free throw line per game (and 16.5 made per game). UVA has made more free throws than its opponent in all but nine games this season, including seven losses – N.C. State (Dec. 28) made 15 free throws to UVA's 12. Providence (Jan 3) and Virginia both made 11 free throws. Duke (Jan. 11) made 19 free throws to the Cavaliers' 15. North Carolina (Jan. 24) made 22 free throws to UVA's 20. Wake Forest (Jan. 31) made 28 free throws to Virginia's 16. N.C. State (Feb. 7) made 20 free throws to UVA's 15. Duke (Feb. 11) made 27 free throws to Virginia's 14. In its win over William & Mary (Jan. 5), the Tribe made 13 foul shots to Virginia's 12. Florida State (Jan. 18) made 13 free throws to UVA's 11.

Virginia's opponents have attempted only 444 free throws (21.1 per game) and made 304 (14.5 per game). UVA has attempted 82 more free throws than its opponents and made 43 more free throws. Cavalier opponents have attempted nine or fewer free throws in three games.

Last season, Virginia averaged 20.7 attempts and 13.6 made free throws per game.

Spreading Minutes Around

Virginia has nine players who are averaging 10 or more minutes per game and a 10th – Majestic Mapp, who is averaging 9.7 minutes per game. The Cavaliers also have just one player who is averaging more than 30 minutes per game – senior Todd Billet at 31.9 minutes per game.

Perfect from the Free Throw Line

One bright spot from the game at N.C. State (Dec. 28) was the Cavaliers' effort from the free throw line. UVA made all 12 of its free throws to tie the team's second best single game free throw performance ever. On January 23, 1988, UVA was also 12-12 from the line against Georgia Tech. The best free throw shooting performance in school history was a 16-16 effort against South Carolina on January 8, 1965.

Interestingly enough, the Cavaliers were only 31-58 for 53.4 percent from the free throw line in the two previous games combined before their 12-12 performance at N.C. State. Virginia followed its perfect performance against NCSU by making only 15-23 free throws (65.2 percent) against Iowa State (Dec. 31).

Getting to the Free Throw Line

Elton Brown has already taken a career-best 149 attempts from the free throw line. He has only made 91 attempts for 61.1 percent. Brown is averaging an ACC-best 7.1 attempts from the foul line per game and has taken nine or more free throws in a game 11 times. He did not attempt a free throw in UVA's loss to Providence (Jan. 3) and win over Clemson (Jan. 20).

Against Maryland (Feb. 4), Brown set career highs with 15 free throw attempts and 10 made free throws. His previous career bests were 13 attempts and eight made foul shots.

Brown has attempted 92 more free throws than any other player on the team (Gary Forbes has 57 attempts) and has also made 50 more free throws than any other player on the team (Todd Billet has made 41 free throws).

Brown took 93 free throws all of last season.

Freshmen Contributions

UVA's five freshmen who have been with the team the entire season – T.J. Bannister, Jason Cain, Gary Forbes, Donte Minter, and J.R. Reynolds – are making significant contributions. Four of them have played in every game, while Reynolds missed two games with an illness.

The quintet have accounted for:

- 45.6 percent of the team's blocked shots (41 of 90)
- 43.9 percent of the team's assists (137 of 312)
- 42.3 percent of the team's steals (63 of 149)
- 39.9 percent of the team's minutes (1,684 of 4,225)
- 36.0 percent of the points scored (572 of 1,590)
- 31.8 percent of the team's rebounds (232 of 730)

The freshmen have combined to play in 103 of 105 games and are averaging 81.7 minutes, 27.8 points, 11.3 rebounds, 6.7 assists, 3.1 steals, and 2.0 blocked shots per game.

Freshman Vince Redd saw game action for the first time at North Carolina (Jan. 24) and blocked one shot in one minute of playing time. That block and the one minute of action are not included in the statistics above.

Field Goal Percentage Defense

After holding six of its first eight opponents below 40 percent shooting from the field, Virginia has allowed eight of its last 13 opponents to shoot 50 percent or better from the floor.

James Madison (Dec. 16) became the first team to shoot better than 40 percent against Virginia this season as it shot 45.3 percent (29-64). N.C. State (Dec. 28) was the first team to eclipse 50 percent shooting – 30-59 (50.8 percent) against UVA, while Providence shot a season-high 58.2 percent (32-55) from the field against Virginia.

