## THE GAME

Virginia (2002-2003: 16-16/6-10 ACC) stands at 4-0 in the 2003-2004 season. The Cavaliers are coming off an 86-78 victory over Minnesota Wednesday night (Dec. 3) in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge at University Hall. VMI (2002-2003: 10-20/3-13 Southern Conference) stands at 1-3 on the season after posting an 85-62 win over Southern Virginia University Tuesday (Dec. 2).

## The Series vs. VMI

The Cavaliers own a 99-15 advantage in the all-time series against VMI that dates back to the 1908-09 season. Virginia has won the last 22 meetings between the two schools, the Cavaliers' second-longest winning streak of the series. After dropping consecutive meetings in 1942 and 1943, Virginia reeled off 32 wins in a row over the Keydets from 1943-1960. That is a school record for most consecutive wins over an opponent.

Virginia's 99 wins against VMI are by far its most over any opponent. Next is Virginia Tech, who Virginia has beaten 73 times.

VMI has not beaten Virginia since gaining a 95-75 win in Lexington, Va., on December 9, 1964. Cavalier head coach Pete Gillen was a 17-year old freshman at Fairfield University at the time.

In the most recent contest between the two schools, Virginia defeated the Keydets 93-59 in Charlottesville on January 24, 2002.

The Cavaliers are 40-6 against the Keydets in Lexington with their last win coming in the 2000-01 season. UVa won that game 89-70 on December 4. Virginia has won the last five games between the two teams in Lexington and 28 of the last 30. UVa's last loss in Lexington was in the 1964-65 season (95-75).

## Virginia vs. the Big South Conference

Against the nine current members of the Big South Conference, the Cavaliers are $113-16$ all-time. Virginia is $99-15 \mathrm{vs}$. VMI, $4-0$ vs. Radford, 5-1 vs. Liberty, 2-0 vs. Winthrop, and 1-0 vs. Coastal Carolina, Charleston Southern and High Point. Of the Big South's current membership, Virginia has never faced Birmingham-Southern or North Carolina-Asheville. VMI and Birmingham-Southern are firstyear members of the Big South. The Cavaliers defeated Big South Conference member High Point 79-64 earlier this season (Nov. 30). VMI is in its first year as a member of the Big South after being a member of the Southern Conference since December of 1924.

UVa defeated Liberty 77-58 (Dec. 30) in Charlottesville in its only contest against a Big South opponent last season.

There have been eight other schools that have been members of the Big South Conference at one time or another since 1986. Virginia is $19-1$ against schools in the Big South at game time.

## Shooting Well vs. Keydets

The Cavaliers have won their last 22 games against VMI, due in part to their outstanding shooting. During this streak, stretching back more than 37 years, Virginia is shooting 51.3 percent from the field, while the Keydets shoot 37.2 percent.

During their 22-game winning streak against the Keydets, the Cavaliers have not shot less than 44.2 percent from the field (38-86 in the 1972-73 season). Their highest mark is 65.9 percent (27-41) in the 1975-76 contest. That shooting performance is the eighthbest mark in school history.

In the 16 games since 1972-73, Virginia has topped 47 percent in every game except one (the 2002 matchup when UVa shot 45.1 percent -37-82), including shooting 50 percent or better 11 times. The Cavaliers had their streak of making at least half of their shots in eight-straight meetings vs. VMI stopped in the 1998-99 season. Virginia shot 47.1 percent (24-51) against the Keydets in 1998. Prior to the 47.1 percent performance in the 1998-99 season, a game during the 1982-83 season was the last time UVa failed to make 50 percent of its shots against VMI.

In the last 22 meetings against UVa, the Keydets have failed to shoot 40 percent or better 16 times, including the last six meetings. The last time VMI shot better than 50 percent in a game against Virginia was in the 1990-91 season when it connected on 51.6 percent (33-64) of its attempts from the field.

## Virginia vs. In-State Teams

This is the Cavaliers' second of four games this season against in-state opponents. UVa defeated Virginia Tech 80-65 (Nov. 28) in its first in-state contest of the season.

In the last 27 seasons (since 1977-78), UVa is 107-15 (.877) against in-state opponents. Virginia had its 15-game in-state winning streak snapped with a 73-55 loss at Virginia Tech (Jan. 21) last season. Virginia also posted a 77-58 victory over Liberty (Dec. 30) last year. Prior to losing to the Hokies last season, UVa's most recent in-state loss was a 69-64 setback to Liberty (Jan. 7) in UHall in the 1997-98 season.

