UVa Upsets Arizona in John Paul Jones Arena Opener

Virginia trailed by as many as 19 points in the first half, but used a 57-point outburst in the second stanza to register a 93-90 victory over 10th-ranked Arizona (Nov. 12) in the first game at the John Paul Jones Arena

Mamadi Diane and Sean Singletary both scored 25 points to lead UVa to the season-opening win. Diane set a career high with his 25 points as he connected on 8-9 attempts from the field, including 5-6 three-point field goals, and made all four free throw attempts. He added four rebounds, two assists and two steals. Singletary had six assists, two rebounds and two steals in addition to his 25 points. Jason Cain recorded a double-double with 13 points and a game-high 12 rebounds. J.R. Reynolds rounded out UVa's double figure scorers with 10 points.

Diane got the John Paul Jones Arena era off to a quick start by making a three-pointer at the 19:34 mark. The Wildcats trailed 14-12 at the 14:14 mark of the first stanza, but used an 18-2 run to grab a 30-16 lead with 11:00 left in the half. Arizona built its lead to 19 points (45-26) before taking a 49-36 lead at the intermission.

UVa came back to tie the game at 68-68 with 11:04 to play when Singletary made a pair of free throws. The Wildcats extended their lead to five points (77-72) only to see Virginia battle back to tie the game at 77-77 with 6:30 left. Diane's three with 5:43 to go gave UVa an 80-79 lead. Virginia took the lead for good, 84-82, at the 4:11 mark when Diane drained a two free throws. UVa increased its lead to six, 89-83 with 1:38 to play when Singletary made two free throws. Arizona battled back to cut the lead to 92-90 with 12 seconds left on two free throws by Mustafa Shakur. Revnolds made one free throw with eight ticks to go and Arizona missed a three-pointer at the buzzer.

Virginia shot 45.9 percent (28-61) from the field in the game and was 16-27 (59.3 percent) in the second half. The Wildcats shot 47.0 percent (31-66) from the floor. UVa made 29-38 free throw attempts (76.3 percent) while Arizona was 19-25 (76.0 percent) from the line. UVa committed only 11 turnovers in the game while forcing 15.

Ivan Radenovic led Arizona with 24 points, eight rebounds and five assists, while Marcus Williams and Jawann McClellan both had 18 points.

Cavaliers Defeat Morgan State 85-66

Virginia improved to 2-0 on the season with an 85-66 win over Morgan State (Nov. 19) at the John Paul Jones Arena. Four Cavaliers scored in double figures and seven different UVa players tallied seven or more points in the win.

J.R. Reynolds led UVa with 17 points, tied his career high with seven rebounds and had four assists, while Will Harris set career highs with 16 points and eight rebounds. Mamadi Diane tallied 15 points and five rebounds, while Sean Singletary added 12 points, eight assists and six boards. Diane continued his hot shooting as he made 6-8 field goal attempts, including 2-3 threepoint tries.

The Cavaliers never trailed in the game as they opened up a 12-0 lead three minutes into the game. Virginia led by as many as 21 points (40-19) with 3:06 remaining in the first half, but Morgan State used an 11-2 run to pull within 42-30 at halftime.

Virginia opened the second half with an 11-4 run in the first five minutes to take a 19-point lead (53-34). The Bears never got closer than 13 points (73-60 with 4:41 left) the rest of the game.

The Cavaliers shot 50.9 percent (29-57) from the field in the contest, including 56.0 percent (14-25) in the second half. Morgan State shot only 35.4 percent (23-65) overall for the game, but did make 11-29 (37.9 percent) three-point attempts. UVa held a 48-30 edge in rebounds, but committed 19 turnovers. Morgan State had 17 miscues in the game.

Reggie Holmes and Karanvir Aujla led the Bears with 12 points apiece, while Joseph McLean added 11 points and seven assists.

UVa Posts 81-64 Win Over UNC Asheville

Sean Singletary and J.R. Reynolds combined for 38 points and 12 assists to lead Virginia to an 81-64 victory over UNC Asheville (Nov. 22) at the John Paul Jones Arena.