UVA held Florida State (Jan. 18) to 31.9 percent (22-69) shooting from the floor and then limited Clemson (Jan. 20) to 31.6 percent (18-57) accuracy from the field. Virginia also held Maryland to 35.8 percent (24-67) accuracy from the field.

Trouble on the Boards

The Cavaliers have only out-rebounded seven opponents this season (by a combined 24 rebounds). Virginia has been out-rebounded in nine of its last 10 games.

UVa was out-rebounded by Mount St. Mary's (41-36), Virginia Tech (44-39), and Minnesota (51-40), and tied High Point (39-39) to open the season. UVa was out-rebounded by 5.3 boards per game in its first four games. In UVa's next five games, the Cavaliers out-rebounded each of their opponents – VMI (45-44), James Madison (39-37), Loyola Marymount (48-39), Coastal Carolina (37-36), and N.C. State (37-31). Virginia out-rebounded those five opponents by 3.8 boards per game.

UVa was out-rebounded by Iowa State (Dec. 31) 40-23, which ties the Cavaliers' largest rebounding deficit of the season. Virginia out-rebounded Providence (Jan. 3) by one (35-34), but was out-rebounded by:

William & Mary (Jan. 5) by eight (39-31)

Duke (Jan. 11) by 13 (43-30)

Georgia Tech (Jan. 15) by three (36-33)

Florida State (Jan. 18) by five (45-40)

Clemson (Jan. 2) by 10 (41-31)

North Carolina (Jan. 24) by 11 (38-27)

Against Wake Forest (Jan. 31), Virginia broke a stretch of six straight games in which it was out-rebounded by grabbing 35 boards to Wake's 31.

The Cavaliers also lost the battle of the boards to:

Maryland (Feb. 4) by 11 (49-38)

N.C. State (Feb. 7) by 17 (39-22) – which ties the largest rebounding deficit of the season.

Duke (Feb. 11) by 13 (38-25)

In the last 12 games, UVa is being out-rebounded by 8.6 boards per game.

Virginia is being out-rebounded 39.8 to 34.8 (-5.0) per game this season. On the offensive glass, the Cavaliers have been out-rebounded 319-248 (-3.4 per game). UVa gave up 24 offensive rebounds vs. Maryland, 22 offensive rebounds against Minnesota and Florida State, and 20 vs. Clemson. The Cavaliers also had 22 offensive boards against Loyola Marymount and 20 vs. Providence.

Brown's Double Digit Streak Snapped

Junior forward/center Elton Brown had his streak of scoring in double figures in 14 consecutive games snapped against Florida State (Jan. 18) as he scored only three points. He only scored six points against Clemson (Jan. 20) as well, but came back to score 12 against North Carolina (Jan. 24) and 24 vs. Wake Forest (Jan. 31) and Maryland (Feb. 4). He had only five points vs. N.C. State (Feb. 7), but came back to score 24 points against Duke (Feb. 11).

Brown has been a force for the Cavaliers all season. He recorded double-doubles against VMI (14 points, 13 rebounds), Loyola Marymount (21 points, 10 rebounds), and Coastal Carolina (22 points, 11 rebounds). His 13 rebounds vs. VMI are a career high as are his 26 points against Minnesota.

Brown is averaging career and team-bests of 15.5 points (7th in the ACC) and 6.4 rebounds (9th in the ACC) per game this season. He is shooting 50.4 percent (117-232) from the field to lead all ACC players. Brown is second among all ACC players in field goal percentage in all road games at 53.1 percent and is fifth in scoring in all road games at 17.6 points per game.

Brown's streak of 14 consecutive double figure scoring games was second among all ACC players. He is averaging 5.9 more points per game this season (15.5 ppg) than last season (9.6 ppg).

Smith Returns to Lineup

After missing the Cavaliers' season-opener against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23) as well as the second exhibition game against Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars (Nov. 18), junior Devin Smith returned to the lineup against Virginia Tech (Nov. 28). In 16 minutes of action off the bench, Smith tallied five points and seven rebounds. He made his first start of the season against Minnesota (Dec. 3) and posted a team and UVa career-high 10 rebounds to go along with three points, two steals and one assist in 25 minutes of playing time. Smith remained in the starting lineup for 11 consecutive games before not starting against Florida State (Jan. 18). He returned to UVa's starting lineup against Clemson (Jan. 20), but did not start vs. North Carolina (Jan. 24), Wake Forest (Jan. 31), Maryland (Feb. 4) or N.C. State (Feb. 7). He missed the Duke (Feb. 11) game. Smith was out with an injured back.

