OFFICIALS

THE GAME

Virginia (2002-2003: 16-16/6-10 ACC) stands at 6-0 in the 2003-2004 season. The Cavaliers are coming off a 90-80 victory over James Madison (Dec. 16) in Charlottesville, Va. Lovola Marymount (2002-2003: 11-20/4-10 WCC) stands at 6-2 on the season after an 84-82 double overtime victory at Denver (Dec. 16).

The Series vs. Loyola Marymount

Tonight's game is the first meeting between Virginia and Loyola Marymount in men's basketball. UVa has already played two opponents in first-time meetings in 2003-2004 (Mount St. Mary's - Nov. 23 and High Point - Nov. 30). The Cavaliers also have a first-time matchup against Iowa State (Dec. 31).

Virginia vs. the West Coast Conference

Against the current West Coast Conference membership, UVa is 0-1 all-time having lost to Gonzaga 86-85 (Mar. 16) in the first round of the 2001 NCAA Tournament in Memphis, Tenn. The Cavaliers have never played current WCC members Loyola Marymount, Pepperdine, Portland, St. Mary's (Calif.), San Diego, San Francisco, and Santa Clara.

Virginia has played six games against teams that were one-time members of the WCC, going 3-3 all-time against UNLV (3-1), San Jose State (0-1) and Gonzaga (0-1).

UVa vs. the Golden State

The Cavaliers are 3-5 all-time against teams from California and 6-6 in games played in California. Virginia is 1-0 vs. California-Irvine and San Diego State, 1-3 vs. Stanford, and 0-1 vs. San Jose State and UCLA.

The Cavaliers have also played four games in California against teams from other states. UVa defeated Washington 65-61 in the 1983 Cabrillo Classic in San Diego and Army 84-60 in the 1979 Cable Car Classic in Santa Clara. The other two games Virginia played in the state of California took place during the 1994 NCAA Tournament in Sacramento. UVa defeated New Mexico 57-54 in the first round and fell to ninth-ranked Arizona 71-58 in the second round.

The Cavaliers haven't played a team from California since December 22, 1994 when they lost to Stanford 64-60 in University Hall. The last time UVa played in California was December 22, 1993 - an 84-72 loss at Stanford.

Virginia's last win against a California team was California-Irvine on Dec. 21, 1988 – a 99-89 overtime win in Charlottesville. UVa's last win over a California team in California was December 30, 1983 against San Diego State (81-65) to win the Cabrillo Classic in San Diego.

Head Coach Pete Gillen

Pete Gillen is in his 19th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 366-193 record for a .655 winning percentage. Gillen is in his sixth season at Virginia and has posted a 92-65 record (.586 winning percentage).

Gillen won his 350th career game on December 21, 2002 when his Cavaliers posted a 61-57 victory over Rutgers. His 300th career victory came when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 87-85 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 15 times in 18 seasons (nine NCAA, six NIT), including the last four seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times – all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

Cavalier Captains

Graduate students Todd Billet and Majestic Mapp, along with junior Devin Smith, are the captains of the 2003-04 Virginia basketball team. It is the second consecutive year Mapp is serving as a team captain.

Cavaliers Even Record in ACC/Big Ten Challenge

With an 86-78 victory over Minnesota on December 3, Virginia evened its ACC/Big Ten Challenge record at 2-2. The Cavaliers also helped the ACC win the series for the fifth consecutive year as ACC schools won seven of nine contests. The ACC's cumulative record in the Challenge is 27-17.

Cutting Down Turnovers

After averaging 15.7 turnovers per game in the first three games of the season, UVa has not committed more than 10 turnovers in each of its last three contests (Minnesota – Dec. 3, VMI – Dec. 5, and James Madison – Dec. 16). The Cavaliers had nine turnovers against both Minnesota and VMI, and 10 against James Madison to lower their turnovers to 12.5 per game.

Virginia had nine or fewer turnovers only once last season -9 vs. Long Island (Nov. 22) in the season-opener.

The last time UVa had back-to-back games with fewer than 10 turnovers was in the 1999-2000 season. The Cavaliers had eight turnovers against Clemson (Jan. 15) and seven against North Carolina (Jan. 18).