Singletary led all players with 20 points and seven assists and also added four rebounds. Singletary was a perfect 12-12 from the free throw line. Reynolds made 7-14 attempts from the field, including two three-pointers, and both free throws en route to 18 points. He also added five assists, two rebounds and a pair of steals. Adrian Joseph was the third Cavalier to reach double digits in scoring as he had 14 points to go along with six rebounds. Jason Cain led all players with 10 rebounds.

UVa shot 43.3 percent (26-60) from the field in the game, but limited UNC Asheville to 30.5 percent (18-59) accuracy. The Cavaliers were an impressive 19-23 (82.6 percent) from the free throw line, while UNCA made 20-27 attempts (74.1 percent) from the charity stripe. UVa held a 47-35 advantage in rebounds.

Bryan Smithson led the Bulldogs with 16 points and four assists, while Donovan Jones tallied 14 points. Kenny George, a 7-6 center, blocked five shots in his first collegiate contest.

J.R. Reynolds and Jason Cain both scored 22 points to lead the Cavaliers to a 104-63 victory over Maryland Eastern Shore (Nov. 26) at the John Paul Jones Arena. It is the most points UVa has scored in a game since Dec. 30, 2001 when the Cavaliers scored 112 points against Grambling.

UVa connected on 33-62 attempts from the field in the contest for 53.2 percent accuracy. The Cavaliers held UMES to 37.3 percent (25-67) shooting from the floor. Virginia was extremely accurate from the free throw line as they Cavaliers made 29-35 attempts for 82.9 percent. UVa Falls To Purdue In ACC/Big Ten Challenge

Purdue's Tarrance Crump hit a running floater with one second remaining to break a 59-59 tie and lift the Boilermakers to a 61-59 victory (Nov. 29) over Virginia in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge in West Lafayette, Ind.

During the second half, Virginia turned a nine-point deficit into a five-point lead, only to see Purdue make three key three-pointers down the stretch to pull out the victory. The Boilermakers opened up a 39-30 lead with 15:42 remaining in the game, but UVa used a 15-4 run to take a 45-43 edge with 10:31 to play. The Cavaliers built their lead to five on two occasions, including 55-50 with 6:50 left in the game. Purdue then went on a 9-2 run on the strength of three three-point field goals to take a 59-57 lead with 1:32 to go.

Sean Singletary tied the game at 59-59 with 29 seconds left when he made a pair of free throws, but Crump answered with his game-winning shot with just one second remaining.

Virginia led by as many as seven points (17-10) midway through the first half, but Purdue rallied to take a 26-23 halftime advantage.

Singletary led all players with 21 points, including three three-point field goals, and he also made all eight of his free throw attempts. Singletary also had six rebounds, three assists and a steal. Mamadi Diane was the only other Cavalier to score in double figures as he had 17 points on 7-11 shooting from the field, including a 3-6 effort from beyond the arch. He also added three assists, three steals and two rebounds. Adrian Joseph pulled down a career-high 10 rebounds and tallied six points, while J.R. Reynolds also notched a career best in rebounds with nine. He also had five assists, but saw his 28-game double figure scoring streak end as he totaled only seven points.

Neither team shot the ball well from the field. UVa was 21-55 for 38.2 percent accuracy from the floor, while Purdue was 22-57 for 38.6 percent. The Cavaliers held a 39-36 advantage in rebounds, but committed 15 turnovers to Purdue's 11.

Carl Landry led the Boilermakers with 19 points and eight rebounds. David Teague added 14 points, including four three-pointers, and eight rebounds.

Virginia Defeats NC State in ACC Opener

Virginia snapped an 11-game losing streak in Atlantic Coast Conference openers by defeating NC State 67-62 (Dec. 3) at the John Paul Jones Arena.

J.R. Reynolds and Will Harris both scored 14 points to lead the Cavaliers with Reynolds scoring 13 of his 14 points in the second half. He added five rebounds and three assists, while Harris posted six rebounds. Sean Singletary tallied 11 points, nine rebounds, five assists and two steals. Jason Cain led all players with 10 rebounds.