In addition to the Duke game, Smith continues to miss practice time with the back injury. Despite that fact, he has recently had several impressive games.

Iowa State (Dec. 31) – 25 points, a career-high five steals, three blocks, three rebounds and three assists with no turnovers in 30 minutes. He made 9-14 attempts from the field (3-5 on three-pointers).

William & Mary (Jan. 5) – 22 points, a career-high eight assists, five rebounds, and three steals with just one turnover in 32 minutes. He was 9-15 from the field and made two three-pointers, including a three with UVa leading 64-63 with 7:23 remaining.

Duke (Jan. 11) – 19 points, six rebounds, two blocks and one assist in 30 minutes. Smith made 6-11 field goal attempts, including 5-6 three-pointers.

Florida State (Jan. 18) – after not practicing the two days before the game – scored all 21 of his points after halftime, including UVa's first five points in overtime and a total of seven extra-session points. He also added six rebounds, two assists, two steals and a blocked shot.

North Carolina (Jan. 24) – 16 points, two steals, one rebound and one blocked shot. He made 5-8 field goal attempts, including 3-5 three-pointers, and all three free throw attempts.

N.C. State (Feb. 7) – 14 points, three rebounds, and one assist.

Smith had his streak of six consecutive games scoring in double figures snapped vs. Wake Forest (Jan. 31) when he tallied only two points.

Overall, Smith is averaging 12.5 points (17th in the ACC) and 5.4 rebounds (13th in the ACC) per game. He is averaging 13.2 points (16th in the ACC) and 5.0 rebounds (16th) per game in ACC play this season.

Sampson Named to ESPN's ACC Silver Anniversary Team

Former Virginia standout Ralph Sampson, who played for the Cavaliers from 1979-80 to 1982-83, has been named to ESPN's Silver Anniversary ACC Team. Joining Sampson on the team are: Christian Laettner (Duke), Len Bias (Maryland), Michael Jordan (North Carolina), and Mark Price (Georgia Tech).

Sampson was a three-time National Player of the Year.

Auspicious Debut

Freshman Gary Forbes had a tremendous debut in the Cavaliers' 80-71 win over Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). Forbes had team-high totals of 21 points, nine rebounds and three blocked shots. He was named the ACC Rookie of the Week on November 24 for his performance. Forbes followed up his first collegiate game with a team-high tying 16 points to go along with a team-best eight rebounds in UVa's 80-65 win over Virginia Tech (Nov. 28).

It is the first time a Virginia freshman has led the team in scoring and rebounding in a season-opener since Ralph Sampson in 1979. Sampson had 17 points and eight rebounds against Johns Hopkins on November 25, 1979. Forbes is also the first UVa freshman to lead the team in scoring (he tied for the team lead in scoring against Virginia Tech) and rebounding in his first two games since the restoration of freshman eligibility in 1972-73.

The last freshman to lead UVa in scoring in a season-opener was Harold Deane, who scored 10 points against Connecticut on November 29, 1993. With 24 points against James Madison in 1977, Jeff Lamp holds the school record for most points in a season-opener by a freshman.

The last frosh to lead the Cavaliers in rebounding in a season-opener was Travis Watson, who had 14 rebounds against Elon on November 19, 1999.

On the season, Forbes is averaging 9.1 points (4th on the team) and 4.8 rebounds (3rd on the team) per game. He leads UVa with 21 blocked shots. He is second among all ACC rookies in rebounding, and third in blocked shots and scoring. Forbes has twice tallied three blocks in a game – Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23) and Coastal Carolina (Dec. 22).

Seeing More Playing Time

Freshman guard T.J. Bannister has seen his most significant playing time of the season over the last 15 games. Here's a look at Bannister's key stats over the last 15 games: Loyola Marymount (Dec. 19) – 19 min., 4 asts., 3 rebs. Coastal Car. (Dec. 22) – 21 min., 5 pts., 4 asts., 2 rebs., 1 st. N.C. Bannister did not have an assist against Georgia Tech (Jan. 15), Florida State (Jan. 18) or Maryland (Feb. 4), marking the only times since the Minnesota game (Dec. 3) he did not record an assist.