Brown Registers First Double-Double of Season

Junior Elton Brown became the first Cavalier in 2003-2004 to register a double-double as he tallied 14 points and a career-high 13 rebounds in UVa's 78-56 win over VMI (Dec. 5). All but one of his rebounds came in the first half. He nearly recorded another double-double against James Madison (Dec. 16) as he finished with 19 points and nine rebounds.

The double-double is the second of Brown's career. He posted 20 points and 10 rebounds against Georgia Tech on January 22, 2002 for his first career double-double.

Solid Defense

Virginia has held five of its first six opponents of the 2003-04 season under 40 percent shooting from the field. UVa is also limiting its opponents to 36.8 percent accuracy from the floor. James Madison (Dec. 16) became the first team to shoot better than 40 percent against Virginia this season as it shot 45.3 percent (29-64).

Trouble on the Boards

The Cavaliers have won all six games this season despite only out-rebounding two opponents (by a combined three rebounds). UVa was out-rebounded by Mount St. Mary's (41-36), Virginia Tech (44-39), and Minnesota (51-40), and tied High Point (39-39). The only teams Virginia out-rebounded were VMI (45-44) and James Madison (39-37).

Virginia is being out-rebounded 42.7 to 39.7 (-3.0) per game this season. On the offensive glass, the Cavaliers have been out-rebounded 102-66 (-6.0 per game). UVa gave up 22 offensive rebounds against Minnesota.

Forbes Tabbed ACC Rookie of the Week

Freshman Gary Forbes was selected as the Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week on November 24 for his performance in the Cavaliers' 80-71 season-opening victory over Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23) at University Hall.

The 6-6 guard/forward from Brooklyn, N.Y., scored 21 points and grabbed a game-high nine rebounds to lead Virginia in both departments against Mount St. Mary's. He was 8-13 (61.5 percent) from the field and was 5-9 (55.6 percent) from the free throw line in the game. He also blocked three shots, had one assist and one steal in 35 minutes of action.

Elton Brown was the last Cavalier to earn the ACC's Rookie of the Week Award as he captured it twice in the 2001-2002 season (Dec. 24 and Jan. 28).

Auspicious Debut

Freshman Gary Forbes had a tremendous debut in the Cavaliers' 80-71 win over Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). Forbes had team-high totals of 21 points, nine rebounds and three blocked shots. Forbes followed up his first collegiate game with a team-high tying 16 points to go along with a team-best eight rebounds in UVa's 80-65 win over Virginia Tech (Nov. 28). In his third collegiate game, Forbes had 10 points and five rebounds against High Point (Nov. 30), followed by a 22-point, nine-rebound performance against Minnesota (Dec. 3). Against VMI (Dec. 5), Forbes scored seven points, the first time he failed to reach double digits in scoring this season. He came back to score 13 points in UVa's win over James Madison (Dec. 16).

It is the first time a Virginia freshman has led the team in scoring and rebounding in a season-opener since Ralph Sampson in 1979. Sampson had 17 points and eight rebounds against Johns Hopkins on November 25, 1979. Forbes is also the first UVa freshman to lead the team in scoring (he tied for the team lead in scoring against Virginia Tech) and rebounding in his first two games since the restoration of freshman eligibility in 1972-73.

The last freshman to lead UVa in scoring in a season-opener was Harold Deane, who scored 10 points against Connecticut on November 29, 1993. With 24 points against James Madison in 1977, Jeff Lamp holds the school record for most points in a season-opener by a freshman.

The last frosh to lead the Cavaliers in rebounding in a seasonopener was Travis Watson, who had 14 rebounds against Elon on November 19, 1999.

A 6-0 Start

For the third time in the last four years, Virginia has started its season with six consecutive victories. The only time in the last four seasons the Cavaliers did not win their first six games was last year (2002-2003) when the team lost its fourth and fifth games of the season after starting out 3-0.

In 2001-2002, UVa won its first nine games of the season and in 2000-2001, the Cavaliers rolled off 10 consecutive victories to begin the season. The 10 straight wins marked UVa's best start since the 1992-93 team started the season with an 11-0 mark.