UVa took a 27-26 lead at the intermission, but the Wolfpack opened the second half with an 8-1 run to take a 34-28 lead with 16:40 to play. It marked the first of 16 lead changes in the second half. Harris scored seven of UVa's next nine points to help the Cavaliers retake the lead, 37-35 with 14:09 to go. Neither team led by more than three points over the final 14 minutes until a pair of Singletary free throws with five seconds left made the final score 67-62. Reynolds scored all 13 of his second half points over the final 7:12 of the contest.

Reynolds' three-pointer with 1:40 to play gave UVa a 62-61 lead. After a NC State free throw tied the game, Singletary put the Cavaliers ahead for good 64-62 with a jumper with 1:03 remaining. Reynolds and Singletary combined to make 3-4 free throws in the final 20 seconds to make the final score 67-62.

UVa shot only 37.9 percent (25-66) from the field in the contest. The Wolfpack shot 41.8 percent (23-55) from the floor. The Cavaliers had a season-low nine turnovers, but forced only 10 NC State miscues. Virginia held a commanding 47-31 advantage in rebounds, including an 18-4 edge on the offensive glass. UVa held a 33-3 edge in scoring off the bench as well.

Brandon Costner led the Wolfpack with 17 points, seven rebounds and two blocked shots. Gavin Grant added 15 points, eight assists and six rebounds.

Virginia Shoot Downs Gonzaga 108-87

Virginia drilled a school record 18 three-point field goals and Sean Singletary exploded for a career-high 37 points in UVa's 108-87 victory over Gonzaga (Jan. 3) at the John Paul Jones Arena.

The Cavaliers made 18-34 attempts from three-point range for 52.9 percent accuracy to break the former mark of 15 made three-pointers in a game. Singletary led the way with a career-best seven treys (on 12 attempts). His 37 points (in only 25 minutes) bettered his former best of 35 points, which also came against Gonzaga on Dec. 17, 2005. Singletary made 9-16 attempts from the floor and 12-14 free throws while adding five rebounds, three steals and two assists.

Mamadi Diane poured in 22 points on 8-13 shooting from the field, including a perfect 4-4 effort from three-point range. He also made both free throw attempts. J.R. Reynolds added 15 points and tied Soloman Tat for team-high honors in assists with five. Jamil Tucker scored a career-best 12 points, including three three-point field goals.

After Gonzaga opened the game with a basket, Singletary drained back-to-back three-pointers and answered a Bulldog basket with another three. Laurynas Mikalauskas followed with a dunk and Diane then drained a three and added a pair of free throws to give the Cavaliers a 16-4 lead 4:18 into the contest. Singletary's fourth and fifth three-pointers at the 10:30 and 10:07 marks increased Virginia's lead to 32-11. UVa made 12 threes and shot 59.4 percent (19-32) from the field in the first half, while taking a 60-26 lead.

UVa led by as many as 36 points on three ocassions in the second half, including 87-51 with 9:42 to play. Gonzaga scored the last seven points of the game to make the final margin 21 points (108-87) – the smallest margin since the score was 41-20 with 5:49 left in the first half.

Virginia shot 50.8 percent (32-63) from the field in the game, including the 18-34 effort from long range. The Zags shot 40.0 percent (26-65) from the floor in the game and made 10 three-pointers. The Cavaliers were outrebounded – 38-36 – for just the second time this season.

Derek Raivio led Gonzaga with 26 points, including six three-pointers. Sean Mallon added 16 points and eight rebounds.

UVa Drops Last Second Decision to Stanford

Stanford's Lawrence Hill hit a short jumper with one second remaining to lift the Cardinal to a 76-75 win over Virginia (Jan. 7) at the John Paul Jones Arena. The loss is the first for the Cavaliers at the JPJA.

J.R. Reynolds gave Virginia a 75-74 lead when he made one of two free throws with 9.4 seconds remaining, but Hill responded by making the game-winning shot.

Sean Singletary led the Cavaliers with a gamehigh 24 points and added four rebounds and two assists. Reynolds scored all 14 of his points in the final 12:03 of the game. Adrian Joseph tallied 12 points off the bench

Stanford led by as many as six points, 30-24, with 2:30 left in the first half. Virginia closed out the first stanza with a 7-3 run to cut the deficit to two, 33-31, at the intermission.