In 2001-2002, Virginia registered home victories against Virginia Tech (69-61 - Dec. 1) and VMI (93-59 - Jan. 24).

In the 2000-2001 season, the Cavaliers won both of their contests against in-state opponents. UVa defeated Virginia Tech 64-48 (Nov. 24) in Blacksburg and VMI 89-70 (Dec. 4) in Lexington.

In 1999-2000, Virginia was 4-0 against in-state opponents with the four victories coming against VMI 98-57 (Nov. 21) at University Hall, Hampton 102-56 (Dec. 10) at the Hampton Convocation Center, Richmond 69-65 (Dec. 21) at the Robins Center, and Virginia Tech 71-66 in overtime (Jan. 24) at the Richmond Coliseum.

In 1998-99, the Cavaliers' were 5-0 against in-state opponents defeating Hampton, Liberty, Virginia Commonwealth, VMI and Virginia Tech. In the 1997-98 season, the Cavaliers were 5-2

against in-state foes. The two losses were the most against state teams since the 1987-88 season when UVa was 1-3 vs. state teams.

Pete Gillen is 16-3 against Virginia schools as a collegiate head coach. He is $4-0$ vs. VMI, 2-0 vs. Hampton and Liberty, 1-0 vs. Richmond, 6-2 vs. Virginia Tech, and 1-1 vs. VCU.

Gillen's Xavier team defeated Virginia Tech 85-52 in 1993-94, while his 1994-95 Providence team lost to the Hokies 91-78 in the NIT. In the 1993-94 season, Gillen's Xavier team lost to VCU 79-76.

## Head Coach Pete Gillen

Pete Gillen is in his 19th season as a collegiate head coach and sports a 364-193 record for a . 654 winning percentage. Gillen is in his sixth season at Virginia and has posted a 90-65 record (. 581 winning percentage).

Gillen won his 350th career game on December 21, 2002 when his Cavaliers posted a 61-57 victory over Rutgers. His 300th career victory came when Virginia defeated then 21st-ranked North Carolina 8785 on January 18, 2000 at University Hall.

Gillen has led his teams to postseason play 15 times in 18 seasons (nine NCAA, six NIT), including the last four seasons at Virginia. He has been selected as the conference Coach of the Year five times all while coaching Xavier (Midwestern Collegiate Conference).

## Cavalier Captains

Graduate students Todd Billet and Majestic Mapp, along with junior Devin Smith, are the captains of the 2003-04 Virginia basketball team. It is the second consecutive year Mapp is serving as a team captain.

## Cavaliers Even Record in ACC/Big Ten Challenge

With an 86-78 victory over Minnesota on Wednesday (Dec. 3), Virginia evened its ACC/Big Ten Challenge record at 2-2. The Cavaliers also helped the ACC win the series for the fifth consecutive year as ACC schools won seven of nine contests. The ACC's cumulative record in the Challenge is 27-17.

## Forbes Tabbed ACC Rookie of the Week

Freshman Gary Forbes was selected as the Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week on November 24 for his performance in the Cavaliers' 80-71 season-opening victory over Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23) at University Hall.

The 6-6 guard/forward from Brooklyn, N.Y., scored 21 points and grabbed a game-high nine rebounds to lead Virginia in both departments against Mount St. Mary's. He was 8-13 (61.5 percent) from the field and was 5-9 (55.6 percent) from the free throw line in the game. He also blocked three shots, had one assist and one steal in 35 minutes of action.

Elton Brown was the last Cavalier to earn the ACC's Rookie of the Week Award as he captured it twice in the 2001-2002 season (Dec. 24 and Jan. 28).

## Auspicious Debut

Freshman Gary Forbes had a tremendous debut in the Cavaliers' 80-71 win over Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). Forbes had team-high totals of 21 points, nine rebounds and three blocked shots. Forbes followed up his first collegiate game with a team-high tying 16 points to go along with a team-best eight rebounds in UVa's 80-65 win over Virginia Tech (Nov. 28). In his third collegiate game, Forbes had 10 points and five rebounds against High Point (Nov. 30), followed by a 22-point, nine-rebound performance against Minnesota (Dec. 3).

It is the first time a Virginia freshman has led the team in scoring and rebounding in a season-opener since Ralph Sampson in 1979. Sampson had 17 points and eight rebounds against Johns Hopkins on November 25, 1979. Forbes is also the first UVa freshman to lead the team in scoring (he tied for the team lead in scoring against Virginia Tech) and rebounding in his first two games since the restoration of freshman eligibility in 1972-73.