Brown Registers Third Double-Double of Season

Junior Elton Brown became the first Cavalier in 2003-2004 to register a double-double when he tallied 14 points and a career-high 13 rebounds in UVa's 78-56 win over VMI (Dec. 5). All but one of his rebounds came in the first half. After nearly recording another double-double against James Madison (Dec. 16) with 19 points and nine rebounds, Brown

posted his second double-double of the season against Loyola Marymount (Dec. 19). He had 21 points and 10 rebounds against the Lions. Brown added his third double-double of the year with 22 points and 11 rebounds vs. Coastal Carolina (Dec. 22).

Brown now has four career double-doubles. He posted 20 points and 10 rebounds against Georgia Tech on January 22, 2002 for his first career double-double.

Byars Tallies First Career Double-Double

Sophomore forward Derrick Byars became the second Cavalier to notch a double-double this season with a 17-point, 11-rebound performance against Coastal Carolina (Dec. 22). It marked the first double-double of Byars' career and the 11 rebounds also established a new career high.

Byars and Elton Brown became the first UVa players to record a double-double in the same game since February 12, 2002 when Chris Williams (18 pts., 10 rebs.) and Travis Watson (17 pts., 10 rebs.) posted double-doubles against North Carolina.

Mapp Making a Contribution

Guard Majestic Mapp has made a contribution in the first 21 games of the season. He is averaging 1.7 points, 1.0 rebound and 1.0 assist in 9.7 minutes per game while seeing action in 19 of 21 games. Mapp made his first start of the season against N.C. State (Feb. 7). The 19 games are the most games Mapp has played in since his freshman season in 1999-2000 when he appeared in all 31 contests.

Last season Mapp averaged 2.4 points, 1.2 rebounds, and 1.7 assists in 15.6 minutes of action per game. He played in 18 of 32 games last season, including the final 17 games.

Mapp missed 70 consecutive games spanning 1,032 days, after tearing the ACL in his right knee on August 2, 2000. He missed the entire 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons. Mapp made his long anticipated return to the Cavalier lineup against North Carolina (Jan. 11, 2003). Mapp entered the game to a standing ovation with 7:23 remaining in the first half and played just over two minutes.

Billet Seventh in Three-Point Field Goals

Senior guard Todd Billet has made 135 career three-point field goals for the Cavaliers and stands in seventh place all-time at Virginia. Billet needs three three-pointers to move into sixth place in front of Roger Mason, Jr. (2000-02).

Billet Drains 100th Three

Guard Todd Billet drilled his 100th career three-point field goal as a Cavalier in UVa's win over High Point (Nov. 30). Billet is currently seventh on Virginia's career three-point field goals list with 135.

Billet has made his 135 career three-pointers at UVa in just 53 games for an average of 2.55 threes per game. He made 94 threes last season which is the fourth highest single season total in school history.

In his collegiate career (which includes 158 three-point field goals while playing two seasons at Rutgers), Billet has made 293 threes. Billet's total of 293 career threes would rank eighth among all ACC players if he had played his entire career in the ACC.

Billet has played in 111 games in his career and has made at least one three-point field goal in 104 of those games. Billet had his streak of making a three-pointer in 23 consecutive games snapped against Duke (Jan. 11) – his longest collegiate streak. He made at least one three-point field goal in the first 18 games of his freshman season at Rutgers (1999-2000), which was his previous career best streak. Billet has made four or more three-pointers 31 times and three or more threes in 49 contests.

Brown and Forbes Set Career Highs in Scoring

Junior forward/center Elton Brown and freshman guard/forward Gary Forbes set career scoring highs in UVa's win over Minnesota (Dec. 3).

Brown, who has scored in double figures in 18 of 21 games, exploded for a career-best 26 points against Minnesota. Brown's prior career-high was 22 points vs. Chaminade (Nov. 25) last season.

Forbes tallied 22 points against the Golden Gophers to set a new career-high. His previous career-best was 21 points in his collegiate debut against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). Forbes also established a new career-high with 12

rebounds vs. Loyola Marymount (Dec. 19).