The Cavaliers took their first lead since early in the first half with 14:41 to play when Singletary made a three-pointer to give UVa a 45-44 advantage. Stanford came back to take a 52-47 lead with 12:49 to go, but the Cavaliers responded with an 11-3 run to grab a 58-55 lead with 8:49 to go. Virginia took its biggest lead of the game, 63-59, with 6:58 to go when Reynolds made a

The game was tied three times in the final 4:04. including 72-72 with 2:30 to play. Reynolds made two more free throws with 1:17 left to give UVa a 74-72 advantage. A tip-in by Stanford's Robin Lopez knotted the game at 74-74 with 42 seconds left.

Virginia shot 43.1 percent (22-51) from the field in the game, while the Cardinal were 27-59 for 45.8 percent from the floor. The Cavaliers had a season-low seven assists in the game. UVa held a 32-31 edge in rebounds.

UVa Falls to No. 1 North Carolina 79-69

Virginia led No. 1 North Carolina for much of the first half and in the opening minutes of the second half, but the Tar Heels rallied to post a 79-69 win (Jan. 10) at the Dean E. Smith Center in Chapel Hill. UVa falls to 1-26 all-time against top ranked teams.

The Cavaliers got off to a great start and led by as many as nine points, 27-18, midway through the first half. North Carolina used a 13-3 run to take its first lead of the contest, 31-30, with 6:45 remaining in the opening half. A jumper and then a three-pointer by Sean Singletary gave UVa a 35-31 edge, but the Tar Heels scored eight of the 10 points to take a 39-37 halftime lead.

UVa opened the final stanza with a 9-2 flurry to grab a 46-41 lead with 18:18 to play. Virginia Loses to Boston College 78-73

Virginia made six more field goals, including eight more three-pointers than Boston College, but the Eagles outscored UVa 35-10 from the free throw line to register a 78-73 victory (Jan. 13) over the Cavaliers at the Conte Forum in Chestnut Hill, Mass.

Boston College was an impressive 35-45 from the free throw line for 77.8 percent accuracy, while UVa made just 10-19 attempts from the stripe for 52.6 percent. The disparity from the free throw line more than offset the Cavaliers 26-20 edge in field goals made, including an 11-3 advantage in three-pointers. Virginia also outshot the Eagles 45.6 percent (26-57) to 38.5 percent (20-52) from the floor.

J.R. Reynolds paced the Cavaliers with 21 points, seven assists and four rebounds. Sean Singletary tallied 12 points, five rebounds and five assists, while Adrian Joseph added 11 points. The trio combined to make 10 of UVa's 11 three-point field goals.

Virginia got off to a great start, holding the Eagles scoreless for nearly six and a half minutes while building a 9-0 lead. Virginia Runs Past Maryland 103-91

Mamadi Diane and Sean Singletary combined for 51 points to lead five Cavaliers in double figures in Virginia's 103-91 win over Maryland (Jan. 16) at the John Paul Jones Arena. The victory snapped a six-game slide to Maryland and is the first time UVa has scored 100 points in a game against the Terrapins. It also marked the first time Virginia has scored 100 points in an ACC game since a 104-76 win at Clemson on Jan. 27, 2001.

Diane tallied a career-high 26 points on 9-16 shooting from the field, including a pair of three-pointers, and a 6-7 effort from the free throw line. He also registered a career-high four steals. Singletary tallied 25 points, which included a 12-14 performance from the free throw line, seven assists, three rebounds and two steals. J.R. Reynolds posted 17 points, seven rebounds and four assists. He was 11-12 from the charity stripe. Jason Cain notched his second double-double of the season with 13 points and a career-high tying 16 rebounds, which is also a John Paul Jones Arena record. Jamil Tucker came off the bench to equal his career high with 12 points.

Maryland led only once and that was in the early stage of the game. UVa took the lead for good on a jumper by Diane that made the score 5-3 just 1:20 into the contest. At the 11:03 mark, Reynolds made a pair of free throws to start a 14-2 run that gave the Cavaliers a 38-20 lead. With UVa leading 50-30, Maryland closed out the half with a 13-0 run to make the halftime score 50-43.

The Terps trimmed UVa's lead to 56-53 and then 58-55 at the 14:36 mark, but Virginia responded with a 12-0 run to grab a 70-55 lead with 9:52 to play. Maryland got no closer than eight points the rest of the game.