The last freshman to lead UVa in scoring in a season-opener was Harold Deane, who scored 10 points against Connecticut on

November 29, 1993. With 24 points against James Madison in 1977, Jeff Lamp holds the school record for most points in a season-opener by a freshman.

The last frosh to lead the Cavaliers in rebounding in a season-opener was Travis Watson, who had 14 rebounds against Elon on November 19, 1999.

## Smith Returns to Lineup

After missing the Cavaliers' season-opener against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23) as well as the second exhibition game against Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars (Nov. 18), junior Devin Smith returned to the lineup against Virginia Tech (Nov. 28). In 16 minutes of action off the bench, Smith tallied five points and seven rebounds. Against High Point (Nov. 30), he had 10 points, six rebounds, two steals and a blocked shot in 20 minutes of action.

Smith made his first start of the season against Minnesota (Dec. 3) and tallied a team and UVa career-high 10 rebounds to go along with three points, two steals and one assist in 25 minutes of playing time. Smith was out with an injured back.

## Mapp Making an Impact

Guard Majestic Mapp has made an impact in the first four games of the season. He is averaging 4.8 points, three assists and 1.5 rebounds in 20.5 minutes per game.

He opened the season with six points and three assists with only one turnover in 23 minutes against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). Against Virginia Tech (Nov. 28), Mapp totaled six points, five assists, and four rebounds with only one turnover in 24 minutes of playing time. In 23 minutes against High Point (Nov. 30), Mapp had two points, four assists and two rebounds. Against Minnesota (Dec. 5), Mapp had five points in 12 minutes.

Last season Mapp averaged 2.4 points, 1.2 rebounds, and 1.7 assists in 15.6 minutes of action per game. He played in 18 of 32 games last season, including the final 17 games.

## Five in Double Figures

Virginia has featured a balanced scoring attack this season as the Cavaliers have had five players reach double figures in scoring in two of their four games.

In the season-opener vs. Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23), Gary Forbes (21), Todd Billet (13), Donte Minter (12), Derrick Byars (11), and Elton Brown (10) all reached double digits. Against High Point (Nov. 30), Minter (13), Byars (12), Forbes (10), Devin Smith (10), and Brown (10) scored in double figures.

## Billet Drains 100th Three

Guard Todd Billet drilled his 100th career three-point field goal as a Cavalier in UVa's win over High Point (Nov. 30). Billet is currently 11th on Virginia's career three-point field goals list with 101. Keith Friel (2000-01) is 10th with 107 career threes.

Billet has made his 101 career three-pointers at UVa in just 36 games for an average of 2.81 threes per game. He made 94 threes last season which is the fourth highest single season total in school history.

In his collegiate career (which includes 158 three-point field goals while playing two seasons at Rutgers), Billet has made 259 threes.

## Brown and Forbes Set Career Highs in Scoring

Junior forward/center Elton Brown and freshman guard/forward Gary Forbes have both scored in double digits
all four games this season and set career highs in UVa's win over Minnesota (Dec. 3).

Brown exploded for a career-best 26 points against Minnesota. The 26 points are 10 more than his previous current season high (16 vs. Virginia Tech - Nov. 28). Brown's prior career-high was 22 points vs. Chaminade (Nov. 25) last season.

Forbes tallied 22 points against the Golden Gophers to set a new career-high. His previous career-best was 21 points in his collegiate debut against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23).
Forbes also equaled his career-high with nine rebounds vs. Minnesota. He also had nine boards vs. Mount St. Mary's.

## Shooting Well

Freshman forward/center Donte Minter is off to a great start shooting the basketball. In four games, Minter has made 13-19 attempts from the field for an impressive 68.4 percent. He has also made $8-9$ free throw attempts ( 88.9 percent).

Minter was 4-5 from the field in UVa's win over High Point (Nov. 30). Minter began his collegiate career with a 5-6 (83.3 percent) effort from the field against Mount St. Mary's (Nov. 23). He was 3-5 from the floor against Virginia Tech (Nov. 28) and 1-3 vs. Minnesota (Dec. 3).

In UVa's two exhibition victories, Minter was even more accurate from the floor as he shot 83.3 percent while making 15 of 18 attempts. He was a perfect 7-7 from the field against Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 11).