Winning Despite Opponent's Shooting

Iowa State shot an impressive 55.2 percent (32-58) from the field against the Cavaliers (including 62.1 percent in the first half - 18-29). The last time a Virginia opponent shot better than 55 percent from the field and lost was on January 6, 2001 when N.C. State shot an impressive 61.2 percent (30-49), but lost 88-81 to UVa at University Hall.

Five in Double Figures

Virginia has featured a balanced scoring attack this season as the Cavaliers have had five players reach double figures in scoring in three of their 21 games. Currently, two Virginia players are averaging in double figure scoring this season and as many as five players have averaged 10 or more points per game during the season.

In the season-opener vs. Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23), Gary Forbes (21), Todd Billet (13), Donte Minter (12), Derrick Byars (11), and Elton Brown (10) all reached double digits.

Against High Point (Nov. 30), Minter (13), Byars (12), Forbes (10), Devin Smith (10), and Brown (10) scored in double figures.

In the ACC opener vs. N.C. State (Dec. 28), Brown (18), Smith (14), Forbes (11), Byars (10), and Billet (10) all reached double digits.

Shooting Well

Freshman forward/center Donte Minter is having a great year shooting the basketball. In 21 games, Minter has made 53-92 attempts from the field for an impressive 57.6 percent.

In UVa's two exhibition victories, Minter was even more accurate from the floor as he shot 83.3 percent while making 15 of 18 attempts. He was a perfect 7-7 from the field against Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 11).

Minter isn't the only Cavalier shooting the ball well this season. Elton Brown is shooting 50.4 percent (117-232) from the field this season. Devin Smith has made 46.7 percent (86-184) of his attempts from the field, including 48.3 percent (43-89) in ACC play.

Shooting 50 Percent in Openers

For the fourth consecutive season, the Cavaliers shot 50 percent or better in their season-opener. UVa shot 24-46 for 52.2 percent from the floor against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23).

The last time UVa failed to reach 50 percent shooting from the field in a season-opener was in the 1999-2000 campaign when the Cavaliers shot a respectable 47.8 percent (33-69) from the floor against Elon.

Cavaliers Even Record in ACC/Big Ten Challenge

With an 86-78 victory over Minnesota on December 3, Virginia evened its ACC/Big Ten Challenge record at 2-2. The Cavaliers also helped the ACC win the series for the fifth consecutive year as ACC schools won seven of nine contests. The ACC's cumulative record in the Challenge is 27-17.

Cavaliers Play Well, But Fall to Top-Ranked Duke

Virginia turned in a gutsy effort against top-ranked Duke, but lost 93-75 February 11 at Cameron Indoor Stadium in Durham, N.C. The game was much closer than the final score indicates.

The Cavaliers, playing without second-leading scorer Devin Smith, answered several Duke runs with spurts of their own to stay within striking distance. The Blue Devils had one last run – a 17-5 spurt midway through the second half that UVa didn't have an answer for.

Duke scored 12 consecutive points to lead 12-3 2:27 into the game and the Blue Devils led by as many as 13 points in the first half. With the Blue Devils leading 43-30 with 2:28 left in the first stanza, Virginia used an 8-2 spurt to pull within seven points before trailing 47-38 at halftime.

Duke opened up an 11-point advantage, 52-41, two minutes into the second half, but the Cavaliers responded with a 13-5 run to pull within three points, 57-54 with 13:21 to play. Sophomore Derrick Byars capped off the run with a three-pointer. The Blue Devils scored the next six points to start a 17-5 run to extend their lead to 74-59 with 8:18 to play.

Elton Brown led the Cavaliers with 24 points and eight rebounds, while J.R. Reynolds scored a career-high 16 points.

Virginia shot a respectable 47.4 percent (27-57) from the field, but Duke connected on 51.8 percent (29-56) of its attempts from the floor. Duke outscored UVa 27-14 from the free throw line and held a 38-25 edge in rebounds.

J.J. Redick led Duke with 25 points, while Sheldon Williams added 19 points, 12 rebounds and four blocked shots.

UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their exhibition games prior to the start of the 2003-2004 regular season. Virginia opened exhibition play with a 104-80 victory over Big Apple Basketball November 11 and then defeated the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars 91-90 on November 18.

In the win 104-80 win over Big Apple Basketball, Virginia shot 60.3 percent (38-63) from the field, including 47.8 percent (11-23) from three-point range, and had five players score in double figures.