Virginia shot 44.4 percent (28-63) from the field in the game. The Terrapins were 33-77 for 42.9 percent from the floor. The Cavaliers held a huge advantage at the free throw line as they converted 39-49 (79.6 percent) attempts, while Maryland was only 15-24 (62.5 percent). The Cavaliers also held a 48-36 advantage in rebounds.

Mike Jones scored 18 points to lead Maryland, while Ekene Ibekwe registered a double-double with 17 points and 14 rebounds.

Reynolds Leads UVa to 88-76 Win over Wake

J.R. Reynolds scored a career-high 40 points to lead Virginia to an 88-76 victory over Wake Forest (Jan. 21) at the John Paul Jones Arena. Reynolds connected on 12-18 field goal attempts, including 6-8 three-pointers, and made all 10 free throw attempts.

Reynolds' also established career highs with his 12 field goals made and six three-pointers. Sean Singletary added 19 points, while Mamadi Diane and Jason Cain both added 10 points.

Virginia Collects Road Win over NC State

J.R. Reynolds and Sean Singletary combined to score 56 points to lead Virginia to a 71-58 victory over NC State (Jan. 24) at the RBC Center in Raleigh. The UVa duo scored only two less points than the entire Wolfpack team.

After a quiet first half, Reynolds exploded for 24 of his game-high 29 points. He was 9-15 from the field, including 5-8 from three-point range, and made all six free throws while adding six rebounds and three assists. Singletary scored 15 of his 27 points in the first half and also grabbed all nine of his rebounds in the first stanza. He also had four assists and a steal. Jason Cain led all players with 12 rebounds.

Singletary scored 12 of his 15 first half points in the first 10 minutes of the game while helping UVa take a 21-12 lead at the 9:57 mark. NC State whittled UVa's lead down to four points, but Singletary ended a 7:20 Cavalier scoring drought with a three-point basket with four ticks left in the first half to give UVa a 26-19 half-time lead.

Virginia built its lead to 12 points, 42-30, with 14:02 remaining on the clock when Singletary drained a three-pointer. The Wolfpack used an 11-0 run to trim the deficit to one point, 42-41, with 11:45 remaining in the game. Reynolds ended the NCSU run with a fadeaway jumper at the 10:57 mark. After a Laurynas Mikalauskas layup made the score 46-42, Reynolds scored UVa's next 18 points in a span of 8:16 to help seal the victory.

After shooting only 29.4 percent (10-34) in the first half, UVa heated up and shot 63.6 percent (14-22) in the second stanza for 42.9 percent (24-56) accuracy for the game. The Cavaliers held NC State to 31.7 percent (20-63) shooting from the floor. UVa also held a 44-38 edge in rebounds.

Brandon Costner led NC State with 14 points and seven rebounds, while Courtney Fells registered a double-double with 11 points and 10 rebounds.

UVa Registers Comeback Win Over Clemson

Virginia scored the final 15 points of the game capped off by a Jason Cain tip-in with 15.5 seconds remaining for a 64-63 victory over 19th-ranked Clemson (Jan. 28) at Littlejohn Coliseum.

The Cavaliers trailed by as many as 16 points (61-45) with 8:47 to play and held Clemson scoreless over the final five minutes in the come-from-behind victory.

Solomon Tat began UVa's comeback at the 8:01 mark by following up a missed shot. After a layup by Sean Singletary made the score 61-49, the Tigers scored what proved to be their final points of the game on two free throws by Trevor Booker with 5:05 to play. Adrian Joseph and J.R. Reynolds followed with back-to-back three-pointers to pull UVa within eight, 63-55, with 2:56 to play. A jumper by Reynolds and another three-pointer by Joseph at the 1:33 mark made the score 63-60. With 51.7 seconds left, Joseph drained a jumper to make it a one-point game. A Clemson turnover gave the ball back to the Cavaliers. UVa missed a three-pointer, but Singletary out-jumped everyone at the free throw line to come up with the rebound. While on the ground he found Joseph who drove to the basket and missed, but Cain followed up with the tip-in with 15.5 seconds left for his only field goal of the game. The Tigers missed a driving layup attempt on the ensuing possession.