Minter isn't the only Cavalier shooting the ball well early in the season. Sophomore forward Derrick Byars has made 56.7 percent (17-30) of his attempts from the field in the first four games, including a perfect 5-5 effort in the season-opener against Mount St. Mary's.

In the Cavaliers' two exhibition wins, Byars connected on 19-23 attempts from the field for an impressive 82.6 shooting percentage. He also made 4-6 three-point attempts. Byars made 10-11 attempts ( 90.9 percent) from the field in UVa's 104-80 win over Big Apple Basketball (Nov. 11).

Two other UVa players are also shooting better than 50 percent from the field this season. Guard/forward Gary Forbes has connected on 52.0 percent $(26-50)$ of his attempts from the floor, while forward/center Elton Brown is shooting 51.2 percent (21-41) from the field.

## Solid Defense

Virginia has held each of its first four opponents of the 2003-04 season under 40 percent shooting from the field. UVa is also limiting its opponents to 69.5 points per game.

## Trouble on the Boards

The Cavaliers have won all four games this season despite not out-rebounding their opponent. UVa was outrebounded by Mount St. Mary's (41-36), Virginia Tech (44-39), and Minnesota (51-40), and tied High Point (39-39).

Virginia is being out-rebounded 43.8 to 38.5 (-5.3) per game this season. On the offensive glass, the Cavaliers have been out-rebounded 71-34 (-9.3 per game). UVa gave up 22 offensive rebounds against Minnesota.

## VMI, Then Final Exams

After tonight's road-opener at VMI, Virginia will have a 10day break for final exams before returning to the hardwood against James Madison on December 16 at University Hall. (Final exams run from December 8 through December 15).

## Shooting 50 Percent in Openers

For the fourth consecutive season, the Cavaliers shot 50 percent or better in their season-opener. Here's a look at UVa's field goal percentage in the last four season-openers. 2003-2004 Mount St. Mary's 24-46 52.2\% 2002-2003 Long Island $33-66$ 50.0\% 2001-2002 Wagner 42-71 59.2\% 2000-2001 Long Island 36-59 61.0\%

The last time UVa failed to reach 50 percent shooting from the field in a season-opener was in the 1999-2000 campaign when the Cavaliers shot a respectable 47.8 percent (33-69) from the floor against Elon.

## Two Sign Letters Of Intent with Virginia

Head basketball coach Pete Gillen has announced the signing of two individuals to national letters of intent with Virginia. The two individuals are 6-7 small forward Adrian Joseph of Trinidad and 5-11 point guard Sean Singletary of Philadelphia, Pa.
"These two young men are outstanding students as well as very talented basketball players," Gillen said. "They will fit in perfectly in our pressing and running style of play."

Joseph is attending Brewster Academy in Wolfeboro, N.H., this academic year after attending Bergen Catholic High School in Oradell, N.J., last year. He averaged 15.0 points, 7.2 rebounds and 2.9 blocked shots a game during the 200203 season. He earned first-team All-League and All-County honors, and third-team All-State honors.

Singletary averaged 18 points, eight assists, seven rebounds and 4.5 steals a game as a junior at William Penn Charter School last season. He earned first-team All-League and All-City honors last year. Penn Charter finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 26-4 and won the league championship.

## Virginia Men Return to Postseason Play

Virginia received an invitation to the National Invitation Tournament (NIT) following the 2002-03 regular season. UVa defeated Brown University 89-73 (March 19) at University Hall in the first round of the tournament. The Cavaliers then suffered a 73-63 loss at St. John's (March 24) in the second round. It was the Cavaliers 10th NIT appearance and the team's fourth consecutive postseason appearance. Virginia finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 16-16 and a 6-10 record in the ACC.

## Brown and Forbes Lead UVa Over Minnesota

Junior Elton Brown and freshman Gary Forbes combined to score 48 points and lead Virginia to an 86-78 win over Minnesota Wednesday (Dec. 3) in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge at University Hall.

Brown scored a career-high 26 points and added six rebounds, three assists, and two blocks. He made 10-16 attempts from the field and was 6-7 from the free throw line in the victory. Forbes notched a career-best 22 points and equaled his career-high with nine rebounds. He also added two steals, two blocked shots and one assist. Sophomore Derrick Byars also reached double figures with 16 points and he pulled down a career-best tying nine rebounds. Junior Devin Smith led the Cavaliers with 10 rebounds, a UVa career-best.