Smith Returns to Lineup

After missing the Cavaliers' season-opener against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23) as well as the second exhibition game against Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars (Nov. 18), junior Devin Smith returned to the lineup against Virginia Tech (Nov. 28). In 16 minutes of action off the bench, Smith tallied five points and seven rebounds. Smith made his first start of the season against Minnesota (Dec. 3) and tallied a team and UVa career-high 10 rebounds to go along with three points, two steals and one assist in 25 minutes of playing time. He also started against VMI (Dec. 5) and had six points and six rebounds in 16 minutes. Smith had his best game of the season against James Madison (Dec. 16) as he notched 19 points, six rebounds, three assists and a steal in 28 minutes. Smith was out with an injured back.

Mapp Making an Impact

Guard Majestic Mapp has made an impact in the first six games of the season. He is averaging 4.0 points, 2.7 assists and 1.8 rebounds in 18.8 minutes per game.

He opened the season with six points and three assists with only one turnover in 23 minutes against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). Against Virginia Tech (Nov. 28), Mapp totaled six points, five assists, and four rebounds with only one turnover in 24 minutes of playing time. In 23 minutes against High Point (Nov. 30), Mapp had two points, four assists and two rebounds. Against Minnesota (Dec. 3), Mapp had five points in 12 minutes. He tallied four points, three rebounds and four assists in 18 minutes against VMI (Dec. 5). Mapp had one point and two rebounds in 13 minutes vs. James Madison (Dec. 16).

Last season Mapp averaged 2.4 points, 1.2 rebounds, and 1.7 assists in 15.6 minutes of action per game. He played in 18 of 32 games last season, including the final 17 games.

Mapp missed 70 consecutive games spanning 1,032 days, after tearing the ACL in his right knee on August 2, 2000. He missed the entire 2000-01 and 2001-02 seasons. Mapp made his long anticipated return to the Cavalier lineup against North Carolina (Jan. 11, 2003). Mapp entered the game to a standing ovation with 7:23 remaining in the first half and played just over two minutes.

Five in Double Figures

Virginia has featured a balanced scoring attack this season as the Cavaliers have had five players reach double figures in scoring in two of their six games.

In the season-opener vs. Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23), Gary Forbes (21), Todd Billet (13), Donte Minter (12), Derrick Byars (11), and Elton Brown (10) all reached double digits. Against High Point (Nov. 30), Minter (13), Byars (12), Forbes (10), Devin Smith (10), and Brown (10) scored in double figures.

Billet Drains 100th Three

Guard Todd Billet drilled his 100th career three-point field goal as a Cavalier in UVa's win over High Point (Nov. 30). Billet is currently 11th on Virginia's career three-point field goals list with 106. Keith Friel (2000-01) is 10th with 107 career threes.

Billet has made his 106 career three-pointers at UVa in just 38 games for an average of 2.79 threes per game. He made 94 threes last season which is the fourth highest single season total in school history.

In his collegiate career (which includes 158 three-point field goals while playing two seasons at Rutgers), Billet has made 264 threes.

Billet has played in 96 games in his career and has made at least one three-point field goal in 91 of the games. Currently, Billet has made a three-pointer in 17 consecutive games. His longest streak is 18 consecutive games of making at least one three-point field goal and that was the first 18 games of his freshman season at Rutgers (1999-2000). He has made four or more three-pointers 30 times and three or more threes in 44 contests.

Brown and Forbes Set Career Highs in Scoring

Junior forward/center Elton Brown and freshman guard/forward Gary Forbes are leading the Cavaliers in scoring this season (15.8 and 14.8 ppg, respectively) and set career highs in UVa's win over Minnesota (Dec. 3).

Brown, who has scored in double figures in all six games, exploded for a career-best 26 points against Minnesota. Brown's prior career-high was 22 points vs. Chaminade (Nov. 25) last season.

Forbes tallied 22 points against the Golden Gophers to set a new career-high. His previous career-best was 21 points in his collegiate debut against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). Forbes also equaled his career-high with nine rebounds vs. Minnesota. He had nine boards vs. Mount St. Mary's as well.