Forward Derrick Byars made 10-11 shots from the field and scored 25 points to lead the Cavaliers. Guard Todd Billet scored 21 points and had five assists, while forward Devin Smith had 20 points and blocked four shots. Forward/center Donte Minter made all seven of his shots from the field and had 15 points, and forward/center Elton Brown scored 13

points and had a game-high seven rebounds.

UVa led 61-35 at halftime after shooting 69.7 percent (23-33) from the field in the first half, including 64.3 percent (9-14) from three-point range.

Guard Tim Winn led Big Apple Basketball with 20 points and four assists.

Against the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars, Billet hit a long three-pointer at the final buzzer to lift UVa to a 91-90 win. The Cavaliers let a 17-point second half lead slip away, but Billet's heroics helped Virginia end its exhibition season with a victory.

UVa led 72-55 with 13:04 to play, but the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars outscored UVa 31-12 to take an 86-84 lead with 55 seconds left. Brown tied the game at 86-86 with a bucket inside the paint with 40 seconds left. However, the visitor's Dominic Smith answered with his third consecutive long three-pointer to put the All-Stars on top 89-86. Billet answered with a basket with 19 ticks left to trim the deficit to one, but missed a free throw that would have tied the game. After two missed free throws by the All-Stars' Harold Arceneaux, the All-Stars' Rasan Johnson made one of two foul shots to make the score 90-88. Billet then supplied the heroics with a long three-pointer as time expired.

Byars led the Cavaliers with 21 points and eight rebounds. He made 9-12 attempts from the field, including a 3-4 effort from three-point range. Brown registered a double-double with 20 points and 10 rebounds, while Minter added 18 points and eight boards. Billet tallied 14 points with forward Gary Forbes rounding out the Cavaliers' double-digit scorers with 11 points.

Chris Crosby led the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars with 18 points, while Arceneaux totaled 17 points, 10 rebounds and five assists. Smith had 16 points with Tony Robertson and D.J. Harrison both contributing 12.

UVa shot 53.1 percent (34-64) from the field in the game, including 70 percent (21-30) in the first half. The Cavaliers also held a 47-24 advantage in rebounds.

Two Sign Letters Of Intent with Virginia

Head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-7 small forward Adrian Joseph of Trinidad and 5-11 point guard Sean Singletary of Philadelphia, Pa.

"These two young men are outstanding students as well as very talented basketball players," Gillen said. "They will fit in perfectly in our pressing and running style of play."

Joseph is attending Brewster Academy in Wolfeboro, N.H., this academic year after attending Bergen Catholic High School in Oradell, N.J., last year. He averaged 15.0 points, 7.2 rebounds and 2.9 blocked shots a game during the 2002-03 season. He earned first-team All-League and All-County honors, and third-team All-State honors.

Singletary averaged 18 points, eight assists, seven rebounds and 4.5 steals a game as a junior at William Penn Charter School last season. He earned first-team All-League and All-City honors last year. Penn Charter finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 26-4 and won the league championship.

Virginia Men Return to Postseason Play

Virginia received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2002-03 regular season. UVa defeated Brown University 89-73 (March 19) at University Hall in the first round of the tournament. The Cavaliers then suffered a 73-63 loss at St. John's (March 24) in the second round. It was the Cavaliers' 10th NIT appearance and the team's fourth consecutive postseason appearance. Virginia finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 16-16 and a 6-10 record in the ACC.

Cavaliers Welcome Nine Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 5-10 1/2 freshman guard T.J. Bannister, 6-9 freshman forward Jason Cain, 6-6 freshman guard/forward Gary Forbes, 6-7 1/2 freshman forward/center Donte Minter, and 6-2 1/2 freshman guard J.R. Reynolds.

Bannister was the Division I-A Player of the Year in Florida and a first-team All-State selection as a senior in 2002-03. He finished third in the voting for Florida's Mr. Basketball Award as a high school senior, and was only the fourth player in the city of Jacksonville, Fla., to score over 2,000 points during a high school career.

Cain averaged 14 points, 12 rebounds, eight assists and five blocked shots a game as a senior at John Bartram High School, which finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 24-4 and won the Philadelphia Public League Championship. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2003 Philadelphia Public League championship game and the Public League All-Star Game.