Virginia held the Golden Gophers to 37.0 percent (27-73) shooting in the game and committed just nine turnovers while forcing 18. Minnesota held a 51-40 edge in rebounding, including a 22-10 advantage on the offensive glass.

There were five lead changes in the first half with neither team leading by more than six points. UVa took a 35-34 lead at the half.

Virginia quickly built its lead to eight points, 44-36, less than two minutes into the second stanza, and extended its lead to 10, 54-44, with 13:39 remaining. Minnesota charged back to tie the game at 61-61 at the 8:22 mark with a 17-7 run. The Cavaliers responded with a 13-1 run over the next 4:18 to take a 74-62 lead. Brown keyed the run with seven points while Forbes had four.

Kris Humphries led Minnesota with 32 points and 13 rebounds, while Maurice Hargrow had 11 points, 15 rebounds and six assists. Michael Bauer chipped in with 20 points.

## UVa Wins Two Exhibition Games

The Cavaliers won both of their exhibition games prior to the start of the 2003-2004 regular season. Virginia opened exhibition play with a 104-80 victory over Big Apple Basketball November 11 and then defeated the Coaches vs. Cancer AllStars 91-90 on November 18.

In the win 104-80 win over Big Apple Basketball, Virginia shot 60.3 percent ( $38-63$ ) from the field, including 47.8 percent (11-23) from three-point range, and had five players score in double figures.

Forward Derrick Byars made 10-11 shots from the field and scored 25 points to lead the Cavaliers. Guard Todd Billet scored 21 points and had five assists, while forward Devin Smith had 20 points and blocked four shots. Forward/center Donte Minter made all seven of his shots from the field and had 15 points, and forward/center Elton Brown scored 13 points and had a game-high seven rebounds.

UVa led 61-35 at halftime after shooting 69.7 percent (2333) from the field in the first half, including 64.3 percent (9-14) from three-point range.

Guard Tim Winn led Big Apple Basketball with 20 points and four assists.

Against the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars, Billet hit a long three-pointer at the final buzzer to lift UVa to a 91-90 win. The Cavaliers let a 17-point second half lead slip away, but Billet's heroics helped Virginia end its exhibition season with a victory.

UVa led 72-55 with 13:04 to play, but the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars outscored UVa 31-12 to take an 86-84 lead with 55 seconds left. Brown tied the game at $86-86$ with a bucket inside the paint with 40 seconds left. However, the visitor's Dominic Smith answered with his third consecutive long three-pointer to put the All-Stars on top 89-86. Billet answered with a basket with 19 ticks left to trim the deficit to one, but missed a free throw that would have tied the game. After two missed free throws by the All-Stars' Harold

Arcenaux, the All-Stars' Rassan Johnson made one of two foul shots to make the score 90-88. Billet then supplied the heroics with a long three-pointer as time expired.

Byars led the Cavaliers with 21 points and eight rebounds. He made 9-12 attempts from the field, including a 3-4 effort from three-point range. Brown registered a double-double with 20 points and 10 rebounds, while Minter added 18 points and eight boards. Billet tallied 14 points with forward Gary Forbes rounding out the Cavaliers' double-digit scorers with 11 points.

Chris Crosby led the Coaches vs. Cancer All-Stars with 18 points, while Arcenaux totaled 17 points, 10 rebounds and five assists. Smith had 16 points with Tony Robertson and D.J. Harrison both contributing 12.

UVa shot 53.1 percent (34-64) from the field in the game, including 70 percent (21-30) in the first half. The Cavaliers also held a 47-24 advantage in rebounds.

## Cavaliers Welcome Eight Newcomers

Joining the Cavaliers this season are 5-10 1/2 freshman guard T.J. Bannister, 6-9 freshman forward Jason Cain, 6-6 freshman guard/forward Gary Forbes, 6-7 1/2 freshman forward/center Donte Minter, and 6-2 1/2 freshman guard J.R. Reynolds.

Bannister was the Division I-A Player of the Year in Florida and a first-team All-State selection as a senior in 2002-03. He finished third in the voting for Florida's Mr. Basketball Award as a high school senior, and was only the fourth player in the city of Jacksonville, Fla., to score over 2,000 points during a high school career.

Cain averaged 14 points, 12 rebounds, eight assists and five blocked shots a game as a senior at John Bartram High School, which finished the 2002-03 season with an overall record of 24-4 and won the Philadelphia Public League Championship. He was named the Most Valuable Player of the 2003 Philadelphia Public League championship game and the Public League All-Star Game.