Neither team led by more than four points in the first half with the Tigers holding a 34-30 lead at the intermission.

The Cavaliers shot 42.9 percent (24-56) from the field in the game, including 50 percent (14-28) in the decisive second half. Clemson shot 45.3 percent (24-53) from the floor in the game. UVa held a 39-29 edge in rebounds.

Reynolds led Virginia with 18 points. He made 8-12 attempts from the field. Singletary and Joseph both tallied 11 points, with Joseph scoring eight of his 11 in the second half. Singletary added seven rebounds to lead UVa. Mamadi Diane rounded out UVa's double digit scorers with 10 points.

UVa Rallies From 13 Down To Beat Duke In OT

Sean Singletary hit an off-balance baseline floater with one second remaining in overtime to lift Virginia to a 68-66 victory over Duke (Feb. 1) at the John Paul Jones Arena. The win extended UVa's winning streak to five games.

The Cavaliers trailed by as many as 13 points in the first half (34-21 with 3:29 to go) and were down eight, 59-51, with 3:42 play in regulation. J.R. Reynolds scored the next eight UVa points to pull the Cavaliers within two, 61-59, with 1:15 to play. With 26 seconds left, Singletary knotted the game at 61-61 with a jumper. Duke's Josh McRoberts missed a short jumper in the lane with three seconds remaining and the game went into overtime.

A pair of free throws by Singletary 14 seconds into overtime gave Virginia its first lead since 6-4 only 2:28 into the game. With the score tied at 65-65, Ryan Pettinella made one of two free throws with 2:57 left in the extra session to give UVa a 66-65 lead. Duke tied the game at 66-66 when Gerald Henderson made the first of two free throws with 1:56 to go. Both teams missed jumpers on their next two possessions before Singletary hit the game-winner with one second left. Duke's Greg Paulus had a good look at a three-pointer at the final buzzer, but it bounced off the back rim.

UVa closed out the first half with an 8-2 run to trim a 13-point deficit to seven points, 36-29, at halftime.

Reynolds, who battled cramps throughout the second half, scored a game-high 25 points and added four rebounds and two assists. Singletary tallied 17 points and four assists, while Mamadi Diane posted 14 points on 6-8 shooting from the floor, while making both three-point attempts. Jason Cain led all players with 10 rebounds.

The Cavaliers shot 41.4 percent (24-58) from the field in the game, but made 16-19 (84.2 percent) of their free throw attempts. Duke shot 44.1 percent (26-59) from the floor, but made only 10-30 (33.3 percent) of its attempts after shooting 55.2 percent (16-29) in the first half. Duke was 9-11 (81.8 percent) from the free throw line and held a slight 34-33 edge in rebounds. UVa committed only eight turnovers in the game.

UVa Holds on for 69-65 Win Over Maryland

J.R. Reynolds scored a game-high 23 points, but Tunji Soroye supplied the late-game heroics by nailing three free throws in the final 2:02 to lift Virginia to a 69-65 win over Maryland (Feb. 6) in College Park.

The Cavaliers led by as many as 15 points four times, including 59-44 with 12:16 to play. Maryland came charging back and used a 13-2 run to pull within four, 61-57, with 5:48 to play. With the lead down to three, 63-60, Soroye made two free throws with 2:02 to play to push the advantage up to five, 65-60. A three-pointer by Eric Hayes with 54 ticks left made the score 65-63. Back-to-back layups by Laurynas Mikalauskas and Sean Singletary gave UVa the lead. The Cavaliers led the rest of the way after Diane's layup gave UVa a 10-8 lead at the 16:43 mark. Virginia led by as many as 14 points in the first half and took a 41-31 lead at the intermission.

In addition to his three key free throws, Soroye pulled down a game and career-high 11 rebounds and blocked a season-best four shots while adding an assist and a steal. Adrian Joseph came off the bench to tally 13 points, including three three-point field goals. Singletary rounded out UVa's double figure scorers with 10 points and he also added eight rebounds, three steals and two assists.