Forbes was selected the *Newsday* Player of the Year in Brooklyn and was nominated for City Player of the Year as a high school senior in 2002-03. He earned first-team All-City and All-Tri-State honors in 2002-03 at Benjamin Banneker Academy, and is the first player in Benjamin Banneker Academy history to play Division I basketball.

Minter attended Fork Union Military Academy during the 2002-03 academic year. Prior to attending Fork Union, Minter attended West Rowan High School (N.C.). West Rowan compiled a 30-0 record and won the North Carolina AAA State Championship during his senior year in 2001-02. He was the Most Valuable Player of the State Championship, the West Regional, the county and the North Piedmont Conference as a senior at West Rowan. Minter scored over 2,100 points while grabbing over 1,000 rebounds during his high school career.

Reynolds transferred to Oak Hill Academy from Roanoke Catholic for his senior year of high school. He averaged 16 points, four rebounds, 3.5 assists and 2.5 steals a game at Oak Hill during the 2002-03 season. He started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic and was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times. Roanoke Catholic won three state championships during his time on the team.

Three additional players joined the Virginia team as walk-ons. The players are 6-5 1/2 senior forward Brad Abel of Burke, Va. (Lake Braddock High School); 6-2 guard Billy Glading of Bethesda, Md. (Gonzaga College High School), who is playing as a graduate student; and 6-5 sophomore forward Hank Nacey of Virginia Beach, Va. (Frank W. Cox High School). See page 13 of the notes for bios on the walk-ons.

The most recent addition to the UVa team is freshman football player Vincent Redd. The 6-6 Redd joined the team January 16.

Shift of Coaching Staff Assignments

Scott Shepherd and Alexis Sherard have exchanged responsibilities in the Virginia men's basketball program. Shepherd is now an assistant coach after serving as the program's director of basketball operations for the last year. Sherard is now director of operations after spending the last year as an assistant coach.

Billet and Mapp Provide Experience

Senior guards Todd Billet and Majestic Mapp provide the Cavaliers with experience in the backcourt for the 2003-04 season. Billet earned honorable mention recognition on the 2003 All-ACC Team after leading the conference in three-point field goal percentage (.418, 94-225) and in three-point field goals made, (94, 2.94 pg). He was also ninth in the ACC in assists (108, 3.38 apg) and 13th in scoring (432, 13.5 ppg). Billet received his bachelor's degree in economics in May of 2003.

Mapp served as a tri-captain for the 2002-03 season and saw game action for the first time since the final game of the 1999-2000 season when he played two minutes against North Carolina (1/11/03) at University Hall. He played 19 minutes and scored a season-high 11 points in the win at Maryland (2/6/03). Mapp played in the last 17 games of the 2002-03 season and averaged 16.4 minutes played a game during that stretch. He also received his bachelor's degree in economics in May of 2003.

Raining Threes

The 2002-03 season also saw the Cavaliers' establish a school record with 239 three-point field goals made. The previous school record was 232 by the 1994-95 UVa team.

Todd Billet led the ACC in three-point field goal percentage (41.8 percent) and three-point field goals made (94, 2.94 pg) last season. Devin Smith ranked eighth in the conference in three-point field goal percentage (38.6 percent).

Fifteen Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 27 regular-season games before the 2004 ACC Tournament, 15 are against nine teams that participated in either the 2003 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). The Cavaliers meet league foes and NCAA Tournament participants Duke, Maryland, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice, while also matching up twice against NIT teams Georgia Tech and North Carolina. In addition to those games, Virginia plays 2003 NIT participants Iowa State, Minnesota and Providence.

Home Sweet Home

The Cavaliers play 17 of their 27 regular season games in the friendly confines of University Hall. After playing two exhibition games at home, Virginia started the 2003-2004 regular season by hosting four consecutive games. UVa is currently 10-4 at home this season.

John Paul Jones Arena On Its Way

On May 30, 2003 ground was broken on the University of Virginia's new special events center, the John Paul Jones Arena. Scheduled for completion in the summer of 2006, the \$129.8 million arena will replace University Hall. The new 15,000-seat arena will feature training and weight rooms, men's and women's basketball locker rooms and lounges, coaches' offices, and one-and-a-half practice courts per program so the men's and women's basketball teams can practice simultaneously, and when the arena is being used for other purposes.