Forbes was selected the Newsday Player of the Year in Brooklyn and was nominated for City Player of the Year as a high school senior in 2002-03. He earned first-team All-City and All-Tri-State honors in 2002-03 at Benjamin Banneker Academy, and is the first player in Benjamin Banneker Academy history to play Division I basketball.

Minter attended Fork Union Military Academy during the 2002-03 academic year. Prior to attending Fork Union, Minter attended West Rowan High School (N.C.). West Rowan compiled a 30-0 record and won the North Carolina AAAState Championship during his senior year in 2001-02. He was the Most Valuable Player of the State Championship, the West Regional, the county and the North Piedmont Conference as a senior at West Rowan. Minter scored over 2,100 points while grabbing over 1,000 rebounds during his high school career.

Reynolds transferred to Oak Hill Academy from Roanoke Catholic for his senior year of high school. He averaged 16 points, four rebounds, 3.5 assists and 2.5 steals a game at Oak Hill during the 2002-03 season. He started for four seasons at Roanoke Catholic and was named the Most Valuable Player in the Virginia Independent Schools Division II three times. Roanoke Catholic won three state championships during his time on the team.

Three additional players joined the Virginia team as walkons. The players are 6-5 1/2 senior forward Brad Abel of Burke, Va. (Lake Braddock High School); 6-2 guard Billy Glading of Bethesda, Md. (Gonzaga College High School), who is playing as a graduate student; and 6-5 sophomore forward Hank Nacey
of Virginia Beach, Va. (Frank W. Cox High School). See page seven of the notes for bios on the four walk-ons.

## Billet and Mapp Look Toward Season

Senior guards Todd Billet and Majestic Mapp provide the Cavaliers with experience in the backcourt for the 2003-04 season. Billet earned honorable mention recognition on the 2003 All-ACC Team after leading the conference in three-point field goal percentage (.418, 94-225) and in three-point field goals made, $(94,2.94 \mathrm{pg})$. He was also ninth in the ACC in assists (108, 3.38 apg ) and 13th in scoring (432, 13.5 ppg ). Billet received his bachelor's degree in economics in May of 2003.

Mapp served as a tri-captain for the 2002-03 season and saw game action for the first time since the final game of the 1999-2000 season when he played two minutes against North Carolina (1/11/03) at University Hall. He played 19 minutes and scored a season-high 11 points in the win at Maryland (2/6/03). Mapp played in the last 17 games of the 2002-03 season and averaged 16.4 minutes played a game during that stretch. He also received his bachelor's degree in economics in May of 2003.

## Raining Threes

UVa achieved great success behind the three-point arch during the 2002-03 season. Todd Billet led the ACC in three-point field goal percentage ( 41.8 percent) and three-point field goals made ( $94,2.94 \mathrm{pg}$ ) last season. Devin Smith ranked eighth in the conference in three-point field goal percentage ( 38.6 percent).

The 2002-03 season also saw the Cavaliers' establish a school record with 239 three-point field goals made. The previous school record was 232 by the 1994-95 UVa team.

Starting on March 30, 1992, the Cavaliers have a streak of 341 consecutive games with at least one three-point field goal.

## Four Out of Five Returning

UVa returns four of five starters from last season to the 2003-04 team. Todd Billet, Elton Brown, Derrick Byars and Devin Smith provide an experienced core of players from last season.

## Fifteen Games against Tournament Teams

Of Virginia's 27 regular-season games before the 2004 ACC Tournament, 15 are against nine teams that participated in either the 2003 NCAA Tournament or the National Invitation Tournament (NIT). The Cavaliers meet league foes and NCAATournament participants Duke, Maryland, N.C. State and Wake Forest twice, while also matching up twice against NITteams Georgia Tech and North Carolina. In addition to those games, Virginia plays 2003 NITparticipants lowa State, Minnesota and Providence.

## Home Sweet Home

The Cavaliers play 17 of their 27 regular season games in the friendly confines of University Hall. After playing two exhibition games at home, Virginia started the 2003-2004 regular season by hosting four consecutive games.

## John Paul Jones Arena On Its Way

On May 30, 2003 ground was broken on the University of Virginia's new special events center, the John Paul Jones Arena. Scheduled for completion in the summer of 2006, the $\$ 129.8$ million arena will replace University Hall. The new 15,000-seat arena will feature training and weight rooms, men's and women's basketball locker rooms, coaches' offices, and one-and-a-half practice courts per program so the men's and women's basketball teams can practice simultaneously,