UVa shot 42.6 percent (26-61) from the field in the game after connecting on 51.5 percent (17-33) of its attempts in the first half. Maryland shot 40.6 percent (26-64) from the floor in the contest. J.R. Reynolds led the Cavaliers with 21 points, while Sean Singletary added 13. Solomon Tat tallied career highs of eight points and six rebounds. His six rebounds led the team.

Virginia took what proved to be its only lead of the game when Reynolds scored the opening basket 26 seconds into the contest. The Hokies then went on a 21-4 run to open up a 21-6 lead with 13:16 to play in the first half. Virginia Tech's lead grew to as many as 23, 36-13, with 7:23 to go in the opening stanza. UVa trailed 38-22 at the half, marking its lowest point total in an opening half this season.

UVa began the second half with a 5-0 run to pull within 11, 38-27, but the Hokies answered with a 13-2 run to go ahead 51-29 with 13:38 remaining. Virginia never got closer than 20 points the rest of the game.

UVa shot only 32.8 percent (21-64) from the field, while Virginia Tech converted 30-52 field goal attempts for an impressive 57.7 percent accuracy. The Cavaliers made only 4-18 (22.2 percent) three-point attempts. The Hokies were 7-18 (38.9 percent) from three-point range. Virginia held a slight 36-35 edge in rebounds and had an impressive 21 offensive rebounds.

Deron Washington and A.D. Vassallo had gamehigh totals of 22 points apiece to lead Virginia Tech. Washington also added 10 rebounds for a double-double.

UVa earns Tough 73-70 Win Over Florida State

Sean Singletary contributed a team-high 19 points, but Adrian Joseph's five three-point field goals provided the spark when the Cavaliers needed it in a hard-fought 73-70 win over Florida State (Feb. 17) at the John Paul Jones Arena.

While the Cavaliers only trailed once in the game, after Al Thornton's opening basket 1:18 into the contest, they could never quite put the Seminoles away until the very end of the game. UVa managed to build a 12-point lead, 44-32, with 16:57 left in the game. Florida State then held the Cavaliers to only two points over the next five minutes as it closed the gap to 46-45 with 12:31 to play. The Seminoles also pulled within one point, 48-47, with 10:58 to go, and 58-57, with 6:32 to play.

J.R. Reynolds buried a three 15 seconds after FSU pulled with 48-47 and Joseph responded with a three at the 6:18 mark to make the score 61-57. Joseph's three-pointer with 4:07 to play began a mini 5-0 run to help the Cavaliers take a 67-60 edge with 2:01 on the clock. UVa made all six free throws down the stretch to help the Cavaliers register the victory, despite 10 points from FSU's Al Thornton in the final 1:42 of the contest.

Joseph and Reynolds both scored 17 points with Joseph setting a season high for points. Joseph also equaled his career high with five three-point field goals. He was 6-9 from the floor, including 5-7 from three-point range. Reynolds added eight rebounds and six assists, while Singletary contributed six rebounds, six assists and four steals in addition to his 19 points. Tunji Soroye led UVa with nine rebounds, including seven offensive.

Virginia shot only 25-67 (37.3 percent) from the field in the game, but did manage to make 12-26 three-point attempts for 46.2 percent accuracy. The Seminoles converted 25-62 attempts from the field for 40.3 percent, including 10-29 (34.5 percent) three-pointers. Florida State held a slight 41-40 edge in rebounds, but UVa committed only eight turnovers in the game.

Thornton led Florida State with 30 points and 16 rebounds, while Isaiah Swann added 13 points.

UVa Rallies For 75-69 Win Over Georgia Tech

Virginia held Georgia Tech scoreless for the final 3:40 of the game while outscoring the Yellow Jackets 13-0 for a 75-69 come-from-behind victory (Feb. 24) at the John Paul Jones Arena.

The Cavaliers trailed by seven, 69-62, with 3:41 left to play after Javaris Crittenton made a pair of free throws. Georgia Tech didn't trail again until the 12 minute mark when Singletary converted a three-point play to give Virginia a 50-49 lead. The Yellow Jackets regained the lead with 10:50 to play and held it until UVa tied the game at 69-69 with 2:23 left.

Reynolds scored a game-high 25 points and Singletary contributed 24. Reynolds added four rebounds and four steals, while Singletary tied for game-high honors in rebounds with seven and had four assists.