Shooting Well

Freshman forward/center Donte Minter is off to a great start shooting the basketball. In six games, Minter has made 21-28 attempts from the field for an impressive 75.0 percent.

In UVa's two exhibition victories, Minter was even more accurate from the floor as he shot 83.3 percent while making 15 of 18 attempts. He was a perfect 7-7 from the field against Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 11).

Minter isn't the only Cavalier shooting the ball well early in the season. Sophomore forward Derrick Byars has made 54.3 percent (25-46) of his attempts from the field in the first six games, including 9-18 three-point attempts (50.0 percent). He was a perfect 5-5 from the field in the season-opener against Mount St. Mary's.

In the Cavaliers' two exhibition wins, Byars connected on 19-23 attempts from the field for an impressive 82.6 shooting percentage. He also made 4-6 three-point attempts. Byars made 10-11 attempts (90.9 percent) from the field in UVa's 104-80 win over Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 11).

Two other UVa players are shooting around 50 percent from the field this season. Freshman guard/forward Gary Forbes has connected on exactly 50.0 percent (33-66) of his attempts from the floor, while junior forward/center Elton Brown is shooting 48.5 percent (32-66) from the field.

Shooting 50 Percent in Openers

For the fourth consecutive season, the Cavaliers shot 50 percent or better in their season-opener. Here's a look at UVa's field goal percentage in the last four season-openers.

The last time UVa failed to reach 50 percent shooting from the field in a season-opener was in the 1999-2000 campaign when the Cavaliers shot a respectable 47.8 percent (33-69) from the floor against Elon.

Two Sign Letters Of Intent with Virginia

Head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-7 small forward Adrian Joseph of Trinidad and 5-11 point guard Sean Singletary of Philadelphia, Pa.

"These two young men are outstanding students as well as very talented basketball players," Gillen said. "They will fit in perfectly in our pressing and running style of play."

Joseph is attending Brewster Academy in Wolfeboro, N.H., this academic year after attending Bergen Catholic High School in Oradell, N.J., last year. He averaged 15.0 points, 7.2 rebounds and 2.9 blocked shots a game during the 2002-03 season. He earned first-team All-League and All-County honors, and third-team All-State honors.

Singletary averaged 18 points, eight assists, seven

rebounds and 4.5 steals a game as a junior at William Penn Charter School last season. He earned first-team All-League and All-City honors last year. Penn Charter finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 26-4 and won the league championship.

Virginia Men Return to Postseason Play

Virginia received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2002-03 regular season. UVa defeated Brown University 89-73 (March 19) at University Hall in the first round of the tournament. The Cavaliers then suffered a 73-63 loss at St. John's (March 24) in the second round. It was the Cavaliers 10th NIT appearance and the team's fourth consecutive postseason appearance. Virginia finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 16-16 and a 6-10 record in the ACC.

Shift of Coaching Staff Assignments

Scott Shepherd and Alexis Sherard have exchanged responsibilities in the Virginia men's basketball program. Shepherd is now an assistant coach after serving as the program's director of basketball operations for the last year. Sherard is now director of operations after spending the last year as an assistant coach.

Cavaliers Post 90-80 Win over In-State Rival James Madison

Virginia opened up a 29-point lead midway through the second half, but saw the Dukes take a big chunk out of the cushion before UVa registered a 90-80 victory over James Madison (Dec. 16) at University Hall.

A trio of players paced the Cavaliers with guard Todd Billet leading the way with a season-high 20 points to go along with six rebounds and three assists. Billet also made four three-point field goals. Forward Devin Smith and forward/center Elton Brown both tallied 19 points. Brown also had nine rebounds and two assists, while Smith added six rebounds, three assists and a steal. Guard/forward Gary Forbes rounded out the UVa players in double figures with 13 points.

Virginia jumped out to an early 11-2 lead only to see the Dukes come back to tie the game at 20-20 with 8:24 left in the opening half. The Cavaliers responded with a 23-8 spurt over the final 7:36 to take a 43-28 lead at the intermission.

In the second stanza, UVa pushed its advantage to 29 points, 67-38, with 12:19 to play. James Madison got hot from the field and went on a 33-14 run to pull within 10 points (81-71) with 2:45 left. The Dukes, who made six three-pointers during the run, could get no closer than 10 the rest of the way.

Ray Barbosa scored a game-high 33 points for James Madison, while Dwayne Broyles added 23. The two combined to score 43 of JMU's 52 second-half points. They also made 11 of the Dukes' 13 three-point field goals in the game.

UVa committed only 10 turnovers in the contest, its third consecutive game with 10 or fewer miscues. James Madison had 17 turnovers in the game. Virginia shot 47.7 percent (31-65) from the field, while JMU was 29-64 for 45.3 percent. The Cavaliers held a slight 39-37 edge in rebounds.

UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their exhibition games prior to the start of the 2003-2004 regular season. Virginia opened exhibition play with a 104-80 victory over Big Apple Basketball November 11 and then defeated the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars 91-90 on November 18.

In the win 104-80 win over Big Apple Basketball, Virginia shot 60.3 percent (38-63) from the field, including 47.8 percent (11-23) from three-point range, and had five players score in double figures.

Forward Derrick Byars made 10-11 shots from the field and scored 25 points to lead the Cavaliers. Guard Todd Billet scored 21 points and had five assists, while forward Devin Smith had 20 points and blocked four shots. Forward/center Donte Minter made all seven of his shots from the field and had 15 points, and forward/center Elton Brown scored 13 points and had a game-high seven rebounds.

UVa led 61-35 at halftime after shooting 69.7 percent (23-33) from the field in the first half, including 64.3 percent (9-14) from three-point range.

Guard Tim Winn led Big Apple Basketball with 20 points and four assists.

Against the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars, Billet hit a long three-pointer at the final buzzer to lift UVa to a 91-90 win. The Cavaliers let a 17-point second half lead slip away, but Billet's heroics helped Virginia end its exhibition season with a victory.

UVa led 72-55 with 13:04 to play, but the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars outscored UVa 31-12 to take an 86-84 lead with 55 seconds left. Brown tied the game at 86-86 with a bucket inside the paint with 40 seconds left. However, the visitor's Dominic Smith answered with his third consecutive long three-pointer to put the All-Stars on top 89-86. Billet answered with a basket with 19 ticks left to trim the deficit to one, but missed a free throw that would have tied the game. After two missed free throws by the All-Stars' Harold Arcenaux, the All-Stars' Rassan Johnson made one of two foul shots to make the score 90-88. Billet then supplied the heroics with a long three-pointer as time expired.

Byars led the Cavaliers with 21 points and eight rebounds. He made 9-12 attempts from the field, including a 3-4 effort from three-point range. Brown registered a double-double with 20 points and 10 rebounds, while Minter added 18 points and eight boards. Billet tallied 14 points with forward Gary Forbes rounding out the Cavaliers' double-digit scorers with 11 points.

Chris Crosby led the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars with 18 points, while Arcenaux totaled 17 points, 10 rebounds and five assists. Smith had 16 points with Tony Robertson and D.J. Harrison both contributing 12.

UVa shot 53.1 percent (34-64) from the field in the game, including 70 percent (21-30) in the first half. The Cavaliers also held a 47-24 advantage in rebounds.

Cavaliers Welcome Eight Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 5-10 1/2 freshman guard T.J. Bannister, 6-9 freshman forward Jason Cain, 6-6 freshman guard/forward Gary Forbes, 6-7 1/2 freshman forward/center Donte Minter, and 6-2 1/2 freshman guard J.R. Reynolds.

Bannister was the Division I-A Player of the Year in Florida and a first-team All-State selection as a senior in

2002-03. He finished third in the voting for Florida's Mr. Basketball Award as a high school senior, and was only the fourth player in the city of Jacksonville, Fla., to score over 2,000 points during a high school career.

Cain averaged 14 points, 12 rebounds, eight assists and five blocked shots a game as a senior at John Bartram High School, which finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 24-4 and won the Philadelphia Public League Championship. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2003 Philadelphia Public League championship game and the Public League All-Star Game.