UVa Rolls To 69-56 Win Over Virginia Tech

Virginia closed out an incredible inaugural season at the John Paul Jones Arena with a 69-56 victory (March 1) over in-state rival and 21st-ranked Virginia Tech. The win marked the final home appearance for seniors J.R. Reynolds and Jason Cain.

UVa used accurate long-range shooting and excellent defense to earn a season split and a point in the Commonwealth Challenge competition. The Cavaliers shot an impressive 62.5 percent (10-16) from three-point range while holding Virginia Tech to 36.2 percent (21-58) accuracy from the field. The Hokies made only 2-15 (13.3 percent) three-point attempts and were 0-10 in the second half.

Sean Singletary led Virginia with 17 points, six assists and five rebounds, while Reynolds and Mamadi Diane both tallied 13 points. Reynolds added six assists and four rebounds. He also played solid defense on Zabian Dowdell in the second half to hold him to four points (Dowdell had 13 in the first half). Cain led all players with nine rebounds and also scored eight points.

The Cavaliers got off to a great start, scoring 13 of the first 16 points in the game. UVa led by as many as 12 points, 17-5, in the opening half. The Hokies used a 13-0 run to turn an 11-point deficit into a two-point lead, 21-19, with 6:48 to play in the opening half. Virginia Tech took it biggest lead of the game, 23-20, with 5:37 left in the first half. UVa responded with a 10-1 spurt to grab a 30-24 edge with 2:44 left in the first half and led 36-28 at halftime.

Cain and Diane opened the second stanza with baskets to push UVa's advantage to 40-28. The Hokies pulled within 43-38 with 14:54 to play, but a Singletary jumper and a Diane three put UVa up 10, 48-38, with 13:20 left. Virginia Tech answered with four straight points to make the score 48-42, but Diane and Singletary responded with back-to-back threes and Singletary added two free throws to push the advantage to 56-42 with 11:01 left. Tech never got closer than seven points the rest of the game.

UVa shot 43.6 percent (24-55) from the field in the game and held a 38-35 edge in rebounds. Virginia Tech had only one steal in the contest and that came with only 2:57 remaining.

Dowdell was the only Virginia Tech player to reach double figures in scoring as he had 17 points, but only four in the second half.

Virginia fell short in capturing its first outright ACC regular season title since 1981 when it lost to Wake Forest 78-72 (Mar. 3) in its conference finale at Lawrence Joel Coliseum in Winston-Salem, N.C.

The Cavaliers shot only 35.9 percent (23-64) from the field in the game, including 29.0 percent (9-31) in the second half. UVa made only 5-20 (25.0 percent) three-point attempts in suffering its fifth ACC loss of the season.

Sean Singletary led all scorers with 25 points and added seven rebounds. J.R. Reynolds tallied 11 points, while Jamil Tucker came off the bench to score 10 points.

The Cavaliers led 39-35 at the half after trailing for much of the opening stanza. With the score tied at 27-27, Will Harris and Singletary drained back-to-back three-pointers to give UVa a 33-27 lead with 3:47 to go. Virginia also led 35-29 with 3:08 left in the opening half, which proved to be its largest lead of the game.

Wake Forest scored the first five points of the second half to take a 40-39 lead. With 11:06 to play, UVa took its final lead of the contest, 52-51, on a tip-in by Ryan Pettinella. UVa went on to tie the game three times after taking its final lead, including 62-62 with 5:05 left. The Demon Deacons built their lead to six, 74-68, with 1:26 to go, but a three by Tucker and a free throw by Jason Cain made the score 74-72 with 21 seconds left. On Cain's miss on the second free throw attempt, Singletary's tip attempt just missed. Wake made four free throws in the final 18 seconds to seal the victory.

Wake Forest was barely better than UVa from the field as it shot 36.7 percent (22-60) from the floor. The Deacs made 27-43 (62.8 percent) free throw attempts while Virginia was 21-28 (75.0 percent) from the charity stripe. Wake held a 47-44 edge in rebounds.

Kyle Visser led the Demon Deacons with 17 points and 10 rebounds, while Michael Drum added 16 points.