Forbes was selected the *Newsday* Player of the Year in Brooklyn and was nominated for City Player of the Year as a high school senior in 2002-03. He earned first-team All-City and All-Tri-State honors in 2002-03 at Benjamin Banneker Academy, and is the first player in Benjamin Banneker Academy history to play Division I basketball.

Minter attended Fork Union Military Academy during the 2002-03 academic year. Prior to attending Fork Union, Minter attended West Rowan High School (N.C.). West Rowan compiled a 30-0 record and won the North Carolina AAA State Championship during his senior year in 2001-02. He was the Most Valuable Player of the State Championship, the West Regional, the county and the North Piedmont Conference as a senior at West Rowan. Minter scored over 2,100 points while grabbing over 1,000 rebounds during his high school career.

Reynolds transferred to Oak Hill Academy from Roanoke Catholic for his senior year of high school. He averaged 16 points, four rebounds, 3.5 assists and 2.5 steals a game at Oak Hill during the 2002-03 season. He started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic and was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times. Roanoke Catholic won three state championships during his time on the team.

Three additional players joined the Virginia team as walkons. The players are 6-5 1/2 senior forward Brad Abel of Burke, Va. (Lake Braddock High School); 6-2 guard Billy Glading of Bethesda, Md. (Gonzaga College High School), who is playing as a graduate student; and 6-5 sophomore forward Hank Nacey of Virginia Beach, Va. (Frank W. Cox High School). Billet and Mapp Look Toward Season

Senior guards Todd Billet and Majestic Mapp provide the Cavaliers with experience in the backcourt for the 2003-04 season. Billet earned honorable mention recognition on the 2003 All-ACC Team after leading the conference in three-point field goal percentage (.418, 94-225) and in three-point field goals made, (94, 2.94 pg). He was also ninth in the ACC in assists (108, 3.38 apg) and 13th in scoring (432, 13.5 ppg). Billet received his bachelor's degree in economics in May of 2003.

Mapp served as a tri-captain for the 2002-03 season and saw game action for the first time since the final game of the 1999-2000 season when he played two minutes against North Carolina (1/11/03) at University Hall. He played 19 minutes and scored a season-high 11 points in the win at Maryland (2/6/03). Mapp played in the last 17 games of the 2002-03 season and averaged 16.4 minutes played a game during that stretch. He also received his bachelor's degree in economics in May of 2003.

Raining Threes

UVa achieved great success behind the three-point arch during the 2002-03 season. Todd Billet led the ACC in three-point field goal percentage (41.8 percent) and three-point field goals made (94, 2.94 pg) last season. Devin Smith ranked eighth in the conference in three-point field goal percentage (38.6 percent).

The 2002-03 season also saw the Cavaliers' establish a school record with 239 three-point field goals made. The previous school record was 232 by the 1994-95 UVa team.

Starting on March 30, 1992, the Cavaliers have a streak of 343 consecutive games with at least one three-point field goal.

Four Out of Five Returning

UVa returns four of five starters from last season to the 2003-04 team. Todd Billet, Elton Brown, Derrick Byars and Devin Smith provide an experienced core of players from last season.

Fifteen Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 27 regular-season games before the 2004 ACC Tournament, 15 are against nine teams that participated in either the 2003 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). The Cavaliers meet league foes and NCAA Tournament participants Duke, Maryland, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice, while also matching up twice against NIT teams Georgia Tech and North Carolina. In addition to those games, Virginia plays 2003 NIT participants Iowa State, Minnesota and Providence.

Home Sweet Home

The Cavaliers play 17 of their 27 regular season games in the friendly confines of University Hall. After playing two exhibition games at home, Virginia started the 2003-2004 regular season by hosting four consecutive games.

John Paul Jones Arena On Its Way

On May 30, 2003 ground was broken on the University of Virginia's new special events center, the John Paul Jones Arena. Scheduled for completion in the summer of 2006, the \$129.8 million arena will replace University Hall. The new 15,000-seat arena will feature training and weight rooms, men's and women's basketball locker rooms and lounges, coaches' offices, and one-and-a-half practice courts per program so the men's and women's basketball teams can practice simultaneously, and when the arena is being used for other purposes.
